REPORT OF NAVAL FIGHT NEAR BERMUDA

Hamilton, Bermuda, Feb. 9.—If a
battle has taken place between the
British armored cruiser Drake and the
German cruiser Roon, off Bermuda,
nothing is known here of the occur-
rence. Numerous inquiries have failed
to confirm the report that the Drake
attacked and captured the Roon. The
vessels have not reached this port, and
so far as can be learned, no advices
have been received at Hamilton to in-
dicate that the Drake has taken a prize
into any other port.

New York, Feb. 9.—Advices receiv-
ed here today assert that the German
warship Roon, alleged to be the cap-
tor of the Appam, has been captured
by the British armored cruiser Drake
after a three hour fight, 200 miles east-
northeast of Bermuda, according to a
story printed by the New York Even-
ing Globe.

The capture of the Roon is said by
the Globe to have been followed by
the seizure of two merchantmen which
were flying the German flag, and one
of which was armed.

The story is contained in a message
which the Globe states it received in
code from a reliable source in Ber-
muda. The message follows:

"Drake here today, towing Roon.
Took her 200 knots east-northeast of
Bermuda, three hours running fight.
Lost Danforth, eighteen men. Her
losses about one-third. Struck as we
came abeam. Two merchantmen with
her, one armed. Took both. Brought
here. Seagrave, on sighting Roon,
said: 'Please God, today I will avenge
Cradock.' Roon badly knocked about
by 9.2. Thirty officers and 718 men
taken in the three prizes."

The Seagrave mentioned in the mes-
sage is supposed to be Captain Sea-
grave, who was with Admiral Cradock
when the latter went down with his
flagship, the Good Hope, which was
sunk in an engagement with a Ger-
man squadron off Chile. There is no
Danforth among the officers in the
British navy list.

The British Embassy today received
advices from British agents in New
York that a man living on Staten Is-
land, whose name was not transmit-
ted, had received a private despatch
from Bermuda saying the British cru-
iser Drake had taken the German cru-
iser Roon and some German ships.

The Embassy had no further ad-
vices.

Funeral Of Late Mrs. George V. Dibblee

The funeral of the late Mrs. George
Yonge Dibblee took place this after-
noon and was largely attended. A
private service took place at Christ-
church Cathedral at 10.30 o'clock
this morning. The public service
took place at 2.30. Very Rev. Dean
Neales officiating. After the service
the remains were taken to Nashwaak-
sis, where interment was made in St.
John's churchyard.

H. E. BARKER ARREST- ED AND REMANDED

Harold E. Barker, the young man
who played a "con" game on a number
of Fredericton merchants recently,
was arrested at Long's Creek Station
on the St. John & Quebec Railway,
yesterday afternoon by Constable C.
Camp, of this city. He appeared in
the police court this morning before
Sitting Magistrate J. W. McCready,
who remanded him until ten o'clock
Saturday morning. The charge is is-
suing a false cheque. The young man
gave his name as Harold E. Barker,
and was told that if he desired to se-
cure counsel he could so notify the
authorities.

Barker said he was willing at once
to go on with the examination, but the
court decided on a remand.

Barker, after leaving his rented flat
on Tuesday morning, walked to Mouth
Kewick. There he spent the night at
the home of a lady named Mrs. Pick-
ard, passing himself off as a track in-
spector and saying that he would pay
for his board when he returned on
Thursday.

Yesterday he walked through Kes-
wick Ridge to Macinac, where he
crossed the St. John river, evidently
intending to take a train on the St.
John & Quebec Railway.

Mrs. E. O. Macdonald, of this city,
saw Barker on the station platform
at Mouth of Kewick, and recognized
him. She telephoned the fact to Fre-
dericton. In the afternoon Constable
Camp and Mr. Charles H. Edgecombe
started for Keswick with a team of
horses and a warrant.

From Keswick they traced their man
to Long's Creek. The arrest took place
in the railway station, and Barker
wept bitterly. The man evidently had
nothing to eat during the day. On
arriving in Fredericton his captors
bought him his supper and lodged him
in the county gaol.

In addition to the merchants in the
city from whom he obtained goods
on false pretenses, Barker bought
wood from a Douglas farmer in the
same way and also engaged a house-
keeper. Several bogus checks on the
Bank of Nova Scotia issued by the
man are in the city.

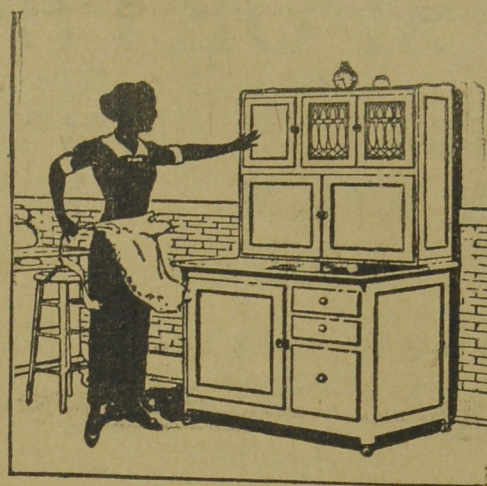

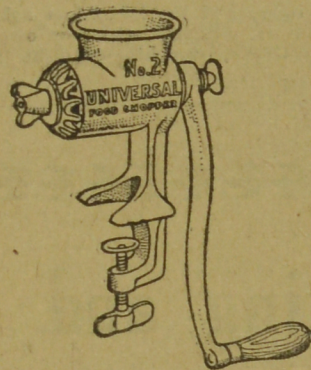
