### GUARD-OF-HONOR FOR HOUSE-OPENING FROM C. COMPANY

104th Battalion Band Will Furnish Music--Orders Received From Halifax By Mr. J. B. Dickson, Private Secretary

### 36TH BATTERY WILL NOT GET AWAY TILL LATE IN MONTH

Instructions From Halifax Received Today--Artillery Will Sleep in Railway Cars Night Before Leaving.

Orders for the military portion of the ceremonial at the opening of the Legislature on Thursday, February 24, have been received from 6th Divisional Headquarters, Halifax, by Mr. J. Bacon Dickson, private secretary to His Honor the Lieutenant Governor. As was expected, overseas troops will furnish the guard-of-honor.

According to the orders, the guard-of-honor will be composed of one captain, two subalterns and one hundred rank and file. The detail will be furnished by C Company, 104th Battalion, now in quarters here. The band for the opening will be the 104th Battalion Band, which will come here from Sussex.

Contrary to the custom for a number of years past, there will be no artillery salute fired at the opening of the house. This is probably because no artillery unit will be available to furnish a firing party.

It is probable that His Honor will be attended on the floor of the House by a large number of officers of overseas units now in the province. Lt. Col. F. B. Black, M.P.P., of Sackville who has been in Flanders with the 6th Mounted Rifles, is on his way home in command of a party of invalids. He is expected to be present during a part of the session.

### MORE RETURNED SOLDIERS.

Three more returned soldiers whose homes are in St. Stephen, have arrived here to take places on the guard at the provincial parliament buildings. They are Privates McWha, Odell and Ryder. They will go on duty tonight.

Instructions received this morning from Halifax have made an alteration in the date of departure of the 36th Field Battery from Fredericton, according to previous instructions, the departure of the Battery was to be during the present week but according to those received this morning by Major Crowe, the officer commanding, this unit will not get away until late in February.

Arrangements probably will be made for a good send-off for the artillery with the presentation of a civic address and the Fredericton Brass Band to play the troops from the barracks to the train. The arrangements made for entraining the troops however, will interfere somewhat with this as it is the intention to have the Battery sleep in railway cars the night before the departure and leave before daylight in the morning.

Four officers, eight sergeants and one hundred and twenty of other ranks are to comprise the Battery which will go away. It is not yet known what disposition will be made of the officers and men who will remain behind.

Lieut. A. S. Donald, lately an attached officer of the 36th Battery, is now with the 11th Ammunition Column in Halifax.
