The eyes of all Canada are centred on the county of Peel, Ontario, where a by-election for the Local Legislature will be held on February 24th. The Conservative candidate is Mr. J. R. Fallis, ex-M. P. P., who was forced to resign his seat because of disclosures made before Commissioner Sir Chas Davidson. It was shown that Fallis had acted as a middleman in the sale of horses to the Government and had gathered in a profit of several thousand dollars. When caught with the goods, he resigned his seat and hand ed over the money which he stole from the Government to an overseas ba talion. He was then whitewashed and renominated by the Conservative con county, and is now asking the elect ors to pass judgment upon his cor
