in St. John Che. The vacancy in Kent was caused by the resignation of Col. Sheridan, w. ho. convicted of wrong-doing by Royal Commissioner Chandler, was appointed to a Federal Government office. The vacancy in Albert was caused by the death of Hon. W. B. Dickson, late Speaker of the House. The vacancy in Gloucester was caused by the resignation of Mr. A. J. H. Stewart, convicted of grafting by Royal Commissioner Chandler. The two vacancies in St. John city were caused by the appointment of Hon. John E. Wilson and Mr. C. B. Lockhart to Federal Government offices. The latest vacancy to occur is in Westmorland, Hon. P. G. Mahoney, one of the members for that county, having accepted the portfolio of Public Works vacated by Hon. John Morrissy, which necesitates his seeking re-election. Advices from Westmorland are to the effect that Hon. Mr. Mahoney will meet with strenuous opposition. 
