Says Germany Must Resume Her Place Among the Nations

Chancellor Von Papen Suggests a Speedy Road Back to World Recovery—His Government Will Try to Recapture Germany's Economic Place in International Life.

BERLIN, July 27—The speediest road back to world recovery of prosperity is to restore Germany's place in the sun, Chancellor Franz Von Papen said today in an exclusive interview with the British United Press.

The world's prosperity, he said, never will be restored until Germany resumes her place among the nations as a moral, political and economic equal—a beer manufacturer and seller of goods and a big customer in the world's markets.

"My government," he said, "is convinced that its primary task is to recapture the economic and political place in international life to which Germany is entitled."

TRAINING SHIP OF GERMAN NAVY WAS WRECKED

Was Bowed Over During a Thunder Storm Near Kiel and 69 Lives Lost.

Kiel, Germany, July 26—A gale-borne thunderstorm bowled over the three-masted German naval trainer Niobe off Holstein today and sent her and 69 men to the bottom.

Thirty seven persons including the Captain, his Lieutenant, 17 of the Niobe's crew and 18 naval cadets, were rescued by the steamer Therese Russ.

The steamer was passing when the storm struck the Niobe one mile off Fehmarn Lightship, near Kiel. Although several naval vessels and aeroplanes were soon sent to the scene, there was no evidence of any other survivors.

There was slight glimmer of hope that Danish fishermen may have taken more survivors aboard and landed them at the isolated settlement of Rodby, on the Danish land, Laaland. Naval officers were inclined not to believe this, however.

The fact that most of the rescued were members of the experienced crew instead of the cadets who had just gone aboard for a sailing cruise led naval officers to conjecture that the crew was handling the ropes when the vessel went over.

Was Full-Rigged

It was apparent to them the Niobe was full-rigged and was not using her 240-horse-power motor. They thought perhaps the sudden blow came off land and smacked their down before the canvas could be reefed.

The total number aboard was only tentatively placed at 106. The naval authorities allowed for a discrepancy since several cadets had not joined ship because of illness.

The Therese Russ tonight transferred the survivors, many of whom were reported in need of hospital attention to the naval cruiser Koeln which was due in the naval base here soon.

Among the survivors were those of the 50 officer cadets and 18 sub-officer cadets who had not gone down with the Niobe.

HOTEL CHEF WAS DROWNED AT BATHURST

Bathurst, July 26—A sad drowning accident took place today in Bathurst Basin, at a point where Little and Middle rivers flow into the harbor, when Clement Dufour, chef at the Gloucester hotel, lost his life while bathing with Napoleon Melanson and Donald Degraze, clerks at the hotel. The victim was to be married in September.

Shortly after they entered the water which was about 12 feet deep, Dufour was seen to sink below the surface. His companions thought at first that he was diving, until he called for help. Melanson made a gallant effort to save him but Dufour caught him by the foot, taking him to the bottom. Non of the parties could swim well, all being beginners.

In answer to a call, Chief of Police Cazarre Russell, accompanied by Ernest Babin rushed to the scene from Bathurst and promptly recovered the body. Dr. R. G. Duncan, coroner here, arrived as the body was being removed from the water. He pronounced the man dead and gave permission to remove the body.

SEA ANIMAL HAS FACE LIKE A MONKEY

Richmond, Va., July 27—A strange looking sea animal weighting five pounds, 26 inches long and 18 inches wide, was caught in the Chesapeake Bay by J. F. Davis of Richmond. Its face resembles that of a monkey.

G. B. SHAW HAS A BIRTHDAY

Malvern, Worcestershire, Eng., July 26—George Bernard Shaw, who is 76 today, spent his birthday here where he is on a holiday much the same as he spends every other day—"concealing the fact that I'm 76," he said. The noted playwright and sage looked thoroughly fit but he would not admit it.

"I'm not fit," he insisted. "I'm very much overworked. I've been that all my life."

REORGANIZATION PLAN OF FRASER CO.'S APPROVED

Holders of 1st Mortgage Bonds Held Meeting at Montreal—Appointments Were Outvoted.

Montreal, Quebec, July 26—The form of reorganization of Fraser Companies, Limited, as amended recently by the noteholders, today was approved by holders of the first mortgage 25-year sinking fund gold bonds. Of the \$8,202,000 of these bonds outstanding there were voted at the meeting \$4,104,000 in favor of the amended reorganization and \$254,500 against.

James Rodgers and Senator J. M. Wilson opposed the reorganization the former asking an adjournment for 30 days. His motion was voted down. Senator Wilson criticized the plan in connection with a proposed increase in the first mortgage bond issue and also opposed the nomination of I. W. Killam of Montreal, as a voting trustee. Mr. Killam defended the amended plan as being the "fairest possible."

Voting Trustees

The following were elected as voting trustees in accordance with the plan, their nomination being embodied in the resolution put before the meeting to pass the plan: J. A. Ewing, K. C., I. W. Killam, Col. Robert F. Massie, D. S. O., John Appleton and H. P. Robinson. The latter is of Saint John, N. B., and the others of Montreal.

Among the amendments to the plan, which were all minor, the only one directly affecting the bondholders was the provision that before any further bond outstanding must be earned instead of one and a half times under the plan originally proposed. Another amendment of some consequence was that Fraser Companies, Limited, can separate from the Restigouche Company, Limited, on June 1, 1935, upon three months' notice instead of at any time on or before June 1, 1934.

