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China to Insist on The Withdrawal of All Enemy Troops

Foreign Observers at Shanghai See in China's Demand a Bid for World Sympathy for a Possible Campaign in March — Japanese Allege a Breach of Faith by Chinese.

SHANGHAI, March 12—Chinese peace negotiations with Japanese without prior withdrawal of Japanese armed forces were doubted today by foreign observers who saw a Chinese bid for world sympathy for a possible military campaign against the new Manchurian state.

Quo Tai-Chi, spokesman for the Chinese Foreign Office, said China would insist on Japanese withdrawal from all Chinese territory now occupied as a prelude to negotiations. The statement was in reply to a Japanese request for the Chinese definition of the term "withdrawal of Japanese armed forces."

Alleged Breach of Faith.

LONDON, March 12—Despatches to the Exchange Telegraph Company today from Shanghai said that the Japanese had attacked and driven Chinese behind the second prohibited line in the Japanese occupied area, alleging that the Chinese broke faith by crossing the line.

A SPLIT IN THE SQUIRES POLICY IN NEWFOUNDLAND

The Minister of Public Health and Two Private Members Have Resigned.

St. John's, Nfld. March 11—Budget proposals of Prime Minister Sir Richard Squires have caused a split in the Government party, and three prominent members, including a Cabinet minister, tendered their resignations this afternoon.

They are: Hon. H. M. Mosdell, who resigned his portfolio of Minister of Public Health last week; Philip Fudge, member for Hermitage, and Captain John Parsons, member for Harbor Grace.

Sir Richard lost another of his Ministers several weeks ago when Hon. Peter Cashin, then Minister of Finance and Customs, resigned his portfolio and preferred serious charges against the Prime Minister and two other members of the Government Party. These charges will be the subject of a parliamentary inquiry.

Proposals of the Prime Minister to impose duties on a number of articles that are included in fishermen's supplies, to take books off the free list, and to reduce war veterans' pensions, are said to be responsible for the split in the party.

Petroleum.

A proposal to float a loan of \$2,500,000 and secure it with proceeds from a monopoly on the sale of petroleum products in Newfoundland was outlined in the Legislature by Sir Richard today when he gave notice that bills to cover both financial measures would be introduced.

Bill Was Passed

The bill to enable the City Council of Fredericton and the Victoria Hospital Trustees to finance the Nurses' Home was given a third reading in the Legislature yesterday, and now awaits enactment by the Administrator of the government.

MODEL LEAGUE CONCLUDED ITS 4TH ASSEMBLY

The fourth annual assembly of the Maritime Model League of Nations, which met in the Memorial Hall of the University of New Brunswick this week, was brought to a close last night.

The final session featured a debate on the resolution placed before the League by J. L. Crowe, King's College, representing China, that Japan withdraw her forces from Manchuria and promise no further aggression in that area. The motion, was seconded by R. G. MacNeill, Acadia, India, and was contested by A. D. Stewart, Dalhousie Japan. The objection was answered by William Smitherham, Mount Allison, representing France. The debate favored China's stand.

Addresses in French were given by Miss Bertha Albert, U. N. B., representing Sweden, and L. C. Hawen, Mount Allison representing France, and a speech in Hindustani by Miss Elizabeth Higginbottom, Acadia, representing India. This was translated by A. C. Cox, Acadia, who represented Bulgaria.

Following the concluding session, the large number of Maritime representatives attended the U. N. B. play "Mr. Pym Passes By", put on at the Normal School building last night. A banquet was held for the members, and this year's Model League voted one of the most successful ever held.

SEARCH FOR THE LINDBERGH BABY GOES ON

The Police Have Appealed for Information Regardless of Source— Underworld Activity.

Hopewell, N. J., March 11—A police appeal for information "regardless of the source", to be treated with strict confidence, was broadcast tonight coincident in the search for the kidnapped Lindbergh baby and a mysterious incident in the Tombs Prison, New York.

The wholesale bid for co-operation from all sources was the first of its kind made by State Police officials since the famous flier's son was stolen from his sick-bed a week ago last Tuesday night.

"In our earnest desire to accomplish the recovery of the baby," it said, "the police will welcome information of any kind leading to its return, regardless of the source."

"The identity of all people disclosing information leading to the recovery of the baby, whether the information be valuable or not, will be treated with confidence."

A man described as a possible suspect in the case was viewed in Tombs Prison last night by Morris Rosner acting as a personal representative of Colonel Lindbergh and then, according to reliable information, was brought to Hopewell early. Rosner has been a mysterious figure in the case. He has been described by newspapers as a man with widespread underworld connections who has been frequently at the Lindbergh home since the kidnapping, but beyond this little is known about him.

