France is Willing To Accept Italy's Peace Proposals

Announcement Today by the Cabinet That They
Will Be Accepted as a Basis for Further Dis-
cussions of European Disarmament—Memo-
randum to be Sent to London, Berlin and Rome.

(Special to The Daily Mail by the British United Press)

PARIS, April 13—The French cabinet today announced its willingness to accept Premier Mussolini's four-power peace pact proposals as a basis for further discussions of European disarmament. At the conclusion of its meeting, at 1.15 p.m., the cabinet announced intention of sending a memorandum to London, Berlin and Rome, agreeing in principle to Mussolini suggestions as the basis for a four-power discussion of present problems. The British Government has forwarded to the Premier of France through its ambassador, Lord Tyrrell, a new draft of Premier Mussolini's four-power peace proposal.

Herriott's Warning

LYONS, France, April 1—Former Premier Edouard Herriot has warned France that a war would certainly result if it entered into a four-power attempt to revise European frontiers as envisaged in the Mussolini peace plan.

N. B. FRUIT GROWERS WILL MEET FRIDAY

Federal Dept. of Agri-
culture to Experiment
on Low Grade Apples.

New Brunswick, fruit growers are interested in an item of \$10,000 in the estimates passed in the House of Commons Friday night for experimental work on low grade apples. At that time it was said by the Federal Minister of Agriculture, Hon. Robert Weir, that it was hoped to develop a commercial cider or fruit juice to be sold as a soft drink.

W. W. Hubbard, president of the New Brunswick Fruit Growers Association Inc., declared today that he thought the association should take some action to benefit by any experiments to be carried on. He pointed out that New Brunswick growers, because of their scattered locations and small crops, in comparison with those of the sister province of Nova Scotia, have been unable to find commercial markets for their cider products and that this branch of the fruit business has been neglected.

Double Benefits

Mr. Hubbard believed that development along these lines would bring double benefits—not only would it provide an outlet for the low grade apples but it would tend to raise the standard of the high grade varieties and increase the markets for this fruit.

The matter is expected to be considered along with others of importance to New Brunswick fruit growers at their twenty-eighth annual meeting here Friday. Among the speakers, besides the president, will be M. B. Davis, of the Dominion Experimental Farm, Ottawa; A. G. Turney, provincial horticulturist; G. P. Walker, of the Dominion entomological branch Fredericton; and A. Kelsall, in charge of insecticide investigations at the entomological laboratory, Annapolis Royal, N. S.

Mr. Davis is said to have carried on investigations in this country and abroad in connection with apple cider making and is conversant with the sub-

VANHORNE HOME IN MONTREAL IS GUTTED BY FIRE

Famous Art Collection,
Valued at \$2,000,000,
Badly Damaged

Montreal, Que., April 3—Fire of undetermined origin badly damaged the famous art collection of the late Sir William Van Horne on Sherbrooke Street early this morning in addition to completely destroying the third floor of the handsome residence. The collection is valued at \$2,000,000 and early estimates placed the damage at approximately forty per cent.

Sir William Van Horn was for many years president of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company and maintained a beautiful summer home at Ministers Island St. Andrews.

LIMIT RADIO ADVERTISING TO FIVE PER CENT

The Canadian Broad-
casting Commission Is-
sues Statement on New
Regulations.

Ottawa, Ont., April 2—Direct advertising over the air is restricted under regulations of the Canadian Radio Broadcasting Commission now in effect. In no case will direct advertising be permitted to exceed five per cent. of the program although in cases where there is a combination of direct and indirect advertising applications from stations for a slightly lengthier advertising period will be considered.

The new regulations of the commission, effective from the beginning of this month, have been issued to give effect to the provisions of the Radio Broadcasting Act of 1932. They classify advertising under two headings, direct or indirect.

United States programs supplied to Canadian broadcasting stations will be brought into conformity with the Canadian law and the regulations under it.

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The Commission tonight issued the following statement of the new regulations:

"For the purposes of interpretation of section 8, sub-section (B) of the Canadian Radio Broadcasting Act, 1932, dealing with the question of the permissible advertising content of the programs transmitted from Canadian broadcasting stations, the Canadian Radio Broadcasting Commission has ruled that, for the present, advertising shall be considered under two headings:

(A) Direct advertising.

(B) Indirect advertising.

"Direct advertising shall be considered as consisting of continuous sales talk referring directly to the commodity or commodities handled by the advertiser, and which is broadcast from any station either by itself or in conjunction with a program given for entertainment purposes.

"The proportion of direct advertising permitted by the Commission shall not, under any circumstances, exceed five per cent. of any program period.

Special Cases

"The total advertising content of any program period is to be kept within the five per cent. specified by law whenever possible, but the Commission will consider as special cases applications from stations or advertisers for approval to broadcast programs in which the combination of direct and indirect advertising may slightly exceed this figure, provided that the nature of the advertising is considered by the Commission to be acceptable to Canadian listeners.

"The complete continuities for all such programs, including the advertising content, shall be individually submitted to the Commission for approval and shall be individually approved by the Commission before the program is broadcast from any Canadian station."

