

A General Campaign Against German Jews Begins on Saturday

Nazi Issues Orders to Postpone the Retaliatory Measures—Anti-Jewish Demonstrations, However Continue on a Wide Scale—Jewish Shops Closed Yesterday and Were Reopened Today.

BERLIN, March 29—Anti-Jewish demonstrations continued on a wide scale in scattered cities of Germany today. In defiance of Nazi orders to delay the official "retaliation campaign" until Saturday.

One of the largest demonstrations occurred in Goerlitz, Silesia according to the Telegraphen Unions correspondent, who reported that a crowd of one thousand gathered in front of the county court, protesting against "atrocities propaganda" and demanding the expulsion of all Jewish judges and lawyers.

Meanwhile, the Telegraphen Union reported: Jewish shops in the towns of Gleiwitz, Hindenburg and Beuthen closed yesterday, were reopened this morning in obedience to orders from Berlin. Nazi headquarters held that localized boycott campaigns would injure rather than help the cause and that action must be postponed until the general campaign begins Saturday.

U.S. FOX PELTS TURNED OVER TO P.E.I. POOL

Summerside, March 29—A number of silver black fox pelts have been received from the United States for sale through the Prince Edward Island fur pool. This, according to local officials of the Canadian National Railways, is the first time that pelts have ever been received from the United States or, in fact, anywhere outside of Canada, although they have been received from every province in Canada carrying on a fur industry. The Prince Edward Island fur pool has had a very rapid expansion. Three years ago there were sixty patrons. Today they number in excess of two thousand. Word has reached fox men here that owing to the closing of the banks in the United States a number of pelts were withdrawn from sale at recent European fur auctions.

LOREE, 2ND, TO SWING PICKAXE

Colonie, New York, March 29—Leonor F. Loree, 2d, schoolboy grandson of one of America's most colorful railroad figures, may get a job this summer on his granddad's railroad doing "something fundamental" like swinging a pick.

He was returning to his preparatory school in Maine today after joining his grandfather in the annual inspection of the Colonie shops of the Delaware and Hudson Railroad. The grandfather is Leonor F. Loree, who began as a railroad surveyor and rose to be president of the road.

Leonor is preparing for Yale. His father is a director in the New York Central Railroad. His uncle, James Taber Loree is vice president of the Delaware and Hudson.

COMMUNISTS MAY HAVE SET CHURCH FIRE

Montreal, March 28—The arson squad of the Montreal police tonight rounded up six persons who will be held overnight as witnesses into the fire which destroyed St. Jacques le Mineur Roman Catholic Church on Sunday.

Antoine Senecal, assistant Crown attorney, stated that information had been gathered to the effect a group of alleged Communists was out to fire several churches. The attorney-general, Hon. L. A. Taschereau, would be advised of the development in the morning and it was probable that tomorrow's inquiry would be formally opened and adjourned to permit further investigation.

Some days before the fire there was a meeting of members of an alleged Communist association at which 25 persons attended, police learned. At this meeting it had been decided to set fire to a number of churches. It was settled, detectives were informed, to set fire to St. Jacques le Mineur Church first, with Notre Dame Church, one of the most historic on the continent, to follow.

A CAMERA EAR

Chicago, March 29—Possessing a "camera ear," Police Lieutenant Richard Lawler, told that the horn on a holdup car had a peculiar sound, made autoists "toot" until he nabbed the robbers.

GOOD PROGRESS BEING MADE IN PITRE TRIAL

Rufus Pitre Faces Second Trial for Murder of Aged Storekeeper at Sou. Tetagouche; Witnesses Were Examined, Judge Baxter Presiding.

Bathurst, N. B., March 28—Pleading not guilty to a murder charge of which he was previously acquitted, Joseph Norman "Rufus" Pitre appeared in the Gloucester Circuit Court today to begin another phase of his fight for life. Involving the death last April of Geo. Smith, aged storekeeper at South Tetagouche, Pitre's second trial is unique as the first of its kind in the British Empire. He was acquitted last August, but a Crown Appeal to the Supreme Court of New Brunswick resulted in an order for a new trial. This order was sustained by the Supreme Court of Canada, to which the accused had appealed from the judgment by the Supreme Court in this province.

Selection of the jury, requiring the entire morning session, was not complete until all in the panel of 63 had been called upon. The defence used 19 preemptory challenges, one less than the maximum allowed. Twenty-nine in the panel were stood aside by the Crown. Afternoon and night sessions of the trial proper were held before adjournment until tomorrow.

Brother a Witness

Wallace Pitre, brother of Rufus, was the chief witness today. His evidence for the Crown featured the first trial.

Outlining the case for the Crown, A. M. Robichaud, of Caraquet, who is prosecuting in conjunction with R. P. Hartley, K.C., Deputy Attorney-General, said he would show that Wallace and Rufus, leaving their home in Beresford on the day of the crime had gone to South Tetagouche; that the revolver alleged to have been used by Rufus was the same the latter had borrowed from his brother, Gilbert, the night before Smith's death; that Wallace and Rufus had entered the store and demanded money; that Rufus went upstairs and made a similar demand to Mrs. Smith; and that the brothers went home after Smith was shot.

Examined by Mr. Hartley, Wallace gave much the same evidence as during the trial last August. Some answers conflicted with his previous testimony, however, and at other times he said he could not remember.

"I did not see Rufus with the revolver in the store," said the witness. "I do not remember stating that Rufus had a revolver in the store but I did see him with a revolver on the way up." The witness was behind Rufus when a shot sounded and Smith fell he said.