Officials of the department of Correction said any further statement about the Tombs angle of the case "might kill the effectiveness of our work."

THE DANUBIAN CUSTOMS UNION ACCEPTABLE

Sir John Simon Says Great Britain Will Approve It

SPONSORED BY FRANCE

Will Eliminate Tariff Barriers in Many of European States

Paris, March 12—British Foreign Secretary, Sir John Simon, was understood today to have told Premier Andre Tardieu that the proposed Danubian customs union sponsored by France could be accepted by Britain despite Italian opposition.

The Tardieu project would pledge central European nations to refrain from a customs union or other attachment with Germany.

It would establish preferential tariffs practically amounting to elimination of tariff barriers between Austria, Hungary, Roumania, Czech Slovakia and Yugoslavia.

Italian opposition was said to centre, not on the necessity of aiding Austria and Hungary, but on the fear that the project would increase French prestige in the Balkans and the Danube area where France already has important allies.

SEARCH TURNS INTO EASTERN BAD LANDS

The Lindbergh Baby Has Been Missing Eleven Days

(Special to the DAILY MAIL by the British United Press)

Hopewell, N. J., March 12—The futile eleven day search for the kidnapped Lindbergh baby turned more definitely than ever today into eastern gangland and into the bad lands of the Sourland mountain district with state police promising immunity for information "regardless of the source." These reasons are advance for such action.

Sources close to the Lindberghs announced that although fifty thousand messages on the kidnapping have been recovered. Not one contained proof it was from kidnapers.

Great Display At Funeral of Arstide Briand

France Today Paid Final Honors to a Famous Man of Peace—Was Given Honors Such as Accorded to the Nation's War Heroes.

PARIS, March 12—France and the world paid final honors to Aristide Briand today in a state funeral for the famous man of peace that called for a parade of all the pomp and display accorded the nation's war heroes.

Representatives of thirty governments and kings walked in the funeral procession under drab skies and in a cold north wind.

"The man of peace" was taken from his beloved Foreign Office, where thousands had filed solemnly past his bier, to a provisional burial ground at Passy Cemetery, on the Trocadero Heights overlooking the Seine.

MACDONALD IS READY TO SPEED UP HIS WORK

New Quay, England, March 12 — Prime Minister J. Ramsay J. MacDonald who has been recuperating from an eye operation, departed for London today, accompanied by his daughter, Ishbel.

"I hope to get permission from my doctors to go full speed ahead with my work" the Prime Minister said.

Discussing the pound sterling, he said, he would "prefer a steady advance and then a rest around a point which brings the pound into correspondence with its real value in relation of prices."

INTERESTING DATA IN N.B. HEALTH REPORT

The Death Rate in Province During Past Year From Tuberculosis the Lowest in History.

New Brunswick's citizens enjoyed a year of unusually good health during 1931, according to statistics contained in the annual report of the Department of Health, tabled in the Legislature yesterday afternoon by Hon. Dr. H. I. Taylor, Minister of Health.

The death rate from tuberculosis was the lowest in the history of the province; not one case of smallpox was reported by the health officers; diphtheria showed a slight decline; typhoid figures were the best in the history of New Brunswick; scarlet fever showed a marked decline in cases and death rate; but three deaths were attributable to infantile paralysis, and infantile mortality was the lowest ever recorded in the province.

In his report to the Minister of Health, Dr. William Warwick, Deputy Minister, makes the following comment regarding the fight being waged in New Brunswick against tuberculosis, which has been the cause of grave concern for many years, has of late shown a decidedly downward trend.

Regarding notifiable disease, the report states that the record for the last year is a matter of congratulation to the Minister of Health. Referring to smallpox it says: "This disease, at one time so prevalent and costly, has for some years now been only occasionally seen. This year there was not a single case. Diphtheria showed a very slight decline in the number of cases, with the total deaths the same as last year." In connection with typhoid, the report states: "There were for the fiscal year but 100 cases, with 13 deaths, giving a death rate of 3.1 per 100,000 population. These figures are the best on record for this province."

Stitches Necessary

Several stitches were necessary to be taken on the head of Morris Rapaport, local man, who was dragged along the ground when the horse which he was driving became frightened by a car in O'Dell Avenue several days ago, and upset the sleigh, throwing Mr. Rapaport into the street. Mr. Rapaport was dragged a distance of about ten feet, and received lacerations to his scalp. He was reported to be resting easier today at his residence in King street, though still suffering much pain. City and provincial police, cooperatively, investigated the accident at the time.
