Premier Bennett's Visit to England of Great Importance

Is Recognized by Friends and Foes Alike as One of the Most Powerful Statesmen in the Empire; English People Anxious to Honor Him for His Work at the Imperial Conference.

LONDON, Dec. 10—Prime Minister Bennett's visit to Britain is arousing unusual interest, not only because he is recognized by friends and foes alike as one of the most powerful statesmen in the Empire, but also because of the nature of his mission.

Social functions just after his arrival will be fully attended by representative gatherings. Everybody seems anxious to honor him in recognition of his outstanding work during the recent Imperial Economic Conference at Ottawa, in spite of the storm of criticism to which he was subjected by Liberal free traders.

Chief concern, however, is directed at the purpose of his visit. It comes at a time when Anglo-Canadian relations are being vitally affected by world adjustments and he will find his time fully occupied in developing these relations.

BUSINESS IS BECOMING MORE STABILIZED

Ottawa, Dec. 9—Increasing trade between Canada and Australia, increasing shipments of wheat to Great Britain and Continental Europe and increased stability in business operations in Canada are shown in the latest Government reports, says a weekly review prepared by the Department of Trade and Commerce.

The Dominion Bureau of Statistics in its monthly report on the business situation in Canada, the review observes, states that while business operations, after adjustment for seasonal tendencies, were at a slightly lower level in October than in the preceding month, "the relative stability of the current period presents a strong contrast with the marked declines in the same months of 1930 and 1931."

The report further states that "the pronounced downward trend has been replaced by a period in which greater resistance is manifested against reactionary tendencies."

PASTOR OF BRINGS SUIT HAS RESIGNED

Moncton, N. B., Dec. 9—Rev. George E. Whitehouse, D.D., pastor of the First Baptist church in this city, tendered his resignation of the charge at a business meeting of the congregation held last evening. The resignation is effective December 26.

Rev. Dr. Whitehouse said no definite plans for the future had been settled, but intimated that he would leave Moncton shortly after the resignation goes into effect, for California. He came to the pastorate of the First Baptist church on March 16 last, this being the second time he has been its pastor. More than a quarter of a century ago he was in charge of the church here and at that time founded the Christian Brotherhood, an organization which has been a great force for good in the work of the church. Both he and Mrs. Whitehouse have many friends who will learn of their impending departure with deep regret.

OFFICIAL SAID TO HAVE BEEN OVERWORKED

Washington, D.C., Dec. 9—Senator John Blaine, Wisconsin Republican, called to the attention of the United States Senate today reports that an employee of that body had gone to the press gallery and threatened a newspaperman with a gun.

A policeman had been stationed at the entrance to the senate press gallery, after word passed around that Charles F. Pace, financial clerk of the Senate, had entered the gallery and flourished a revolver.

Friends of Pace attributed the act to overwork. He has been doing two men's work for months. He entered the gallery today and asked for Chas. Stevenson who wrote a magazine article recently relating to expenditures by Senate committees.

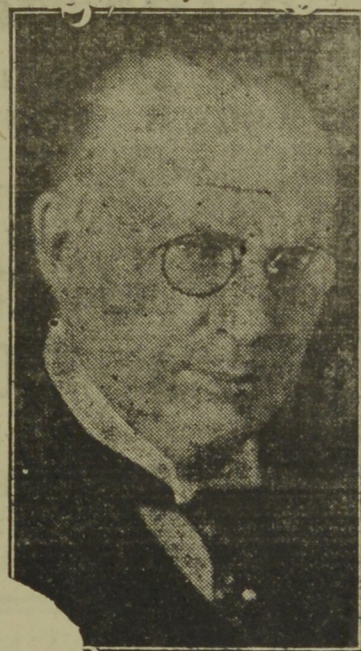
BIG SHIPMENT OF SMELTS FROM PICTOU, N. S.

