The U. N. B. Concludes The Banner Year of Its Long History

Graduated a Class of Seventy-one Young Men and Women This Afternoon—Friends of Higher Education Out in Force—Interesting Program Carried Out in Memorial Hall—Lieut.-Gov. McLean Presided.

The old University of New Brunswick, founded nearly a century and a third ago, completed the most successful year in its history with the annual encaenia exercises this afternoon. Beautiful spring weather graced the occasion and friends of higher education from all sections of the Province made up the splendid gathering which thronged the Memorial Hall where the exercises were held. His Honor The Lieutenant-Governor H. H. McLean, K.C., LL.D., V.D., occupied the chair, and seated on the platform with him were members of the Senate, Faculty and Alumni Society, and others. The members of the graduating class, wearing their ermine trimmed gowns, occupied seats well to the front of the Hall and were the cynosure of all eyes. Dr. C. C. Jones, president of the University, acted as master of ceremonies.

Degrees Conferred

In all seventy-one degrees were conferred by the President, including an LL.D. for Dr. A. G. Hoben, the alumni orator conferred in absentia and another of Doctor of Literature on W. A. Cowperthwaite of Winnipeg. The degree of B. A. with honors was conferred upon eight, B.A. without honors on fifteen; B.Sc. with honors on 4; B.Sc. on four, B.C.L. on six, B.Sc. in Civil Engineering on four; B.Sc. in electrical engineering on nineteen, and B.Sc. in forestry on eleven.

RADIO REPORT WAS ADOPTED BY THE HOUSE

The Eventual Nationalization of Radio Broadcasting is Recommended—Premier to Introduce Bill.

Ottawa, May 11—Without a dissenting voice, the House of Commons adopted today the report of the special Committee recommending eventual nationalization of Canadian radio broadcasting. Prime Minister R. B. Bennett then gave notice of his intention to introduce a bill to control the Government-operated system. The whole proceedings lasted less than an hour.

Hon. Raymond Morand, Conservative member for Essex East, chairman of the committee, expained the proposed trans-Canada system. Stations will be placed at strategic points across the country. Revenues from radio licenses and advertising will be used to develop and operate the system, under the supervision of a non-political commission.

Referring to advertising, which would be limited to three minutes in the hour, Dr. Morand said it was a primary factor in broadcasting in the United States. "In Great Britain and other parts of Europe," he proceeded, "it is not permitted at all. But because we are in such close proximity to United States, the Committee felt advertising should be permitted to a limited extent. If it were prohibited here, the United States industries with branches in Canada or selling goods in this country, would have an advantage over Canadian industries."

Hon. W. D. Uler, one of the Liberals of the committee, said the proposed system would not restrain any Canadian radio owner from getting United States or foreign programs. He might tune in his set wherever he chose, securing either the Canadian program or one from the United States.

Moves Adoption

With the assertion that radio is a weapon which can be used in such a way as to do a great deal of harm; or can be so utilized to build up culture and advance education, Hon. Raymond Morand (Cons., East Essex), chairman of the Commons Committee on Radio Broadcasting, moved concurrence in the report of that committee this afternoon. The report recommended eventual nationalization of radio broadcasting.

MRS. SANGER IS SUPPORTING THE HATFIELD BILL

Birth Control Advocate Renews Her Plea to Congress

APPEARS BEFORE A COMMITTEE

Wants Dissemination of Birth Control Literature Legalized

Washington, D.C., May 12—Mrs. Margaret Sanger, birth control advocate, today renewed her plea to Congress to legalize dissemination of birth control information.

With several medical witnesses, she appeared before a Senate Judiciary sub-committee in behalf of the Hatfield Bill, which would exempt hospitals, clinics, doctors from an 1873 statute forbidding the transmission of birth control data through the mails and other common carriers.

YORK COUNTY BASEBALL LOOP OF FOUR CLUBS

The first gun in amateur baseball hereabouts was fired last night, when representatives from this city, Devon and Marysville assembled at the home of P. S. Watson, Devon last night and underwent temporary organization. Kenneth Staples, this city was selected president of the prospective loop; A. W. Barbour, vice-president, and J. Walter Walker, of Marysville, secretary-treasurer.

It was decided to hold another meeting at the Dawson Y, Marysville on the following Wednesday at which further details of organization will be gone into. Representatives from four teams, two from this city, and one each from Devon and Marysville will be asked to attend. Each will bring a set of by-laws and an attempt at readjustment will be made to fit the loop. Discussion was held on the by-laws, the possibility of Minto entering the league, rosters, and the matter of junior players. In this regard, settlement was made that the junior teams would be used as the source of younger talent, the uptown and downtown juniors of this city, forming the "recruiting" camps for two Fredericton teams, together with the seniors. Carl Watson occupied the chair. It was an interesting meeting and many attended.

