CANNED GOODS  
FROM UNITED STATES  
IMPORTED LOCALLY

Tomatoes Brought Across the Border To Meet Demand--Prices Will Not be Less However--Duty Is High

Canned goods from the United States have been imported into Fredericton in large quantities recently to meet a demand which the Canadian supply cannot fill. Tomatoes are the chief item in the importation. Wholesalers say that the tomato crop in Ontario was almost a total failure. All the big canning factories are situated in that province and their output was very much curtailed.

Unfortunately for the consumer, the importation of tomatoes from the United States will not reduce the retail price, as the prices of the wholesalers are based on United States prices plus duty and surtax. In Fredericton one can of tomatoes can be bought for 25 cents, and in the United States three cans can be bought for the same amount. This gives some idea of the extra cost of food products, which is caused by a high tariff.

The importation of tomatoes from the United States is most unusual, this being the first year in which it has been of any extent.

In many quarters there is a demand that the surtax be taken off of food products and the duty also decreased.

In connection with pork products the surtax is particularly oppressive. Lumbermen would be paying about \$4.50 less for mess pork if it were not for this tax.

LIEUT. J. T. HANNING  
OFFICIALLY REPORTED  
MISSING IN FRANCE

Fredericton Man Who Joined Royal Flying Corps Last Winter Has Disappeared--Met Brother-in-law at Front.

Mrs. James Bird, of 217 St. John street, has received an official telegram from Ottawa, informing her that her son, Lieut. J. Talmage Hanning, of the Royal Flying Corps, is reported missing on the western front. Lieut. Hanning had been in France for about three months and had seen much service as an aviator. He is a brother-in-law of Major James Pringle, quartermaster of the 26th Battalion, and met the latter at the front last September. Lieut. Hanning was an undergraduate at the University of New Brunswick about ten years ago and is well known throughout the province.

When the war broke out he was in the Canadian West. Last winter he made application for a commission in the Royal Flying Corps and went to England at his own expense. After training as a navigator, he was sent to France.

Lieut. Edward Hanning, who is with the Canadian Engineers at Ottawa, is a brother.

## Left for New York.

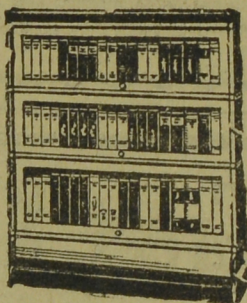

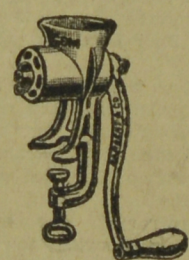
