MEREDITH MAY
GO AFTER RECORD
FOR QUARTER-MILE

Maxey Long Holds Title Now with Time of Forty Seven Seconds--Proposed Race on Boards.

"Ted" Meredith has a chance to go after the quarter-mile straightway record of 47s., held by Maxey Long, just at a time when he should be at his top speed, but under peculiar conditions. On Sunday, June 4, eight days after the intercollegiate championships in the Harvard Stadium, the United German-American and Austro-American Societies will hold a carnival of sport at the Sheephead Bay Speedway, and a scratch quarter mile run over the straightway course will be one of the chief attractions. Meredith will be invited to run with other noted middle-distance men. The odd thing about the race will be that it will be run on boards, whereas Long ran on the Guttenburg dirt race track. Hoer Baker and others have tried the Sheephead Bay track and Baker is confident it is very fast for the runners. He is going to make a racing test of its speed at the time of the Military Athletic League sports in an 880-yard race, also straightaway. These sports are billed for May 20 to 27.

McAULIFFE MET
BUT ONE MAN WHOM
HE HAD NOT SEEN

Unbeaten Lightweight Champion of Old Times Made Rule to See Opponent Before Match.

Jack McAuliffe, the lightweight champion of America from 1886 to 1896, who retired unbeaten, made it a practice never to meet a man in the ring who he had not seen, but he made one exception. Horace M. Leeds of Atlantic City, a famous amateur lightweight, became a professional in April, 1892, just to try his skill against the unbeaten professional champion, and McAuliffe, who had never seen Leeds, took him on after a look at his photograph. After looking at Leeds's picture, "Jack" remarked to Billy Racap, who was trying to secure his assent to a match: "Make the match. Yes, I can beat him. I will beat him with body punches. Do you see the lines of his body? Well, that is where he is weak and I will soon find his weakest spot." Leeds carried the fight to McAuliffe and made a wonderful showing for two rounds but the champion won just as he said he would, with body punches.

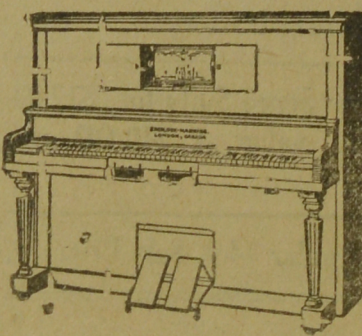

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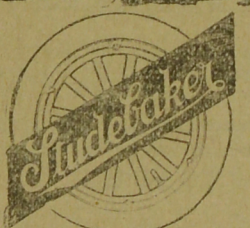
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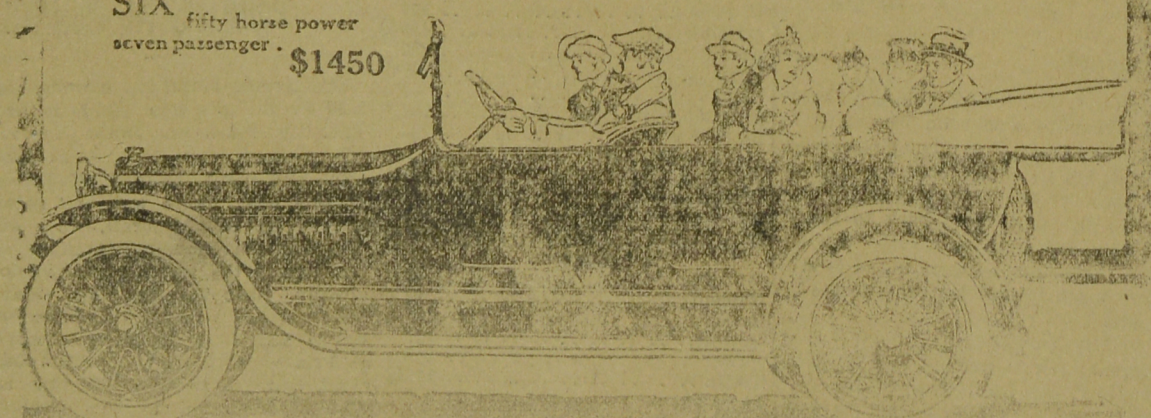
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
