## PARTINGTON DRIVE

AT ROCKY BROOK  
CONSIDERED SAFE

With Fairly Heavy Rain Nashwaak Will Be Cleared of Lumber---Conditions On Upper St. John Not Of the Best.

The main Nashwaak and Napadogan drives of the Edward Partington Pulp & Paper Company were at Rocky Brook last night, some distance below the mouth of the Napadogan. The drive on the latter stream was out yesterday morning and both drives were brought along together yesterday.

Mr. E. B. Staples, manager at Marysville for the Partington Company, informed The Mail today that the two drives contained about sixteen million feet of lumber and were now considered to be in safe waters. Dams on the Nashwaak will make it possible to bring the lumber out safely under almost any conditions. There has been practically no freshet on the Nashwaak and the logs are all in the bed of the stream, making excellent driving conditions.

On the TTY the Partington drive and Fraser Limited drive have been hung. It is reported that on Cross Creek also, Fraser Limited have stopped driving on account of low water. A fairly heavy rain will bring this lumber out all right so that there is a good prospect of the Nashwaak being cleaned of lumber.

On Upper St. John.

On the Upper St. John River driving conditions are not as good as they might be. About two million feet of lumber destined for mills at St. John, are not considered safe. (Continued on page 5.)

## U. N. B. UNDER-GRADS

HAVE ABOLISHED ALL  
TRACE OF HAZING

Junior Class Made Decision at Recent Meeting--Official Statement of Action Contained in The University Monthly

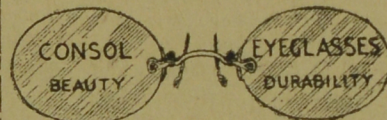
The abolition of hazing of Freshmen at the University of New Brunswick, which was put into effect last year by the class which will be graduated next Thursday, has been followed by the abolition of all disabilities under which Freshmen have begun their college careers, according to custom. This step was decided upon by the Junior Class at a recent meeting, it being considered to be in the best interests of the University that the customs be entirely abolished.

Official Announcement.

An official announcement is contained in the editorial department of The University Monthly for April, which recently was issued. It is as follows:

"For many years rumors and misrepresentations have been circulated throughout the province regarding the severity of the annual initiation and the extent of the hazing practiced by the upper classmen at the University of New Brunswick. While most of the reports which have been circulated undoubtedly contained great exaggerations, the fact remains that many young men were deterred from entering this college on account of the reputed severity of the treatment received by Freshmen during the autumn months. Denials of the reports seemed to do no good.

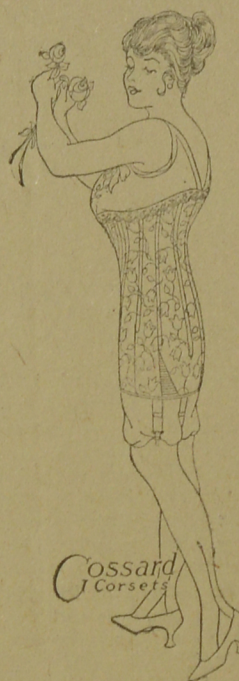