Pictou, N. S., Dec. 9—Smelts to the amount of 120,000 pounds were handed through Pictou during the month of November last, according to the National Resources Dept. of the C. N. Railways, for which the fishermen received six cents a pound. During the first week in December exceptionally heavy catches were made. The greater portion of these smelts went forward to the United States, chiefly New York, but that market now shows a sign of weakening. A considerable quantity of these smelts were from the Magdalen Islands, in the Gulf of St. Lawrence. A good night's catch may run from five hundred to one thousand pounds of smelts per fisherman.

Fewer Excursionists

The Canadian Pacific Railway special shunted Montreal-ward last night with a total of 52 passengers from this city, about half as many as made the same trip during the summer months. Those who went are evidently bent on a few days Christmas shopping in Montreal. The special excursion train will return on Tuesday.

GERMANY'S NEW CHANCELLOR IN WIN COLUMN

The Reichstag Adjourns and Will Not Meet Again Until Next January.

Berlin, Dec. 9—Chancellor Kurt von Schleicher eliminated the possibility of a parliamentary crisis today by prevailing on the Reichstag to adjourn subject to call by Speaker Hermann Wilhelm Goering.

This political victory, the first scored by the Chancellor since he became head of the government, paved the way for a "winter armistice," since the Reichstag will not meet again until at least late in January. In the meantime the Cabinet will be able to rule the country free of the constant threat of a legislative defeat.

Nazis Splits

The success of the Chancellor shared interest with indications of a split in the high councils of Adolph Hitler's National Socialist party. Gregor Strasser, known as the Nazi "Crown Prince," resigned as national party organizer.

In the lobbies of the Reichstag it was reported that Chancellor von Schleicher had played a part in the difficulties of the Nazis. Exactly what efforts he had made to split the Hitlerite opposition were not definitely known, but one rumor was he had offered a Cabinet post to Herr Strasser.

Communists and other non-confidence motions against the von Schleicher government were successfully tabled before the Reichstag adjourned.

No Policy Declared

Contrary to custom, the Chancellor presented no declaration of policy in behalf of the Cabinet. He and his ministerial colleagues did not even appear on the Cabinet benches.

At today's Reichstag session the members approved a bill recinding certain features of the economic emergency decrees promulgated when Franz von Papen was Chancellor. This action affected decree provisions which had lessened the government's protection of disabled veterans and widows, orphans and wage earners of the lowest scale.

WORLD'S MOST POWERFUL CAR IS COMPLETED

Will Be Used In Florida
By Sir Malcolm
Campbell

WILL TRY FOR NEW SPEED MARK

Work of Building Racer
Carried On In Great
Secrecy

London, Dec. 10—The most powerful motor car the world has ever known has been launched from a small workshop on Brooklands track, Weybridge.

It is the new Bluebird, in which Sir Malcolm Campbell will make a fresh attempt on the world's land speed record late in January or early in February, probably at Daytona, Florida.

Some of the finest craftsmen in Britain have been working on the car for nine months. This work has been carried on in the greatest secrecy in order that rivals should not know the plans. So immense is the new Bluebird, part of the factory had to be removed to extricate it. The car is being transferred under guard to London to have its streamlined shell fitted.

Even the smallest nut has been cut and hand-made from the finest British steel, and checked by the most wonderful precision instruments in the world. In its new form Bluebird weighs no less than 4½ tons. Its new engine is the Schneider Trophy type Rolls-Royce It develops nearly 2,500 horsepower, or nearly 1,000 more horsepower than Sir Malcolm had available when he set up the last world's record of 253.9 miles per hour. In other words, it exceeds by 1,00 horsepower the previous most powerful car in the world.

What will happen when this tremendous power is let loose through the driving wheels is more or less theoretical. It is estimated that the engine should be capable of hurling this 4½ ton mass of machinery over the sands at 300 miles per hour, or five miles a minute.

