COLUMBIA TO MEET STANFORD IN ROSE BOWL

Epic Winter Battle in California Stadium on New Year's Day.

Pasadena, California, Dec. 7.—Columbia University is to meet Stanford in the annual football game at the Rose Bowl here New Year's Day for the mythical national championship.

Acceptance by the New York School of an invitation to represent the East was announced late today by Al Masters, graduate manager of Stanford. The decision came after weeks of speculation which, in its late phases, embraced Army, Princeton, Nebraska, Michigan and Duke teams.

Columbia first entered the picture as a leading Saturday night Hal C. Reynolds, member of the Rose tournament football committee, was in New York.

Masters said the invitation to Columbia was tendered late yesterday and the acceptance was received by Desse Roche, telegram from the university athletic committee today.

"Football critics have informed us that, despite an early season defeat by Princeton, Columbia has really a great team," said the Stanford graduate manager. "We are impressed by its hard and often fast National Hockey League game finish."

"In making its selection, Stanford took into consideration the scholastic standing of its possible opponents and thought Columbia was above reproach."

Coach Tiny Thornhill of Stanford who arrived today, said it was "all news to me". He said he had no idea who would be selected in advance of the announcement and had no report of scouts on Columbia.

Stanford has scored a total of 131 points to 36 for opponents in winning eight of its 10 games, with one a tie.

The only reverse for the Cardinal team was at the hands of the University of Washington, 6 to 0. Columbia scored 172 points to 45 for the combined opposition.

ENGLAND WINS!

Tottenham, England, Dec. 7.—Meeting again after 12 years, England defeated France, 4-1 in an international soccer classic. On the last occasion in 1921, France beat England, 2-1, at Paris. The only victory the French have secured in nine matches.

The game was scrappy throughout but the English were always on top having a 3-0 lead at half-time.

Brilliant sunshine and perfect ground favored the match, witnessed by 15,000 persons.

Before the start of the game there was a pleasing ceremony signaling resumption of soccer relations, when three French girls presented the English captain with bouquets and he replied with a kiss on each of their cheeks.

SENATORS UPSET FAST TRAVELLING LEAFS, AS HAWKS TRIM MAROONS

Ottawa in Brilliant Ice Struggle--Rangers and Canadiens In 70-Minute Draw, with Morenz Showing His Stuff.

Ottawa, Ont., Dec. 7.—Ottawa Senators took a lightning-fast and rugged National Hockey League game here tonight from Toronto Maple Leafs 4-1. After a scoreless first period, Joe Primeau listed Leafs' goal on a pass-out from Charlie Conacher behind the Senator nets. Earl Roche tied it up before second period ended, taking a pass from his brother, Desse.

The Leafs played wide hockey in the third period, sending four and five men down the ice in gang plays. It cost them three goals, the first by Frank Finnigan on a pass from Max Kaminsky, playing his first professional game and the others by Earl and Desse Roche.

A Scoreless Draw
New York, N. Y., Dec. 7.—The New York Rangers and Montreal Canadiens battled through 70 minutes of a hard and often fast National Hockey League game tonight without a goal for either side.

The result left their standing in the standings unchanged and the Canadiens second in the Canadian division and the Rangers last in the American.

The game produced plenty of speedy skating, but taken as a whole it was not good hockey. Neither team showed a constant attack, and the timing of passes was off on both sides. It was more a battle of individuals with the work of goalie Andy Aitkenhead standing out.

The Ranger goalie stopped 46 shots as he chalked up his third consecutive shutout. In the second period he gave an especially brilliant performance as he turned back one attack, after another when the habitants displayed their best. Doug Brennan and Earl Seibert on the defense and Bill Cook, in an all around job also did good work for the Rangers.

For the Canadiens Howie Morenz was the star, covering the entire rink with his speedy dashes that took him into the thick of every play, offensive or defensive. "Pit" Lepine's wide sweep checks broke up a good many Ranger raids, while the newcomers, Sammy Godin and Jack Riley occasionally made trouble for the New York Ranger defence.

Each team lost a couple of opportunities to score through shots that hit goal posts and might just as well have gone in but more openings were lost when rival defence men arrived just in time to spoil scoring shots.

Score Inside 45 Seconds

Chicago, Ill., Dec. 7.—A goal by "Baldy" Northcott in the first 45 seconds of play proved to be the best offensive effort of Montreal in the game with Chicago Black Hawks, but Maroons lost a 3-1 decision tonight in the first meeting of the two teams in the N. H. L. season.

Northcott's score was the result of a solo rush, which surprised the Hawk defence as well as Goalie Chuck

Los Angeles, California, Dec. 7.—A story of how two husky truck drivers, and Jess Willard, former world's champion heavyweight boxer, tangled last month in an unscheduled bout on a highway was told in the municipal court where Willard was convicted by a jury on a charge of battery.

The fight started when Willard's car was involved in a collision with a truck driven by John Legrego, whose father, Henry, signed the battery complaint against the former boxer. Henry was with his son when the battle occurred.

Willard will be sentenced Saturday. Conviction on battery charges carries a penalty of a \$500 fine or six months in jail.

561,160 Hockey Sticks Made

Ottawa, Ontario, Dec. 7.—More than hockey sticks were made in Canada last year than in 1931. According to the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, 561,160 sticks were manufactured in 1932 as compared with 545,368, the previous year.

But there were fewer tennis and other racquets and far fewer skis made. Racquets numbered 63,356 as against 69,208 for 1931 and skis numbered 6,879 as compared with 26,700 the previous year.

The production of other sporting goods, taken in the aggregate, was less. These include bowling alley construction, 10, five, candle and duck pins, alley bowls, billiard and pool tables, and cues, ski equipment, lacrosse sticks, baseball bats and balls, golf tennis and soft balls, golf stick heads, clubs, tees and shafts, sleighs, coasters, toboggans, gymnasium supplies, blackbird targets and shuttlecocks. The total factory value of the production of sporting goods in 1932 was \$1,272,549, and in 1931 it was \$1,582,361.
