## BRITISH TROOPS AGAIN ACTIVE IN MESOPOTAMIA

London, Sept. 14.—The British army in Mesopotamia, which has been inactive for several months on account of intense heat, has engaged in a few minor operations recently, which were reported officially as follows:

"On the Tigris line on the morning of Sept. 11 an aerodrome of the enemy was raided by our airmen, who destroyed a small camp."

"On the Euphrates line on Sept. 9 a reconnoitering party was attacked by Turkish irregulars. Two days later a mixed force from Nasirich drove the Turks northward. The operations were most successful. Over 200 of the enemy were killed and large quantities of ammunition were captured and destroyed."

## SUPREME COURT DEALT WITH SEVERAL CASES

The Supreme Court, Appeal Division, continued Wednesday afternoon and yesterday morning. The cases dealt with were as follows:

Abraham Leblanc vs. Walter F. Lutz et al. R. St. John Freeze for the defendants moved to set aside the verdict for the plaintiff and to enter a new trial, or for reduction of damages. C. Lionel Hanington is to file factum. Court considers.

W. Clark, Ltd., vs. C. H. Peters et al. J. H. F. Teed for the plaintiff supported an appeal from the St. John County Court on judgment for the defendants on their counter claim. W. A. Ewing contra. Court considers.

McArthur vs. Philips. Hon. J. B. M. Baxter supported an appeal from the Kings county court. R. St. John Freeze contra. Case unfinished when court rose.

## TO BUILD NEW SPAN FOR QUEBEC BRIDGE

St. Lawrence Bridge Company Not  
Down Hearted Over Recent  
Accident.

Montreal, Sept. 13.—Construction of a new centre span for the Quebec bridge will be continued at once, along exactly the same lines as before the catastrophe of Monday. Only one change is to be made in the arrangements for the new span, and that is that members of the rolled steel will be used in place of castings in the hoisting apparatus. This was announced this morning by the St. Lawrence Bridge Co., Ltd.

"We will go right ahead," continued the statement. "We feel that this is not the time for us to give up or think that we are beaten. We are going to buckle down and show that the bridge is going to be a success."

Everybody of prominence in engineering in Canada and the United States was present on Monday, and all agreed that the whole scheme had been entirely proved.

Officials of the bridge company declared this morning that a casting on the hoisting apparatus at the southwest corner gave way, allowing the corner of the span to fall. The twisting strain then proved too much for the rest of the hoisting apparatus, and the span went down, turning on its side towards up stream as it fell.

The casting had been tested for two weeks at Sillery Cove under heavier strains than it was carrying at the time.

"The photograph published by the Montreal Star entirely bears out the contentions of our engineers as to the cause of the disaster, said an official. It shows the span breaking away at the southwest corner and the structure turning on its side and falling. The claim of many eye witnesses that the span buckled, is amply disproven by this picture."

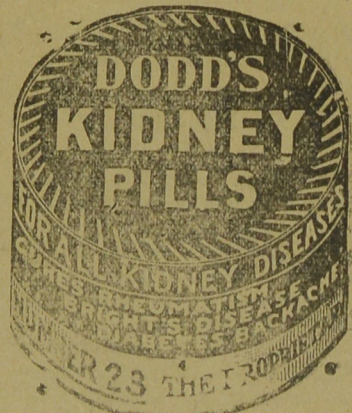

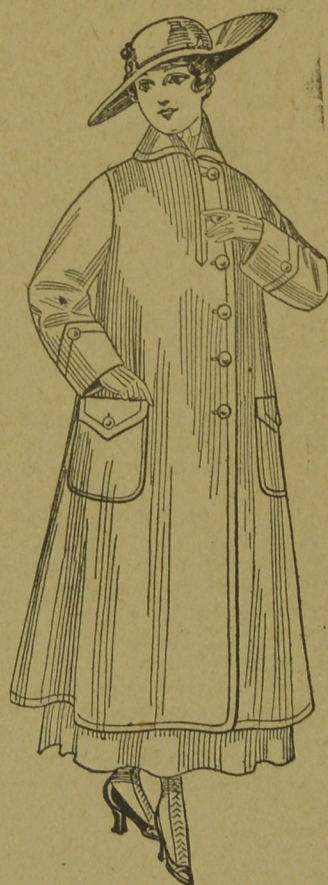
