## WOMAN'S COLUMN

TO REMOVE SEWING MARKS.

A disturbing question often coming up in remodeling old garments is how to remove sewing machine marks, and this has been found successful. For wool goods use a damp cloth on the wrong side of the goods and press with a hot iron; then gently rub with the thumb nail. For velvet, it is necessary to steam the cloth the usual way, rubbing gently. For silk there is no help.

If, when transferring an embroidered design or initial through carbon paper, you find it difficult to get the design into its exact place, try sticking pins in the article you wish to stamp so that the heads of the pins outline the exact spot. You can then feel the pin heads through the carbon paper and so know where to place the

design.

### HOUSEHOLD HELPS.

The freshness of an egg may be determined by placing it in a pan of water. If "strictly fresh" the egg will lie on the bottom of the pan. If stale it will stand on end, and if very old will rise to the surface. When just a few days old the egg will begin to tilt a trifle, and as it ages more and more the angle at which it tilts will increase. Thus the relative freshness of the egg may be determined by noting just how it lies in the water.

A cloth wrung out of cold water and then placed over the top and around the sides of the butter dish will keep butter almost as firm as if in a refrigerator. The dish may be kept even in a hot kitchen if it is placed in a draft. This increases

the evaporation of the water—the secret of the whole thing.

Directions as to combining materials should be followed if one wants uniformity, for the adding of a beaten egg to a hot soup will cause a curdled mess. Pour in a little of the hot soup into the egg and then it can be added to the soup.

Japanese towelling makes pretty cushions for window seats and chairs.

If soup is to be the chief dish for luncheon, make it bean or cream soup.

"Bostonians, I heard, are very musical; are you fond of music?" he asked.

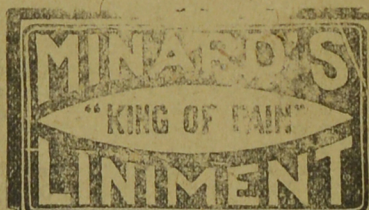
"Oh yes!" was the reply, "you see I was born with a drum in each ear."

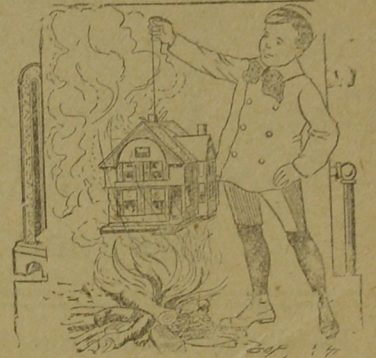
