

Ulster is Pleased Over British Stand Against Free State

Some Uneasiness Felt Over Internal Developments Which Might Result in a Unity Front Against Northern Ireland—Aggressive Action by DeValera Not Anticipated.

BELFAST, Ireland, March 26—The firm British attitude toward the Republican administration of the Irish Free State was well received in Ulster.

There was some uneasiness regarding internal developments in the Free State which might result in a united front against Northern Ireland.

Aggressive action by DeValera to force a union with Ulster was not anticipated. The possibility of a renewal of activities by the Republican army was being watched closely by Ulster officials.

A French Proposal

LONDON, March 26—Great Britain has invited France, Italy and Germany to a conference here to consider the French proposal to create a customs union among the Danubian countries.

The conference will be held as early as possible in April, an official announcement said today.

WOULD HAVE CENTRALIZATION IN CONTROL

Report of Commission Would Have Board of Education Direct and Control All Units of Educational System.

One Provincial Board to direct and control all branches of Education in New Brunswick is the recommendation made by the Commission on Education and tabled in the Legislature this week.

The Commission points out that as new departments were introduced into the educational system of the province, control became more and more decentralized with the result that the educational system now consists of four units, separate and distinct under four different bodies, directed by four heads independent of one another: Academic, under the Chief Superintendent of Education; Vocational, under the Director of Vocational Education; Agricultural, under the Director of Elementary Agricultural Education and Physical Training, under the direction of the District Cadet Officer.

The Commission recommends that the Board of Education direct and control all these units, provided this can be done without additional cost to the Department of Education. Further that the Director of Vocational Education and the Director of Agricultural Elementary Education be responsible to the Chief Superintendent of Education and that Vocational and Agricultural Education be given representation on the Board of Education.

EXPECT THE LINDBERGH BABY TO BE RETURNED

Negotiations Now Said To Be Going On At Norfolk, Va.—Expect To Be Successful.

Norfolk, Va., March 25—Three prominent Norfolk citizens acting as intermediaries in an effort to restore the kidnapped Lindbergh baby to its parents, today veiled in utmost secrecy negotiations which at least one of them expects to be successful within the next few days.

New Jersey police reports that Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh himself placed "no specific significance" on the investigation failed to shake the belief of the Rev. H. Dobson-Peacock, one of the three, in the authenticity of the approaches made by "go-betweens."

"We not only hope but expect the completion of negotiations for the return of the baby within the next few days," Dean Dobson-Peacock said.

Loath to Talk

Rear Admiral Guy H. Burrage and John Hughes Curtis, the other two intermediaries, were loath to discuss their participation in the efforts to recover the child. Admiral Burrage said the average man could "put two and two together" concerning their visit to the Sourland Mountain estate of Colonel Lindbergh. Neither of the three would discuss what happened at the conference.

Dean Dobson-Peacock was emphatic in expressing his belief that the clue on which the three intermediaries were acting was well founded.

"Otherwise why should men from a certain class of society seek out three representative men in a community?" he asked.

He told his interviewers he had frequently expressed the hope that the child would be returned in broadcasts from Christ Episcopal Church and that the broadcasts certainly were heard over the Chesapeake Bay area.

He declined to answer questions as to significance of his remarks about the broadcasts over the bay area. Earlier he had said he did not know where the baby was and that he had not been informed the child was held captive on a boat in the bay.

MARY PAINTS A PICTURE OF HOLLYWOOD

New York, March 26—Mary Pickford painted a picture of Hollywood for the inmates of Welfare Island workhouse yesterday—a Hollywood where the stars go to bed at nine o'clock and are in perpetual fear of the wolf at the door.

Six hundred men, women and children, whites and negroes, snickered respectfully when "America's sweetheart" told them "I look on the depression and setbacks such as you boys and girls have had here as a privilege. Napoleon and Lincoln were made by hard times. You're getting spiritual exercise for your muscles."

Appearing at one of a series of Sunday afternoon lectures in the Sunday afternoon lectures in the cold, grey prison, Miss Pickford described Hollywood as she knew it, recounted some of her experiences in the history of the motion picture industry and answered many questions from her breathless listeners.

