DETROIT SIGNS

MOON, TWO YEARS AGO
CLUBHOUSE BOY

New Player is Only Eight-
teen--A Left-Handed
Thrower and Batter--
Plays first base position.

Philadelphia, Feb. 8.—Fred Moore, who two years ago was the clubhouse boy of the Athletics, has been signed by Detroit and has been instructed to join the club in the south next month. Moore is only eighteen years old, but in the last two seasons, after being sent to the Central Association by Connie Mack, he developed so rapidly that the Tigers signed him upon the recommendation of Tom Turner, the New England League pitcher, who is now doing scout duty. He is a first baseman and bats and throws left-handed.

When the Athletics were winding up the series with Washington in 1914, some one suggested that Moore be given a chance to get into the game against Griffiths' team. It started as a joke but he played in three games and batted against Bentley, Shaw, Ayres and Harper, hitting for .500.

ONE-ARMED PLAYER

IS A MARVEL

Dick Hooper of Texas University, has only one arm, but is one of the best college baseball players in the country. He is captain of his team.

Hooper is an outfielder. He wears a glove on his right hand, the only one he has.

After he catches a ball he tosses it into the air and slaps the glove under what is left of his left arm. Then he grabs the ball out of the air and then throws it.

Hooper goes through the whole operation with such speed he can get a ball started toward the diamond, after making a catch, almost as quickly as an outfielder with two hands.

Last season Hooper threw out ten runners at the plate. He had 105 chances in the field and did not make an error.

He is a good barter. He uses a short, thick bat. Last season he hit safely in sixteen consecutive games, making a better record than most of the team.

This is Hooper's last year at Texas University. He plans to enter Dartmouth next year.

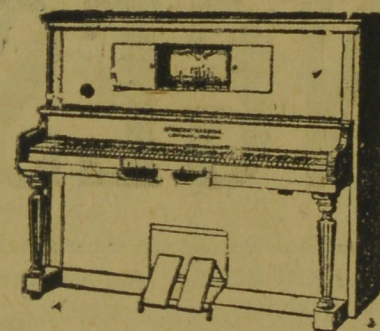
