

Bruening Cabinet Of Germany Tenders Its Resignation

Was Promptly Accepted by President Von Hindenberg — Chancellor Bruening Objected to Army Leaders Meddling in Politics and Had Delivered An Ultimatum.

BERLIN, May 30—The Cabinet of Chancellor Heinrich Bruening resigned today. President Paul Von Hindenburg accepted the resignation.

Bruening had delivered virtually an ultimatum to Von Hindenburg that army leaders stay within the army and refrain from politics, else he and his cabinet would resign.

Following a second conference today he tendered the resignation of the entire cabinet.

Chinese Were Defeated

HARBIN, Manchuria, May 30—Japanese military headquarters claimed today that a Chinese army commanded by General Ma Chan Shan, was defeated with casualties of 4,000 men killed and wounded, by combined Manchuko and Japanese troops.

PREPARED TO POOL RECEIPTS OF RAILWAYS

Receipts of British Line To Be Divided in Cases Where Competition Exists.

Montreal, Quebec, May 29— Announcement from London that the London, Midland and Scottish and Lodo and Northeastern Railway companies in Britain had completed an arrangement for the pooling of receipts "whatever there is competitive contact between" has been received here with considerable interest.

Asked if he would comment on this development in Britain, Sir Henry Thornton, chairman and president of the Canadian National Railways, said: "The proposed arrangement is highly intelligent and should result in material economy. With but negligible sacrifice in service, if any, it is a constructive step which may well be imitated where conditions permit. "There have been some general discussions along such lines in Canada and consideration is still being given to the subject, but no conclusion has yet been reached. So far the Canadian National Railways are concerned, the principle is one I have long advocated and one which the Canadian National Railways would be prepared to accept immediately. However, it should be remembered that this and kindred proposals are no doubt receiving the earnest attention of the Royal Commission on Transport. In view of this, I prefer to limit my opinion merely to a general statement."

Beatty's View

E. W. Beatty, president and chairman of the Canadian Pacific Railways, said:

"It would be noticed that the proposed British pooling of receipts affects passenger service only and is designed to reduce or eliminate certain phases of unprofitable competition. The British railways are faced with quite different local conditions than those existing on this side of the Atlantic, but this proposed action in a general way is quite along the line with that which the Canadian railways have already put into effect and which we are still further con-

PACKING HOUSE HEAD FALLS TO HIS DEATH

Chicago, May 29—Edward F. Swift, Sr., chairman of Swift & Company, plunged to death Saturday from the window of his sixth storey apartment. He was 64 years old.

Charles H. Swift, his brother and vice-chairman of the packing company, issued the brief statement:

"Edward F. Swift had been in his usual good health and spirits. He had been attending to business as usual. His affairs are in excellent condition."

The veteran packer had fallen from his window to the alley at the rear of the North State street apartment. Death was instantaneous.

He was the son of the pioneer packer, Gustavus Franklin Swift, founder of the firm that became the world's largest.

PREPARING FOR IMPERIAL CONFERENCE

The Federal Cabinet is Hard at Work But Not Giving Out Much Information.

Ottawa, May 29—The meetings of the Dominion Cabinet during the present week will be devoted to a very considerable extent to preparations for the Imperial Economic Conference. It is doubtful, however, whether much information of an official nature regarding these preparations will be made public.

So far the Government has been careful to keep much of its activities in this connection a secret.

It is suggested by those in close touch in the Ministry that the Government is anxious to avoid premature discussions of subjects to come up at the Conference. It is felt that long-range discussions over cable now might militate against the success of the conference when the delegates sit around the table and talk things over face to face.

Accordingly both in Parliament and outside, Prime Minister R. B. Bennett has disclosed very little as to the agenda or what Canada will propose. His colleagues have been quite as silent as the Prime Minister himself.

Silent Re Dispute

An example of the attitude of the Canadian Government has been in connection with the dispute between the British Government and President De Valera of the Irish Free State over the oath of allegiance. No word has come from the Canadian Government either one way or the other as to this.

"the constitution of the Irish Free State was modeled after the Canadian constitution," said one Government official, "and Canada has lived much longer under it than has the Irish State. It does seem reasonable that Canada might be very helpful in smoothing out this situation, and that is why, unlike some of the other dominions, Canada has taken no part in the controversy. She wants to be free to help if she can without prejudicing her usefulness by premature expression of opinion."

