SOME NEW RECIPES

Chicken Pie.

Disjoint and clean the fowl as for a fricassee, removing as much skin as can be easily pulled off. Cover with boiling water, add a scant teaspoonful of salt and simmer gently until the meat is sufficiently tender to remove the larger bones, then set aside until cool. Some like to mix with the chicken meat a little boiled lean ham finely diced, but this is optional. Make a rich biscuit or pie crust and with it line a deep dish. Arrange the meat in this, moistening with some of the chicken gravy, then cover with a top crust. Bake in a moderate oven.

Popovers.

One cup of flour, 1 cup of milk, 1/2 teaspoon of salt, 2 eggs. Put

the flour and salt into a bowl, add the eggs, unbeaten, and add the milk, gradually, beating well. Pour into heated, greased muffin pans and bake half an hour in a hot oven.

Lobster Salad.

Cut meats into long, thin strips, then into dice. Place into bowl and season; to one cold boiled lobster allow four teaspoons vinegar, two tablespoons oil and a little salt and pepper. Add one tablespoon chopped olives; half a bunch chopped celery; mix with mayonnaise and serve on lettuce leaves. Garnish with mayonnaise and coral from the lobster. If desired a half cup sweet cream whipped to a froth may be added just before serving.

Johnny Cake.

Take 1 cup of yellow cornmeal,

1-2 cup of wheat flour, add 3 tablespoons of sugar, 2 tablespoons of melted butter, 1 egg, little salt, a cup of sour milk and a teaspoon of soda dissolved in the milk,

Lemon Sauce.

One cup sugar, 2 tablespoons of flour, 2 cups boiling water, rind and juice of 1 lemon, 2 tablespoons butter. Mix the flour and sugar well together, then slowly add the boiling water, stirring constantly. Cook for 15 minutes, stirring all the time. Add the rind and juice of the lemon, then the butter, and stir until the butter is melted. If the sauce is too thick, thin it with boiling water. Serve at once.

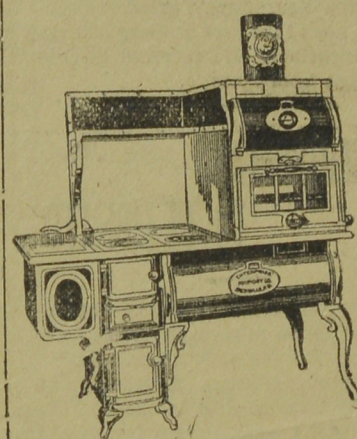

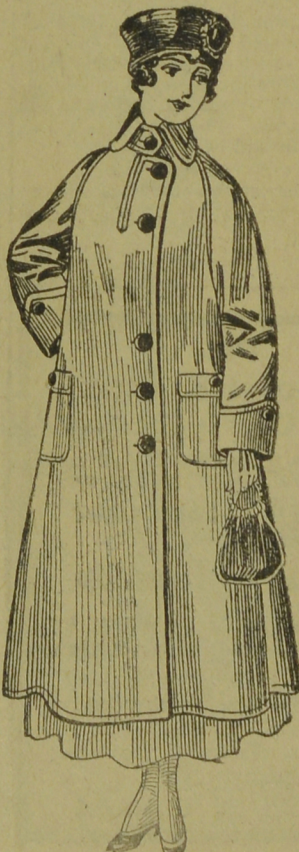

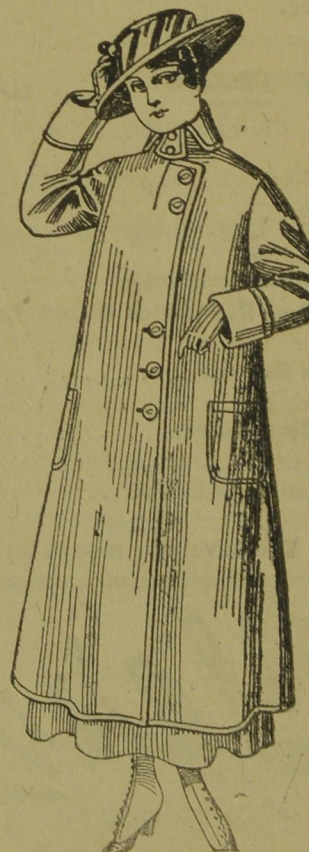
