DR. WILLIAM CROCKET PASSED AWAY ON SATURDAY EVENING

Deceased Was For Over Half a Century Prominent In the Educational Life of the Province--Was a Native of Scotland.

William Crocket, M.A., LL.D., died at his home in this city Saturday night from pneumonia, which developed from a gripe. The deceased was in his eighty-fourth year. The funeral will take place at 2.30 Tuesday afternoon with service at St. Paul's Presbyterian church at three o'clock. Interment will be made at the Rural cemetery.

Mr. Crocket was married to Miss Marion Caldwell, a sister of William Caldwell, M.P. for Testigouche, and to Dr. and Mrs. Crocket eleven children were born, of whom two died. One, a boy, Thomas, died in infancy, while a daughter, Marion, passed away a few years ago at her home in Fredericton. There survives James H. Crocket, managing editor of The Gleaner; Dr. William C. Crocket, ex-mayor and one of Fredericton's most eminent physicians; Allan A. Crocket, mechanical engineer of San Francisco; Charles S. O. Crocket, proprietor of The Campbellton Tribune; Oswald S. Crocket of Fredericton, justice of the Supreme Court of New Brunswick and for some years representative of York county in the house of commons; A. Pierce Crocket, M.D., of St. John; Octavius Crocket of the general staff of the I. C. R. at Moncton; Miss Decemia Crocket, living with her parents in Fredericton, and Mrs. H. Harper Smith of Toronto, at present in Fredericton. His widow also survives.

Principal William Crocket, who celebrated his eighty-third birthday in May of last year, was born at Brechin, Scotland, in 1832, and after the ordinary school education, entered Aberdeen University, from which he graduated in due course. In 1861, at

the age of eighteen, he came to New Brunswick, having been offered the position of principal of the Superior School at Campbellton. Since that time Mr. Crocket's life had been practically entirely devoted to work along educational lines, and in that sphere he had for many years played a prominent part. From Campbellton Mr. Crocket went to the principalship of the Chatham Academy in 1876 and some years later removed to Fredericton, where he became principal of the Normal School. This step was followed by his appointment to the position of superintendent of education for New Brunswick in 1883 and on his retirement from this office in 1891 Dr. Crocket engaged as professor of classics in Morin College, Quebec. Subsequently, he resigned from that staff, and returned to the principalship of the Normal School in 1901, which office he held at the time of his retirement from active service in 1904. During the King administration, Dr. Crocket was called upon to frame the free school bill, which became the point of contention in the subsequent provincial campaign, and on which was based the policy of the government in that memorable contest.

The William Crocket Scholarship at the University of New Brunswick for the highest marks in classics (\$100 per year), which was established three years ago, is a fitting recognition of the valuable services rendered by Principal Crocket to the cause of education in this province.

The deceased was an elder of St. Paul's Presbyterian church and during the greater part of his life had been a resident of Fredericton.

TRIED TO POISON BANQUET GUESTS

(Canadian Press.) Chicago, Feb. 14.—First Deputy Superintendent of Police Schetler said today that he expected the arrest in a short time of Jean Crones, assistant chef at the University Club, who is suspected of putting poison in the soup served at a dinner given Thursday night to Archbishop Mundelein.

Empty poison bottles and wrappers found in the kitchen of the University Club, verified by a quantitative analysis of the soup served at the banquet, indicated that the alleged poisoner made scientific calculations, according to the authorities, to kill every guest at the banquet. The club officials said it was understood covers were to be laid for 200 guests, but at the last moment invitations were issued for 100 more.

Two hundred and ninety-six in all were present. That thinned down the poison dose to about three-fifths of the minimum fatal dose. To this the officers attribute the escape from serious illness of those taken sick at the banquet.

WANT A MORE STRINGENT BLOCKADE

London, Feb. 14.—A largely attended meeting for the purpose of urging the government to establish an influential blockade against the Central Powers was held in London this afternoon. Baron Devonport, chairman of the port authority of London, presided.

The discussion hinged on the following resolution: "That this meeting of citizens of London, viewing with grave alarm the enormous quantity of commodities reaching the enemy by way of the North Sea, calls upon His Majesty's government to give our navy freedom to exercise fuller and more effective use of our sea power in the war."

COLDEST OF SEASON.

Last night was the coldest of the winter. At the City Pumping Station the lowest temperature was twenty-six degrees below zero. The official temperature which was taken at the University of New Brunswick, was twenty degrees below. When asked by The Mail why the official temperature usually was higher than that recorded elsewhere in the city, Chancellors Jones of the U.N.B., said that according to government regulations the thermometer at the University was sheltered in a double lattice.

GERMAN PLOTTER TO BE ARRAIGNED

San Francisco, Feb. 14.—Franz Bopp, German consul general at this port, who was indicted by the Federal grand jury last week on charges of violation of United States neutrality, must appear in court tomorrow to be arraigned along with members of his official family and others, according to a decision announced today by United States District Attorney Thomas. "The law is the law for all indicted men alike," was the decision of the Federal attorney.

DISCUSSION ON DIVORCE TODAY

Ottawa, Feb. 14.—Parliament this afternoon will have a discussion on the question of divorce.

Mr. W. B. Northrup's resolution is to be considered. Mr. Northrup takes the position that as the law now stands it works injustice to the poor man or woman, who is unable to bear the expense of a divorce secured through parliamentary channels. He wants the powers of the courts extended so that they may deal with divorce cases as well as ordinary actions.

PAIR OF TWINS.

A pair of twins, a boy and a girl, arrived early Sunday morning at the home of Mr. Frank Hyde, Gibson. Twins and mother are doing well.

San Diego, Calif., Feb. 14.—Official announcement that Floyd Smith, civilian aviator, had broken the world's hidroaeroplane record for pilot and two passengers, when he ascended 9,544 feet here Friday, was made today by Captain Arthur S. Cowan, chief of the Signal Corps Aviation School, United States Army, who represented the Aero Club of America at the flight.

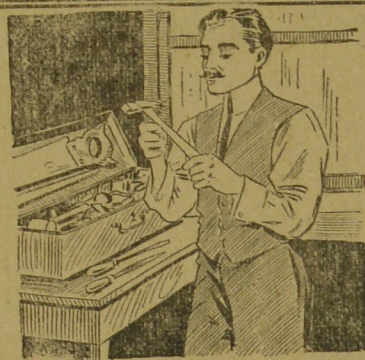