Consideration discussion to the proposed plan was voiced at the meeting, which was convened at 11 A. M. and lasted till 1.30 P. M. Among those protesting was Senator J. M. Wilson. According to Senator Wilson the bondholders had been left in a position of "take or leave it."

The protesting group did not, however, enjoy sufficient support at the meeting to make their protests effective, as was shown in the final vote.

The adoption of the plan as proposed with amendments now depends upon the approval of the debenture holders who are scheduled to meet here tomorrow.

CAROLINE GETS HER NAME FROM BIRTH ON CAR

Chicago, July 27—The daughter of Mrs. Sarah Johnson, twenty-five-year-old negro, rode into the world in a street car last night, Conductor M. W. Stenmeier shooed his passengers out and called a doctor. At a hospital where the mother and babe were taken Mrs. Johnson said that the circumstances had also provided a name for the child.

"We'll call her Caroline," she said.

VAIN SEARCH FOR THE BODIES OF VICTIMS

Warships, Submarines and Airplanes Are Taking Part

NIOBE SANK IN FOUR MINUTES

Former Commander is Moved by News of Disaster

Kiel, Germany, July 27—Warships, submarines, and airplanes searched in vain today for sixty nine German naval cadets and sailors who went down with the four masted Barque Niobe, which sank in the Baltic Sea within four minutes after a sudden squall struck her.

WAS DEEPLY MOVED

Chicago, Ill., July 27—Count Felix Von Luckner, famous German sea-raider and one time commander of the ill fated German training ship, Niobe, was deeply moved by reports of the disaster.

"The Niobe was a good strong ship", Von Luckner said, "though once while I was in command of her we had a narrow escape from a somewhat similar disaster."

POSTAL SERVICE STOPS

A Minature Riot At Murder Trial In Paris Court

Lawyers and Law Students Seize the Press Benches During Trial of Doumer's Assassin.—Americans Held Off the Invaders—Verdict is Expected Tonight.

PARIS, July 27—A miniature riot broke out at the trial of Dr. Paul Gorgouloff, assassin of President Paul Doumer, when a horde of lawyers and law students tried to seize the press benches during an intermission. A handful of American newspapermen, who had had a difficult time getting the scanty accommodations provided, held off the invaders until gendarmes reinforced them. The trial was resumed, with the lawyers in partial possession of the press seats and frequent altercations and scuffles between lawyers and reporters interrupted the trial.

The state seeking to send the Russian to the guillotine presented a mass testimony to prove he is sane and premeditated the crime. A verdict was expected tonight.

MAY READJUST PRIVATE DEBTS OF GERMANY

Berlin, July 27—Readjustment of Germany's foreign private debt was foreshadowed today in a letter from Chancellor Franz Von Papen to Nationalist leader Alfred Hugenberg.

Hugenberg had urged the Chancellor to institute financial reforms. It was believed that Von Papen would seek agreement with Germany's creditors rather than seeking readjustments through a moratorium on private debts payments or slashing interest rates.

WILL ATTEMPT WORLD FLIGHT

Paris, France, July 27—The first non-stop flight around the world will be attempted next summer by James Mattern, and Bennett Griffin, the American fliers told the British United Press today before starting for London on their way home.

Nothing To Say

Inspector L. A. Gagnon, of the R. C. M. P. headquarters here, would not comment when asked this morning regarding the theft of a bond from him on November 20 last, valued at \$1,000. The former chief preventive officer of the province will probably appear against one Everett Gallant, 49, who has been arrested for the theft and will be tried at St. John within a few days. Gallant was arrested several days ago in Summerside, P. E. I., and brought to Saint John to face the charge. Gallant is alleged to have stolen the bond following a transaction with Inspector Gagnon last fall.

SPANISH BODY HAS TASTE FOR WORK

Madrid, Spain, July 27—The Spanish Cortes Constituyentes having been in session since July 14, 1931, has established a Spanish record for continuous work. In the 186 sessions between July, 1931, and the end of June, 1932, a total of 222 laws had been approved by the parliament.

CANADIAN BANKS COME TO THE RESCUE

Will Finance Unemployment Relief Work at St. John's, Nfld., to the Extent of \$100,000.

St. Johns, Newfoundland, July 26—A syndicate of Canadian banks tonight moved to guard this capital from the further damage at the hands of the unemployed.

Following a night of disorder in which several stores were broken into and robbed, and a day of anxiety, representatives of the banks announced they would advance the \$100,000 required to finance a program of work for the relief of the unemployed.

Negotiations for the loan were opened by Premier F. C. Alderice before he left for the Imperial Conference at Ottawa.

After his departure the restless unemployed look to Hon. H. A. Winter, K. C., acting Premier, for the announcement that the work was to proceed. When no definite assurance was forthcoming yesterday, the men called a meeting and last night about 400 of them marched to Winter avenue and halted at the residence of Mr. Winter.

Windows Broken

Informed that Mr. Winter was not at home, they returned to the city, and on water street a number of youths in the crowd broke several plate glass windows.

Police rushed to the scene of disorders, and before midnight the greater number of demonstrators were believed to be on their way homeward.

Not long after midnight, however, fresh outbreaks of violence were reported, and the city feared a repetition of riots earlier in the year, when, on one occasion, the unemployed forced their way into the Colonial Building and caused a disturbance in which Mr. Richard Squires, then Premier, was injured, and on another occasion thousands stormed the building, broke up a session of Legislature and forced the Premier to flee the city.