Oran, Algeria, March 26—Bossoutrot and Rossi, French army fliers, established a new world record for flight over a closed circuit today, when they landed after flying 10,600 kilometers (6,582.6 miles) in seventy-six hours and forty-three minutes.

The former record, 10,373 kilometers was established by Joseph Lebrun and Marcel Doret, last June.

Bossoutrot and Rossi flew a Bleriot monoplane named "Joseph Lebrun." It was equipped with a 500 h.p. Hispani motor. They carried fuel for 80 hours' flight.

BLIND PIANIST LOSES IN DRAW FOR A PRIZE

Warsaw, Poland, March 26—Two young pianists one of them blind, played so brilliantly in the quintennial Chopin musical competition here during the past two weeks the judges were unable to choose between them and the winner was decided by lot.

Alexander Uninski, 22, a Russian emigre living in Paris, won the draw from Imre Ungar, 23, a blind Hungarian. Eighteen countries were represented, including the United States who entry was Salvatore Sullo.

Great Discovery Made by Explorer In State of Texas

Dr. Frank Nicholson Claims to Have Found a Cave Twenty-five Million Years Old Filled With Blind Fish, White Bats and Milk-Colored Frogs.

SAN ANTONIO, Texas, March 26—Dr. Frank Nicholson, explorer of Carlsbad Cavern, last night announced discovery of a 25,000,000-year-old Texas cave filled with blind fish, white bats and milk-colored frogs.

The cave is twenty miles northwest of here on the old Spanish trail. Although its entrance has been known for years, aged residents believed it ended 500 feet from the mouth. Giant formations hanging from the ceiling gave the impression of a blank wall.

Dr. Nicholson and fellow explorers reached the far side of a lake at the foot of the formations by swimming under water. There they found a grotto a mile in length and leading to such a large underground lake that their electric torches could not pierce the darkness to the opposite bank.

A BIG WHALE DISRUPTED HARBOR TRAFFIC

Cuxhaven, Germany, March 26—A twelve thousand pound whale stayed into harbor here today from the North Sea and disrupted regular traffic until it was captured. A tug sent in pursuit of the whale, lowered a crew in a rob boat. Steel wires were tied to the whale's tail and it was dragged ashore.

TECHNICAL SPECIALISTS FOR FAR EAST

The youngster whose purported pranks long ago became world famous now is a sedate, almost scholarly-looking grandfather who wears pince-nez glasses and spats.

Probably no more decorous person than George Washington Peck—he who would put rubber hose in his father's macaroni—lives in the exclusive north shore suburb of Lake Forest.

Now retired, this only son of George W. Peck, author of "Peck's Bad Boy," spends a good share of his time writing—not reminiscences, but on sports subjects.

"With me it never has been a case of living up to a reputation," he says. "All I've had to do was live one down!"

He just laughs when people ask him if he was a terror in his youth.

MAY REORGANIZE FRENCH DEPT. OF THE P.N.S.

To meet the increasing demand for teachers who can teach both English and French, the Commission on Education in its report tabled in the Legislature this week declares that the Department of French at the Provincial Normal School should be so organized to admit student teachers who desire to qualify for teaching in schools where the children speak French and to admit others who may desire to obtain only an elementary knowledge of French.

The Commission further recommends that no Third Class Licenses be hereafter granted but that licenses of the Third Class already granted be continued in force. The teachers holding these Third Class licenses are to be allowed to teach in some of the less advanced schools on the recommendation of the Inspector with the approval of the Chief Superintendent of Education. It is further recommended that teachers holding the Third Class License from the former French Department who shall have passed the entrance examination for Second Class and shall be in attendance at the Normal School during, at least, the second term of the school year may be admitted to the final examinations for Second Class. It is also to be required that French, Grammar and Composition be subjects for the entrance examination for all candidates who wish to qualify for a special certificate for teaching the French language and also that French reading and French literature be required of student teachers who wish to acquire such certificate. The report points out that the last census of New Brunswick showed about 140,000 of the entire population of New Brunswick are of French origin and that the change in the Department of French at the Provincial Normal School is necessary to meet these changing conditions.

MAY DROP OUT OF THE LEAGUE

Tokio, March 26—Japanese decided today to withdraw from the League of Nations if the League attempted to exert undue pressure for the settlement of the Shanghai and Manchurian situation, a government spokesman said.
