## REPLY TO LETTER OF RETURNED SOLDIER

Fredericton, Nov. 25, 1916.

To the Editor of the Mail.

Sir,—Having noted the contents of a communication in a recent issue of your newsy paper, presumably from a returned soldier, may I be privileged to draw the attention of the writer of that letter to the fact that there are many many men in this vicinity working hard and working long hours whose incomes are much less than the sum I infer the returned soldier is working for, namely \$750 per annum.

Because a man gets a government position, is it absolutely necessary that he should get an unreasonable salary? Should not the salary correspond fittingly to the nature of the position, with due regard to hours, duties, environment, etc.? Many a man in this locality, with a wife and a family, is laboring nine or ten hours each week-day for less than \$750 per year, and if he wants a day or a half day off he loses a portion of his income. Every respect should, of course, be shown to "A Returned Soldier," but he should not be unreasonable nor discontented because he deems himself worth more than his employers do. And when he compares his income with that of another, let him also compare the positions. Yours respectfully,

## TWO MEETINGS HELD FOR SCOTT ACT REPEAL

Petitions Will be Circulated in City At an Early Date.

The petitions for the repeal of the Canada Temperance Act in Fredericton will be in circulation at an early date. At the present time the temperance workers are waiting for the revised electoral lists to be issued. In York county petitions for the repeal of the Act have been in circulation for some time. The repeal of the Act is in preparation for the New Brunswick Prohibition Act, which is to go into effect on May 1st next.

Rev. W. D. Wilson, Field Secretary for the New Brunswick Branch of the Dominion Alliance, left this morning for Madawaska county on official business. On December 6th the annual meeting of the New Brunswick branch will take place at Sussex.

Yesterday Rev. Mr. Wilson was the principal speaker at two meetings in the interests of Scott Act repeal, which were held at the Brunswick Street Baptist Church. In the afternoon the meeting was for men and was attended by members of men's classes of the various churches.

At night there was a mass meeting presided over by His Worship Mayor Mitchell. Rev. Mr. Wilson presented to his audience the advantages of the new Prohibitory Act over the Canada Temperance Act, and asked for the repeal of the latter in order that the new Act be given a fair trial before the boys return from service in the army. The speaker gave instances of the various ill-effects following the use of liquor and stated that the proportion of Russian wounded who recovered was higher than in the British army, because of prohibition being in effect in Russia.

## FAMOUS BOXER WINS MILITARY MEDAL

Paris, Nov. 27.—Georges Carpentier, the French champion boxer, has been on leave in Paris, after taking part as an aviator at the recapture of Fort Douaumont on the Verdun front.

Carpentier was decorated with the Military Medal for gallantry in action. While in Paris he gave an informal exhibition of boxing at a charity bazaar, in the Trocadero Palace, and received an enthusiastic reception from the many thousands in the audience.

### Going to Vancouver.

Sergt. Fred Lawney, of the 236th Battalion, is leaving this evening for Vancouver, B.C., on business pertaining to the corps. He will be absent about a month.

### Decision on Wednesday.

Judge Wilson will give his decision in habeas corpus proceedings in a recent Canada Temperance Act case on Wednesday morning at 11 o'clock.

### Death of Infant.

Helen Kathleen Yeomans, the infant daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harland Yeomans, of Gibson, died Sunday afternoon after a brief illness. The funeral took place this afternoon, interment being made at Sunnybank Cemetery.

### Died Saturday Night.

Mrs. William Robinson died at her home in this city Saturday night. She was 95 years old the day of her death. One son, Mr. William H. Robinson, and four daughters, the Misses Jane, Dora, Adelaide and Mary, survive. The funeral will take place Tuesday afternoon.

### Death at Waasis.

Frank Alexander McSheffrey, son of Mr. Robt. McSheffrey, of Waasis, passed away yesterday aged 32 years. Two children, Ethel and Lillian, survive. The funeral will take place Tuesday morning, leaving the house at 9 o'clock. Service will be conducted at the church of St. Vincent de Paul, Oromocto, at 11 o'clock by Rev. Father Carleton.

### Died in Hospital.

Hugh Murdoch died this morning in the Victoria Public Hospital. He is survived by a widow, one brother, Joseph, of this city, four sisters, Mrs. McCarney and Mrs. McSheffrey, of Waasis, and Mrs. Phillips and Mrs. McSheffrey, in the West; also by three sons, Fred, John and Kenneth, of Waasis, and two daughters, Fay, of Waasis, and Mrs. Allan Chase, of Fredericton. The funeral will take place at 3 o'clock Tuesday afternoon. Rev. J. E. Wilson will conduct the service and interment will be made at the Rural Cemetery.

### Death at Nashwaak.

Mrs. Elizabeth Bradley, wife of Mr. W. H. Bradley, of Nashwaak Village, died at her home this morning as the result of injuries caused by a fall a few weeks ago. She was 80 years of age and is survived by a husband and one daughter, Mrs. Rowley Manzer, and one son, George T., both of Nashwaak Village. She also leaves one brother, Mr. E. K. Todd, of Brooklyn, N.Y., and one sister, Mrs. London, of Woodstock. The funeral will take place on Wednesday at 2 p.m., with services by Rev. F. Holmes.