Another Reason

Another reason given, also unofficially, for the secrecy is that announcements as to what Canada hoped to accomplish might engender controversies within the Dominion. Some Canadian interests may be opposed to the Government's plans for the Conference, and if they were made public a series of log-rolling might be attempted.

Democrats in Dry Texas Have Demanded a Referendum

SPEAKER GARNER KEEPS SILENT

Socialist Party Comes Out In Favor of Repeal

Washington, D. C., May 30—Interest in political candidates is being overshadowed by prohibition developments.

Democrats in hitherto dry Texas have demanded a referendum after a bitter convention fight, though the "favorite son" to whom they awarded their 46 votes, Speaker John N. Garner, still maintains a Sphinx-like silence on this controversial issue.

Oregon has revealed a decidedly "wet trend" in its primary elections. New Jersey Republican leaders drafted a plank calling for repeal of the State Enforcement Act, to be fought over at the party convention next Tuesday.

The Socialist party went "wet," declaring for repeal after nominating Norman Thomas to be its standard bearer again. Senator Hiram Johnson, California, one of the outstanding Republican party leaders, declared for resubmission of the 18th Amendment after voting dry for years.

WILL HUNT FOR MAN BENEFITED BY PROHIBITION

New York, May 30—Like the mission of the Green cynic 2300 years ago, who, with lantern in hand, went through the world in search of an honest man, will be the expedition of the five young college graduates, members of the newly formed 'Prohibition Research Committee,' who will leave this city next Wednesday morning for a ten weeks' tour of the United States, with their avowed object the discovery of a single individual who has been benefitted or bettered as a result of the Eighteenth Amendment.

Conscious of the analogy, the organization held a brief ceremony yesterday afternoon before the Columbia University Library in which a bouquet of pling roses was placed on the engine hood of the "prohibition research bus" which will afford transportation for the five amateur sociologists, and the solemn words pronounced:

"I hereby do christen thee Diogenes."

Montreal Broker Found Dead in His Garage at Hudson

W. E. J. Luther, of the Firm of Craig, Luther & Irvine, Met Tragic Death at His Country Home; Body Found in Car and Garage Door Closed.

MONTREAL, Que., May 30—W. E. J. Luther, prominent Montreal broker, president of the Montreal Stock Exchange until new officers were elected a few weeks ago, and head of the brokerage firm of Craig, Luther & Irvine, was found dead this morning in his garage at his country estate in Hudson, Que., about forty miles from Montreal.

Mr. Luther drove into Montreal last evening with his two children, who were returning to school in Lennoxville, Que. He drove back alone to his home. His arrival was not noted. Early this morning when his servants found his bed had not been slept in they looked in the garage and found his body there in his car, the doors of the garage closed. He had apparently been dead several hours.

'Mr. Luther's policy in his capacity of president of the Stock Exchange has been under severe newspaper criticism for several weeks on account of the policy of the Exchange in keeping certain critical Canadian stocks pegged at prices considerably above their over-the-counter value.

WOULD-BE BANK ROBBERS TAKEN AT ST. LEONARD

Police Make Two Arrests and Recover Loot Stolen From the Fraser Companies.

Edmundston, N. B., May 27—Tipped off, they say, that the St. Leonard branch of the Provincial Bank was to be robbed, police ambushed Francis Charron and John Lynch, both of Edmundston, at St. Leonard shortly after 2 o'clock this morning, recovering at the same time a tank of acetylene, tank of oxygen, a blow torch and 65 feet of hose, identified today as property stolen from the Fraser Paper Ltd., plant at Madawaska, Me.

Charron was brought to the jail here and will be taken before Magistrate Hubert here tomorrow morning to answer to charges of attempted robbery, and having stolen goods in his possession, and also on a firearms charge. Police reported that they had found a revolver on Charron.

Lynch was jailed at St. Leonard. He will be brought here tomorrow for appearance before Magistrate Hubert. Charges to be laid against Lynch are attempted robbery and having stolen goods in his possession.

Police say they were told that an attempt to break into the bank vault was to be made, and a combined squad of R. C. M. P., C. N. R. officers and town police of Edmundston and St. Leonard secreted themselves near the bank.

The tanks, blow torch and hose stolen on May 24th, were found cached under a potato shed, alongside the C. P. R. tracks about 125 feet from the bank. Keeping themselves under cover, awaiting developments, the police dashed out to arrest Charron and Lynch, as the pair started to go under the shed, where the equipment was hidden early this morning.