WILL RESTRICT IMPORTATIONS FROM RUSSIA

Important Announcement in House by the Premier

TO PRESENT
ENABLING ACT

Government To Ask For
Wide Power to Deal
With Imports

London, April 3.—Restrictions on the importation of goods from Soviet Russia will be proposed by the British government. Premier J. Ramsay MacDonald announced in the House of Commons today. MacDonald said he would present tomorrow an enabling act governing imports from Russia. MacDonald said the government desired to rush the bill, pushing it through all stages on Wednesday.

The text of the bill will be issued tomorrow, MacDonald said. It was understood it would give the government wide power to deal with Soviet imports as it considers circumstances warrant, including the right to declare an embargo when the existing trade treaty between Britain and Russia expired April 17.

HOUSE BURNED AT CAMPBELLTON ON SUNDAY

Campbellton, N. B., April 2—In an early morning blaze the Christopher House on Roseberry street in the western section of the town, was totally destroyed by fire today. Four families had barely time to escape, losing all their belongings.

Total loss to the building and contents was estimated at \$6,600, covered by insurance, as follows: House, \$3,000; Byers Christopher, \$1,000; Percy Andrews, \$1,000; Guy Duncan, \$1,000; and Barclay Christopher, \$600.

The building, a large wooden structure and one of the few houses in Campbellton which escaped the great fire of 1910, was a mass of flames when the firemen arrived at 4:30 A. M.

Nothing could be done to save it and the occupants had barely time to dress and run out in the cold. The fire fighters worked well to protect adjoining buildings from the flames which the wind was threatening to spread.

The origin of the blaze could not be determined because of its advanced state when discovered.

MISS FISH WAS IN DEMAND

New York, N. Y., April 2—At least 1,561 New Yorkers found this message on their desks Saturday:

"Call Miss Fish—Whitehall 1560."

And as many Gothamites did so—"This is the aquarium," an operator answered.

The aquarium had a dozen extra operators on their switchboard to care for the April's Day barrage.

Horse Bolts, No One Hurt

A runaway horse after upsetting its sleigh and driver on Saturday evening, bolted down Queen street and was finally cornered up against the parked automobile of H. Wallace Crockett. No damage resulted to the car and the horse was but slightly injured. The driver of the sleigh, Randolph Gammon, a horse dealer from Ontario, found himself also uninjured after picking himself out of a ditch where he had been thrown in the horse's sudden flight. Police helped in righting the sleigh which had been upset.

Carnera, the Man Mountain of Ring Lost Court Case

Was Sued by a Twenty-two Year Old Waitress for
Breach of Promise and the British Court of
King's Bench Decides That He Must Pay Her
\$14,280 in American Money.

LONDON, April 13—Primo Carnera, the man mountain of the prize ring, lost his court bout with a 22-year-old Soho waitress, Emilia Tersini, and must pay the girl 4,200 pounds sterling plus costs of the action, the King's Bench Court decided today. Carnera was not in court when the verdict, which will cost him approximately \$14,280 in American money, was handed down. The waitress had told the court that Carnera when he was not the celebrity of his later days, had promised to marry and had then forgotten her.

NEW DRAFT OF THE FOUR-POWER PEACE PROPOSALS

Paris, April 2—The Journal said today that a new draft of Premier Mussolini's four-power peace proposal had been delivered by Lord William Tyrrell, British Ambassador to France, to Foreign Minister Joseph Paul-Boncour.

The latter, the newspaper added, had passed the document on to Premier Daladier.

The text, based on British views, is said to resemble slightly the disarmament plan Prime Minister MacDonald of Great Britain recently presented at Geneva with certain reservations and modifications of the Mussolini proposal.

These changes are said to concern particularly that section of the Mussolini plan which provides that Britain, France and Italy—in the event of failure of full disarmament (by which Germany would realize equality)—should pledge gradual realization of equality for Germany, Austria, Hungary, and Bulgaria.

ESPIONAGE CHARGES TO BE PRESSED

Moscow, April 2—Allan Monkhouse, Moscow director for the Metropolitan-Vickers electrical firm, and a subordinate, Charles Nordwell, have been formally charged with military as well as economic espionage, fostering "wrecking activities" and bribery.

This means that despite liberty on their own reorganization shortly after their arrest with four other British employees three weeks ago, they will be tried along with their four associates who are still imprisoned by the ogpu (secret police).

Monkhouse and Nordwell, however, have not been re-arrested.

William Strang, charge d'affaires at the British embassy, visited the four imprisoned British subjects again last night. He was allowed to see them in the presence of Prosecutor Vishinsky and a translator, but was not allowed to discuss the case. He found them in normal health and spirits.

(The four British subjects concerned in the Metropolitan-Vickers case are John Cushny, W. H. MacDonald, named Gregory. When plans were announced last week by Soviet authorities for the trial of these men, no mention was made of Monkhouse and Nordwell.)

DANCE UPSETS COLLEGE TOWN

Indianola, Iowa, April 3—The placid Methodist composure of this college town was disturbed today by a student insurrection against the traditional ban on dancing at Simpson College. Simpson students, tired of vain appeals to President John Hillman and directors of the school maintained by the Methodist Church, chartered the Country Club ballroom last night, hired a saxophone, drum and piano combination and had a dance.

Dr. Hillman was silent today. The matter, it was intimated, would be investigated by the proper officials. So strict are the ordinances here, due principally to college influence, that cigarettes may not be sold within the town's limits.