THE LOBSTER INDUSTRY IMPORTANT

Moncton, N. B., Dec. 9—Fisheries statistics recently released show that live lobsters to the amount of 3,736,700 pounds, valued at \$155,267, were brought into Westmorland county and cleared through Point Du Chene and Shediac during the season, August 16 to October 16, 1932, according to the natural resources department of the Canadian National Railways. The greater quantity were for the United States market, although a considerable quantity went to Montreal. During the same period 1,866,400 pounds of lobsters, equivalent to 9,332 cases, 48 cans, 200 pounds to a cases, were canned.

France will Pay The U. S. on Dec. 15 With Proviso

Will Insist on the Great Republic Agreeing to Participate in a World Debt Conference—Resolution Prepared for Submission to the Chamber of Deputies.

PARIS, Dec. 10—France will make her \$20,000,000 war debt payment to the United States Dec. 15th, only if the United States agrees before hand to participate in a world debt conference, according to the draft of a debt's resolution completed today for submission to parliamentary on Monday.

Meanwhile France is prepared to make the payment, Minister of Finance Louis Germain-Martin told the United Press. The payment will be made from the dollar balance held by the Bank of France in New York, plus the necessary short-term credits to be obtained from American banks.

CONGRESSMAN TELLS BREWERS TO GET OUT

Washington, Dec. 9—Demand that distillers and brewers "get out and stay out of Washington," was flung to them today by Representative Fiorenzo Loguardia of New York before Ways and Means Committee of the United States House of Representatives in what he declared as a "warning" against abuses that might defeat the repeal of the 18th Amendment.

The fiery Republican anti-prohibitionist stalked into the committee room and injected into the hearings on the Democratic beer bill what he termed an "unpleasant but truthful statement."

"I want to advise the wets that if this bill becomes law and abuses follow, the 18th amendment will never be repealed."

BIG EXODUS OF CANADIANS TO EUROPE

Halifax, N. S., Dec. 9—The largest Christmas travel to Europe to arrive at Halifax this season was brought in by the Ocean Limited of the Canadian National Railways last night. Four extra tourist cars were attached to accommodate the party, some of whom will sail on the Swedish-American liner Gripsholm, and others on the North German Lloyd liner Berlin. There was a sprinkling from various European countries, some bound for Sweden, others to Germany, Denmark, etc. Great Britain was also presented in the lineup of passengers. Some were from Western Canada. One Old Countryman operates a farm in the Oakanagan Valley, British Columbia. He stated if he can find something to do in England he will not return.

A FERRETT KILLED HENS

Grimbsy, Ont., Dec. 10—A district farmer has learned something—and it was expensive schooling. Someone told him a ferret would kill rats. His henhouse was infested with rats, so he put the ferret in there and closed the door. A few minutes later he found six dead hens and a ferret which seemed to have a satisfied smile.

BROADCAST POWER WITHOUT USE OF WIRES

Kitchener, Ont., Dec. 9—Two years of experimenting have resulted in a method to transmit electric power long distances without wires, 23-year-old Frank Fedy said here today.

Fedy, a former insurance agent, said he demonstrated his equipment for engineers in Toronto this week and that his apparatus functioned perfectly. Power broadcast from his transmitting station was picked up two blocks distant, he said. An engineer who came to Kitchener from Toronto yesterday admitted the experiment showed that Fedy "has something" and that engineers are excited and interested.

The young inventor is going to Montreal to demonstrate his outfit there before divulging the secret of its workings.

MONCTON HOTEL MAN LEAVES FOR NIAGARA

Moncton, Dec. 9—E. V. McGuire, manager of the Hotel Brunswick here since Dec. 1, 1930, left today for Niagara Falls, Ont., where he will assume the management of the new General Brock hotel. He left this afternoon by car for the Ontario city via Saint John and Boston.

A. E. Cormier, a former Moncton young man, formerly on the staff of the Admiral Beatty Hotel, Saint John, will take charge of the local hotel, which is operated by Associated Canadian Hotels. Mr. Cormier comes here from the William Pitt Hotel, Chatham, Ont.
