#### HOUSEHOLD RECIPES

##### Jellied Apples.

Six tart apples, 2 tablespoonfuls gelatin, juice of 2 lemons, 1 cupful sugar, 1 cup whipped cream, 1 cupful cold water. Peel, quarter and core the apples and cook without stirring until soft, but still hold shape. Drain the apples and set aside to cool. Dissolve the gelatin in the water from the apples. Add the sugar and lemon juice. Arrange the apples in a mold, pour the mixture over them and put on ice to harden. Serve with whipped cream.

##### Frosting Without Eggs.

Put 1½ cups sugar and 1-2 cup milk over the fire. Do not stir until the mixture has started to boil. Let boil 10 minutes. Then add 1 teaspoon flavoring and stir over cold water until the frosting is of a consistency to spread. Half a cup of chopped nuts, figs or dates makes a pleasing addition.

##### Cream Cake.

Beat 3 eggs until light add 1 1-2

cups of granulated sugar, 1-2 cup of water, the grated rind of one lemon and 2 cups of sifted flour mixed and sifted over again with 2 teaspoons of baking powder. Bake in two layers and put together with cream filling.

**Cream Filling**—Beat the yolks of 2 eggs until light, add 3 tablespoonfuls of cornstarch, 3-4 cup of sugar and a dash of salt, then add gradually, 1 pint of hot milk, cook over boiling water until smooth and thick, remove from the fire and flavor with 2 teaspoons of vanilla.

##### Fried Chicken, Southern Style.

Clean, singe and cut in pieces for serving two young chickens. Plunge into cold water, drain but do not wipe. Sprinkle with salt and pepper and coat thickly with flour, having as much flour adhere to chicken as possible. Try out one pound fat salt pork cut in pieces, and cook chicken slowly in fat until tender and well browned. Serve with white sauce made of half milk and half cream.

### GOVERNMENT TAKING OVER WELSH MINES

London, Nov. 30.—The government's decision to assume control of all the coal mines in South Wales on Dec. 1, under the defence of the realm act, was announced too late last night to enable commentators to gauge its principal effect.

The announcement was a surprise to both sides in the miners' controversy, and judging from preliminary statements by individuals, both miners and employers are more or less dumb-founded.

Secretary Richards of the South Wales Miners' Federation, after an outburst of astonishment, declared emphatically that he would oppose, such a measure unless it were made applicable to the coal mining industry of the whole country. A majority of the South Wales leaders are now in London for a conference regarding the threatened strike. They will meet this morning to consider the startling developments in the situation.

Mine owners are reticent, but seem as much at a loss as the miners to understand the bearing of the new regulations.

A brief despatch from Cardiff at midnight says that the news came to the coal interests there as a bomb shock.

### GERMANS MARKETING STOLEN SECURITIES

Paris, Nov. 30.—Commissioner Faraliqu, of the French secret service, has reported that a far reaching organization of German banks to market abroad securities and coupons which disappeared from the invaded districts and cities of northern France and Belgium, has been disclosed by inquiries into the case of Geobran Rabbat, a Syrian banker arrested at Geneva.

Rabbat was charged with having in his possession a quantity of Russian, Serbian and French government stock taken by Germans in occupied territory. He formerly was a banker in Paris.

The French government got track of Rabbat's operations through the sale for 20,000 francs of coupons of Russian bonds belonging to M. Aumignon, who buried them in a garden at Termes in the Ardennes, before the arrival there of the Germans.

Commissioner Faraliqu reported that his inquiries had convinced him the organization is in direct relation with German banks.

The Swiss and French police already have seized in various places in both countries, papers the examination of which will require a month.

It is stated that coupons of securities valued at about 20,000,000 francs have already been purchased by unwitting buyers.

A Spaniard has been arrested on the Swiss frontier. In a double bottomed trunk in his possession were, it is alleged, Argentine and Spanish securities worth 317,000 francs.

#### COMMANDER LOST ZEPPELINS.

Berlin, via London, Nov. 30.—The commanders of the two Zeppelins destroyed in the recent raid on England were Lieut. Commander Deitrich and Lieut. Frankenberg.

Lieut. Commander Deitrich formerly was a captain of the North German Lloyd company. He distinguished himself by his exploits in the early weeks of the war in eluding a British cruiser and taking the steamer Brandenburg from Baltimore to Trenchhjem, Norway.

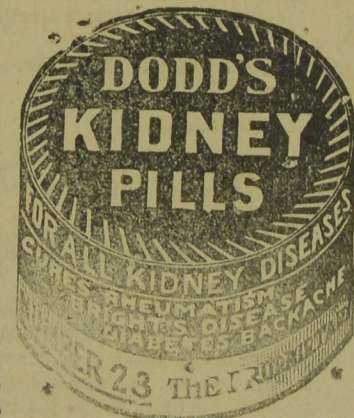
