CUSTOM RECEIPTS FOR NOVEMBER

Heavy Imports of Dutiable Goods During the Month---How Cost of Living is Boosted.

November, 1916, which closed yesterday, was the banner month for customs collections at the port of Fredericton. July 1912 was the best previous month, but last month surpassed it by \$2,538.50. This is due to the fact that an extremely large amount of dutiable goods was imported. Not only is November a good month, but the first eight months of the fiscal year show a big increase in duty collected over the similar period of the year preceding.

The returns are:

November, 1916—Dutiable goods, \$120,105; free goods, \$5,171; total value, \$125,276. Duty collected, \$16,664.6.

November, 1915—Dutiable goods, \$44,578; free goods, \$1,356; total value, \$45,934. Duty collected, \$8,618.16.

Increase in value of imports for November, 1916, over the corresponding month last year, \$79,342.

Increase in amount of duty collected in November, 1916, over corresponding month last year, \$8,046.80.

Increase in duty collected for the first eight months of the present fiscal year is \$24,546.79 over the corresponding eight months of last year.

The past month is the banner one for duty collections at this port, the amount exceeding best previous month, July, 1912, by \$2,538.50.
