THE CASE OF FALLIS, EX-M. P. P.

The eyes of all Canada are centred on the county of Peel, Ontario, where a by-election for the Local Legislature will be held on February 24th. The Conservative candidate is Mr. J. R. Fallis, ex-M. P. P., who was forced to resign his seat because of disclosures made before Commissioner Sir Chas. Davidson. It was shown that Fallis had acted as a middleman in the sale of horses to the Government and had gathered in a profit of several thousand dollars. When caught with the goods, he resigned his seat and handed over the money which he stole from the Government to an overseas battalion. He was then whitewashed and renominated by the Conservative county, and is now asking the electors to pass judgment upon his conduct.

Discussing the case of this convicted hoodler, the Toronto Globe says:

"The electors of the county of Peel are now on trial before the world. They cannot evade the world's judgment. By their marking of the ballots in the bye-election their own personal integrity will be registered, and the moral standing of their constituency, its place in the scale of decent citizenship, will be fixed before the whole of Canada. The offence of Fallis is condemned already, and no vote can possibly make his name clean or his conscience pure. His impudence, in offering himself for re-election to the Ontario Legislature, proves that he is morally callous as well as unpatriotic. But more than that; by compelling an election, with himself and his war-time plunderings as the issue, he deliberately and inexorably shifts the spotlight of scrutiny from himself, whose guilt is known and admitted, to the electors, whom he insolently asks to vote themselves into his uncondoned condemnation. The first problem for Peel, therefore, is not Fallis, but itself.

"This is indeed a testing time for every elector, Conservative, Liberal or Independent, in that constituency. As he marks his ballot so does he proclaim himself as being for or against the war-grafters and public plunderers whose loathsome get-rich-quick trafficking in Canada's war necessities has scandalized the very name of Canada before the world. The man who campaigns for Fallis, or votes for him, or even neglects to vote against him, is to that degree writing himself down in moral character cheek by jowl with the profiteer uncovered in the Davidson investigation. If the electors regard themselves as decent, law-abiding, self-respecting citizens, they will deny the public impeachment of their honor which the very nomination of Fallis involves."

Peel will have the distinction of being the first county in Canada to pass judgment on war-time scandals. If the people re-elect Fallis, with his shady record, the door shall have been opened for Dewitt Foster and W. F. Garland to re-enter Parliament.

Fredericton lost a good citizen and the province one of its most noted educationalists in the death on Saturday of Dr. William Crockett. A native of Scotland, he came to New Brunswick when a young man and for over half a century was closely identified with educational work. As grammar school teacher, principal of the Normal School, Chief Superintendent of Education, he displayed great zeal and ability, and did much to bring our educational system up to its present high state of efficiency. Many men who have achieved prominence in the public and professional life of this province received their early training at the hands of Dr. Crockett, and do not hesitate to give much of the credit for their success to his wise counsel and instruction.

Advices from over north are to the effect that Stewart and Robichaud, the Gloucester exponents of honest and business like government, will be right on hand to take their seats when the

Legislature opens next week. They are said to be laying the blame for their troubles at the door of Hon. John Morrissey, and will join with other disgruntled members in an effort to square accounts with "Honest John."

Col. E. M. House, close friend of President Wilson, who has been on a tour of European capitals, was met by a whole platoon of reporters on his arrival in London from Berlin last week. He received the reporters very courteously, but neatly dodged all of the questions aimed at him. As the London Express puts it, "Colonel House has mastered the delicate art of saying nothing."

RECRUITING MEETING SHOWED FALLING ATTENDANCE

Rev. Father Lockary and Very Rev. Dean Neales Were the Speakers.

The series of recruiting meetings in the City Opera House on Sunday nights was continued last night, Dr. F. W. Barbour being chairman and the speakers being Very Rev. Dean Neales and Hon. Capt. the Rev. Father Lockary, chaplain of the 36th Field Battery. Both speakers were in excellent form and were heard with attention. Rev. Father Lockary reviewed the actions of the Germans towards the countries of Europe that they had over-run and stated that Canada must expect similar treatment in the event of Germany overcoming Britain and the other Allies. He appealed for recruits on that ground.

Very Rev. Dean Neales made his appeal chiefly on the ground that more troops were needed to bring the war to a successful conclusion and that those men already in the trenches deserved the support of those who had not yet enlisted. Dean Neales particularly urged mothers not to discourage their sons from enlisting, but to let them go freely. The man who did not go, in after years would have the stigma of cowardice attached to his name and would have to bear the name of "The Stay-at-Home Ranger."

The attendance at the meeting was what it should have been, many vacant seats being observable. It was noticeable that the majority of those present were women. During the meeting it was necessary for the chairman, Dr. Barbour, to call for better order on the part of some young men in the audience.

Can Photograph In Natural Colors

Rome, Feb. 13—Via Paris, Feb. 13—What is hailed here as an important scientific discovery, is a method of photography reproducing natural colors, found, after eight years of experimenting, by the Pineschi Brothers and by Signor Santori. These men say that they have solved in a satisfactory way, a problem on which scientists have been working in many countries and that important commercial results are to be expected from the exploitation of their discovery for the purpose of moving picture exhibitions.

Complete tests are soon to be made by interested scientists to determine the full scope of the discovery.

Jealous The Cause Of Lindsay's Crime

Calais, Feb. 13—Details of a thrilling and exceptionally cruel attempt at murder at Kossuth Plantation, a little settlement deep in the Maine woods, were made public Sunday by Sheriff Woodman and County Attorney Dudley, when they returned from the preliminary hearing of Howard A. Lindsay in Topsheld.

Lindsay was charged with having slashed his wife with a razor—not an axe, as stated in the first report. He pleaded guilty, failed to furnish bail in the sum of \$5,000 and was taken to Machias jail, where he will await the action of the grand jury.

Mrs. Lindsay is still in Kossuth Plantation and it is said she will recover. Physicians took twenty-three stitches in one of her wounds and fifteen in another.