Died Last Evening

Isaac W. Stevenson, aged 84 years, died at his home last evening in Mauderville. The deceased was a native of Sunbury county and was prominent in the affairs of the community. For several years he represented the Parish of Burton on the County Council. He was also magistrate of Mauderville for some years. He engaged in several business enterprises and gained the respect and love of all who came in contact with him. His death is greatly mourned and the community has lost a valuable asset with his passing. He was married twice and is survived by his present wife, two sons, Arthur E. of Drumheller, Alta.; George A., at home; two daughters, Miss Jennie, of Saint John, and Miss Louise, of Hartland; one sister, Mrs. Margaret Fradsham, formerly of Devon, and now of Waltham, Mass. The deceased is also survived by five grandchildren. The funeral will be held from the late home Friday afternoon at two o'clock. Rev. Gordon Lantz, assisted by Rev. D. F. Coburn, will conduct the services and interment will be made in the United Church cemetery at Sheffield.

All France Paid Last Tribute to Late President

Remains of Paul Doumer, Victim of An Assassin, Laid to Rest With Full Military and Civil Ceremony—A Million People Lined Route of the Procession.

PARIS, May 12—Heavy rain-laden skies cast mourning over all France today as the nation buried its murdered President, Paul Doumer, with the fullest military and civil ceremonial.

The funeral procession left the Elysee Palace at 8 a. m. as a million persons lined the route to Notre Dame Cathedral and The Pantheon, the nation's political shrine. The Prince of Wales, the King of the Belgians, the Duke of Aosta, Prince Paul of Serbia, and diplomats of forty nations walked in the rain behind the hearse. Ambassador Walter E. Edge represented President Hoover of the United States.

Police were particularly strict in guarding the Prince of Wales, King Albert and other royal representatives. They would not allow even photographers or journalists to approach any member of the royal party from the time the members of ruling houses reached Paris.

A VETERAN CLERGYMAN PASSES AWAY

Archdeacon Newnham, of St. Stephen, Ends a Long Career in the Ministry.

St. Stephen, N. B., May 1.—A career of 62 years in the ministry of the Anglican Church, 54 of which were served in New Brunswick, closed tonight when Venerable Archdeacon O. S. Newnham, 84, died at his home following a paralytic stroke this afternoon. He had been active up to the time of the seizure.

Since 1878 Archdeacon Newnham's work lay in the Diocese of Fredericton. He had served as secretary of the Fredericton Diocesan Synod for 43 years and anticipated taking his usual place at the coming meeting of the Synod.

Obadiah Samuel Newnham was born on March 23, 1848, in Leamington, Warwickshire, England. For five years he read for holy orders under Canon Pope, British Consular Chaplain at Lisbon, Portugal. In 1875 he was ordained Deacon at Halifax and the next year was ordained Priest at Charlottetown, P. E. I.

To New Brunswick in 1878

From 1876 to 1878 he served as rector at New London, P. E. I., and then moved to Point Du Chene taking up his work in the Diocese of Fredericton. After rectorships at Saint John and Hampton he went to St. Stephen in 1888 and continued as rector of Christ Church there for 37 years, resigning from active pastoral duties in 1925. He was elevated as Canon in 1901 and made Archdeacon in 1907.

WILL FLOAT A LOTTERY LOAN

Berlin, May 12—The Government was empowered today by the Reichstag to float a lottery loan of an unlimited sum to finance unemployment relief schemes such as land settlement, road building and drainage.

INSPECTION MADE OF THE SMITH STORE

Supt. Salt and R. P. Hartley, Deputy Attorney General Pay Visit to Scene of Murder.

Bathurst, N. B., May 11—A minute inspection of the store of George Smith, 55-year-old South Tetagouche resident, who was murdered on the night of April 20, and the surrounding territory was made this afternoon by Superintendent E. C. P. Salt of J. Division, New Brunswick R. C. M. P. and R. P. Hartley, deputy attorney-general for the province.

Following examination of the store premises, Superintendent Salt and Mr. Hartley were in conference here with J. L. Ryan, clerk of the peace, and R. C. M. P. officers, after South Tetagouche by Inspector R. G. Battaney and Sergeant B. G. Peters, of the R. C. M. P.

When "Rufus" Pitre, one of the two brothers arrested at Beresford Saturday in connection with the murder, is brought before Magistrate John Lemarquand here tomorrow afternoon for the start of his preliminary hearing, it is expected that the Crown will ask to amend the information laid against him to the extent of changing of the name "Rufus" to "Norman", now reported to be his proper name. "Rufus" or "Norman" was brought before Magistrate Lemarquand yesterday, charged with the murder, and remanded to the Gloucester county jail here to await a preliminary hearing.

Wallace Pitre, the other brother arrested Saturday who, Sergeant Peters said early this week, had given a "statement" to the police, is still locked up in the town jail here. No charge has yet been laid against him. It is reported likely that Wallace will be transferred to the county jail tomorrow.

Following the hearing tomorrow afternoon which begins at 2 o'clock, it is expected that defence counsel, C. T. Richard, M. L. A., Bathurst, will ask for a week-end adjournment. It is thought probable that the widow of the murder victim and Wallace Pitre will be put on the witness stand tomorrow afternoon.
