He was at Bermuda with the Royal Canadian Regiment and he afterward joined the Composite Battalion at Halifax. From that he went to England with a draft, finally reaching a killed battalion at the front.

Fredericton Horses Win.

Roy Volo, owned by Mr. W. Bert King, of this city, won the 2.15 trot at St. Stephen yesterday. The best time was 2.15½. James K. Newbro, another local horse, with Tommy Raymond as driver, won the 2.14 trot and pace at Halifax in 2.13½. In the 2.40 pace Driver Raymond was taken down from behind Jesse S. by the judges. This horse won the first heat and was second in the two following heats. With Steve Purvis driving in place of Raymond, Jesse S. won two more heats and the race. Raymond's case is to be dealt with later.

Interment will be made at the Pickard Burying Ground, Keswick.

ANOTHER JUVENILE
ARRESTED ON CHARGE
OF ROBBERY

Leonard Belyea, Aged Ten Years, is Charged With Breaking Into Lawlor & Cain's Store--Now on Suspended Sentence

Leonard Belyea, aged ten years, appeared before Sitting Magistrate Richards this morning on the charge of entering the hardware store of Lawlor & Cain, Queen street, and stealing certain articles. The sitting magistrate remanded young Belyea until the 27th inst., when Magistrate Limerick will have returned from his vacation. The remand is necessary because the boy is out on suspended sentence for stealing bags from the potato warehouse of Mr. W. W. Boyce.

Policeman Marshall took the juvenile to the Children's Aid Society Home, where he will be kept until he appears before the court again.

The story told by the police is that Belyea and two younger boys went to Lawlor & Cain's store on Sunday morning last. Belyea opened the rear door and entered, while the other stayed outside. He stole an air rifle, four boxes of cartridges and a baseball.

When the theft was discovered the police were notified, and began work on the case.

LIEUT. FRANK EASON
RETURNED TODAY TO
JOIN 236TH BATTALION

Wounded in France While Serving With 26th Battalion--Left Fredericton in 1914 With First Draft of 71st. Regt.

Lieut. Frank Eason, who is to be adjutant of the 236th Highlanders, arrived here this morning by I. C. R. He was welcomed at the station by Capt. T. R. McNally and Capt. J. P. McPeake on behalf of the 236th, and His Worship Mayor Mitchell on behalf of the city.

Lieut. Eason received warm greetings from his numerous friends here. He still is slightly lame from a wound received in the thigh while serving in France with the 26th Battalion.

Mr. Eason left Fredericton in August 1914, with the first draft from the 71st York Regiment. He was posted to the 12th Battalion and served with it in England in various capacities, until appointment to the 26th at the front.

He landed at Halifax some days ago, but had to report at Quebec.

Col. Guthrie Returning.

Lieut. Col. Guthrie, officer commanding the 236th Battalion, is expected to return this afternoon from St. John.

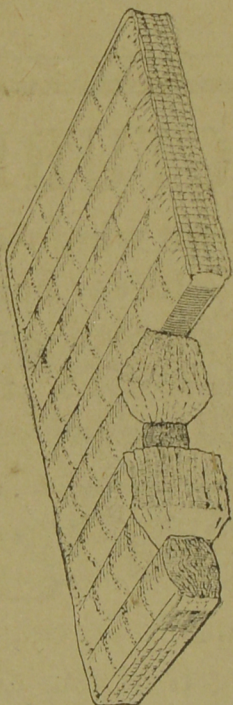

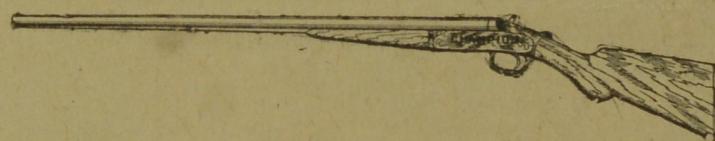