Cross-examined by C. T. Richard, M.L.A., counsel for the defence, Wallace gave testimony in discrepancy with his previous evidence. Asked if he had handled the revolver in the store, the witness said "yes," after some hesitancy. He gave no reason for answering the question differently than he had at the previous trial.

At the first trial Wallace said he had neither handled nor carried the weapon on the way to South Tetagouche. Today he admitted carrying the revolver two miles, saying he handed it to Rufus near the store.

FRENCH HOUSE DELAYS ACTION ON WAR DEBT

Motion for Immediate Payment to United States Stood Over

MAY COME UP IN APRIL

Negotiations With U. S. Not To Be Interfered With

Paris, March 29—The foreign affairs commission of the Chamber of Deputies postponed action today on the proposal of Deputy Rene Richard for immediate payment of the defaulted December 15th debt annuity to the United States. This the proposal is unlikely to be discussed before April 5th at the earliest it was said, "so as not to interfere with possible negotiations between Washington and Paris." It seems to be quite generally believed that France will pay over the amount now in default.

STOPS HEART TO PERFORM AN OPERATION

Stockholm, Sweden, March 28—A remarkable heart operation, said to be the eighth of its kind in the world during which the patient's heart was stopped for four minutes, was performed recently at the Hospital of Sabbateberg, in Stockholm. The heart was laid bare and its beating was stopped during the four minutes needed for the operation.

The surgery was successful and the patient has now regained full health.

Henry Godin, of Beresford, testified as to the ownership of the gun produced in court.

Inspector Reginald Bettaney of the R.C.M.P. was also heard today.

Mr. Justice Baxter of the Appeal Division of the Supreme Court is presiding at the trial.

Prince of Wales On Visit Today to City of Glasgow

Some Minor Incidents Marked the Occasion — A Man Who Claimed to Have An Appointment With Him Burst Through the Police Lines—A Communist Soap Box Orator Arrested.

GLASGOW, Scotland, March 29—Several minor incidents occurred today when the Prince of Wales arrived for a visit. Just before he left his sleeping car in the station, a man burst through the police line and approached the door of the royal salon. Asked his business, he replied:

"I have an engagement with the Prince. He said he would meet me here." Police escorted him from the station.

An unidentified person stoned a window of the St. Roch Recreational Club as the Prince's automobile halted there.

A Communist soap box orator refused to quiet down as the Prince passed and he was arrested.

HARBIN WORST IN CHINA FOR BEGGARS

Harbin, Manchuria, March 27—Harbin, is famous for beggars, writes Lillian Grosvenor Colville, in National Geographic Magazine. Unfortunately, it has the unsavory reputation of having more beggars than any other city of China, and most of them are Russians.

They are all kinds of beggars, among them gypsies with dirty red kerchiefs, and rosy little boys who play about happily until visitors appear, and then they dog your steps with hands outstretched, crying, "Give monie, please give monie, missie, very sorrie; ten cent, please." We see sturdy young men, sometimes a very expectant woman, standing at the club entrance until the baby's arrival. An emaciated drug addict thrust a claw-like hand through the car window one day, making my sister shriek in the approved manner of mystery plays.

There are lepers, Chinese and Russian, creeping, crawling, hobbling, or just sitting on the sidewalk, according to the stage of their deformity. Sometimes there is a nice-looking old man with a beard, who must have been at least a general, or a woman carrying a baby. I have become so hardened that I half believe the tale that the baby is rented for the purpose.

Harbin has been called the grave of the white man's prestige by one of the newspaper correspondents. This is not entirely because of the astounding number of white beggars, but because Caucasians are governed and bullied by Chinese officials and Chinese soldiers and policemen.

HEEDS CALL

London, England, March 29—A London traffic officer is planning a trip round the world in a 28-foot sailing boat.

He is Police Constable Arthur Bull, 25, and he has resigned so that he and a companion can prepare for the trip, which is expected to take two years.

SIGNALLED NEWS OF DEATH OF A CHILD

All Efforts to Reach the Light House on Flint Island, in Nova Scotia, Resulted in Failure.

Port Morien, N. S., March 28—Two flashes, thrice repeated, broadcast the brief fact of tragedy from the light tower on isolated Flint Island tonight. A Child was dead.

After more than 50 hours of vain effort to establish communication, watchers on the mainland picked out one of the signals broadcast from Glace Bay and picked up on Light-keeper John Martell's receiving set.

As all efforts to reach the island over a mile and a half of broken ice again ended in failure, the Glace Bay station requested the islanders to flash the light twice in case the light-keeper was dead; twice, repeated again, if one of their nine children had died.

Tonight the flashes came. Six times, spaced in twos.

Watchers on the mainland saw the flashes clearly and on this occasion there was none of the confusion which resulted when an attempt was made to get into communication with the island this afternoon. In the earlier attempt, the shore people had composed a code of signals which were delivered in a note dropped from an airplane piloted by Don McPherson.

Flag At Half Staff

But interpretation of the flashing red lights from the tower top differed; all that was definitely established at the time was that some member of the Martell family was ill or had died.

During the day, too, binoculars revealed to watchers on the mainland two figures on the shore of the island, probably sons of the lightkeeper. One returned to the heights and yowered the flag to half-mast.

A TONSIL ALIBI

San Francisco, March 29—The last time Attorney Fred McDonald's tonsils postponed a trial in Judge Frank Kerrigan's court, the judge went to a ball game and sat next to McDonald.
