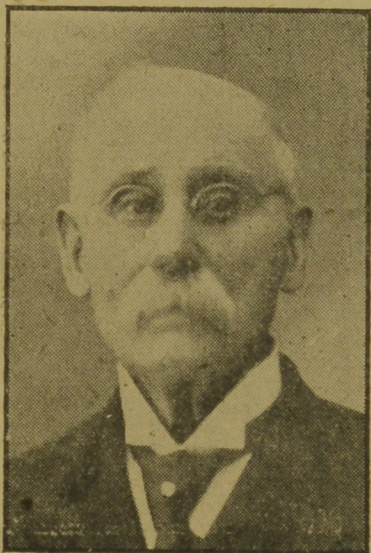

CELEBRATING HIS EIGHTY-SIXTH BIRTHDAY

Mr. William Cooper the Recipient of Hearty Congratulations - Is Enjoying Good Health

Mr. William Cooper is today celebrating his eighty-sixth birthday, and is being warmly congratulated by his numerous friends on the event. Mr. Cooper's general health is excellent, except that he is a little hard of hearing and is compelled to use a crutch because of a severe accident which befell him two years ago. He is not able to move about the streets as freely as he once did, but spends most of his time at his son's carriage shop on King street, where he daily meets his old friends and discusses with them events of long ago.

Mr. Cooper was born at Royal Road, in the Parish of Douglas, in the year 1830, but the greater part of his life has been spent in this city. When he was a small boy he removed with his parents to Hamilton, Ont., where he

remained fifteen years. There were no railways in those days, and they made the journey by sailing vessel from St. John to New York, and thence up the Hudson river to the Great Lakes. It was a very tedious journey and consumed several weeks.

Mr. Cooper returned to Fredericton when 21 years of age, and learned his trade as a blacksmith and carriage maker. For over forty years he carried on business at the stand on King street now occupied by his son, Mr. Frank L. Cooper.

Mr. Cooper is the oldest living member of the Brunswick Street Baptist Church, having joined it fifty-five years ago. He is also the senior deacon of the church, and when his health permits is a regular attendant at worship.

Mr. Cooper comes of a long-lived family, his father having lived to the ripe old age of ninety-three. He had an uncle who died at the age of ninety-five. Mr. John Anderson, ex-M. P. P., of the Barony, who is hale and hearty at ninety-four, is an uncle by marriage.

Mr. Cooper was twice married, first to Miss Everett, of Kingsclear, and secondly to Miss Campbell, also of Kingsclear. The death of the latter a short time ago was a severe blow to him. He has three sons, Frederick and William E., of Kansas City, and Frank L., of this city, and two daughters, Mrs. J. W. McCready and Miss Jean Cooper, both of this city.

Mr. Cooper has travelled extensively about the province and his circle of acquaintances is a very large one. All will be glad to know that he is enjoying excellent health, and his strong hopes of being able to round out the century.

HIGH SCHOOL WON.

University Freshman Defeated at Rugby Yesterday.

The Rugby football season opened yesterday with the Fredericton High School and the Freshman team of the University of New Brunswick facing one another. Fredericton High won without any trouble, the score being 9 to 0.

LIEUT. G. A. GOOD IS WOUNDED IN FRANCE

Signalling Officer With Infantry Battalion—Son of Major F. A. Good.

Mrs. F. A. Good this morning received a telegram from the Adjutant General at Ottawa informing her that her son, Lieut. G. Alvah Good, infantry, is officially reported wounded and remaining off duty, October 3rd.

Lieut. Good went to Halifax as a subaltern in the company furnished to the Composite Battalion by the 71st York Regt. From Halifax he went to England with a draft and about the first of the present year crossed to France as signalling officer to one of the infantry battalions. He has seen much service, but never appeared before in the casualty list. His father, Major F. A. Good, who could not go overseas with the 140th Battalion, on account of failing health, is with the New Brunswick Command staff at St. John. A younger brother, Lieut. Allan Good, is with the 140th Battalion in England.

MARYSVILLE POLICE MATTERS DISCUSSED

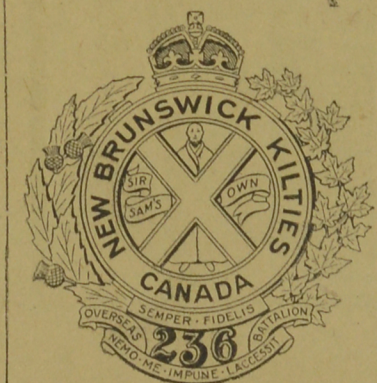

Prof. Popplestone of the U. N. B. faculty, was heard by the board in reference to the formation of classes for the study of French under modern methods.

A report was read from Dr. Foster, in reply to the request of the Board at a previous meeting, respecting study of home lessons by children in primary grades. It is claimed by the teachers that the little tots have only to puzzle their brains with two or three words, or some trifling review.

A time-table was submitted showing that the instruction imparted in the manual training and domestic science departments occupies all the time of the respective instructors. Sections of High School pupils are included in the work.

A largely signed petition of the residents of Doak Settlement was presented asking the Board to grant them the use of the schoolhouse in the settlement in which to conduct a Sunday school. After consideration the request was granted.

This morning application was made to the 236th Battalion for a search party, and one hundred men under Lieut. Brewer were detailed to go out this afternoon.

Mr. Jones is little the worse for his experience. He says he did not hear the searchers and lost his bearings completely. After wandering for some time he found an old camp with a stove in it. With his sole remaining match he lighted a fire and passed the night there. This morning he went on and came out of the woods at Nasonworth. He then was able to get his bearings and made his way back to the Wilsey road and to Fredericton.
