BIG GAME SEASON  
CONSIDERED GOOD

Many Guides Have Already Booked a Number of Engagements--Big Game Reported Very Plentiful.

With the opening of the big game season less than a month away, the prospects for a large influx of American sportsmen to the province this year is very bright. Guides returning from the woods report big game, particularly moose, to be very plentiful. The animals have been frequently seen around lakes and ponds and the number of cows accompanied by calves is said to be much larger than in previous seasons.

Mr. Charles Cremin, of this city, who hunts in the Nepisiguit, left for that region this week. He already has several parties in the woods fishing trout, and expects them to remain for a big game hunt. Mr. Cremin had a big season last year, but he expects a larger number of parties this year.

Mr. Adam Moore, of Scotch Lake, was here yesterday purchasing supplies and making ready for the hunting season. Mr. Moore expects to start for the Tobique next week to meet a party, which will remain at his camps for six weeks. He has many engagements booked and anticipates a successful season.

Mr. W. H. Allen, who now owns camps at Little river and Rocky brook, has had a number of fishing parties on Cain's River this season. He expects to handle more hunting parties during the autumn months than last year.

Mr. William Griffin, of Cross Creek, a successful York County guide, has been spending the past month in the

QUARTERING OF  
TROOPS IN EXHIBITION  
BUILDING, DOUBTFUL

Question of Fire-Insurance Enters Large, by Into Matter--Companies Claim Presence of Troops Increases Risk.

The occupation of the Exhibition buildings by troops during the coming winter is uncertain, according to report. During the past two winters the buildings have been used as barracks, artillery being quartered there in 1915, and infantry during the present year.

It is proposed that a portion of the 236th Highlanders be quartered there next winter, but the Exhibition management desires certain guarantees before the building can be used.

The trouble is due to the additional fire risk which attaches to the buildings during occupation by troops. It is understood that the insurance companies have intimated strongly that the quartering of troops in the main building, except in the rear, where there is a concrete floor, will cause trouble, possibly cancellation of the policies.

Last winter while companies of the 104th and 140th Battalions were quartered at the Exhibition Buildings, there was a fire which destroyed a building which had been used for the exhibit of motor vehicles, carriages, etc. This incident is said to be the principal cause of the trouble with the insurance people.

## Gone to France.
