"TRIS" SPEAKER GIVEN GREAT RECEPTION AT BOSTON

Former Boston Star Has Pulled Cleveland Out of Hole and Put Team at Top of American League --Now Leading Batter of That Organization-- Is Going Strong.

Yesterday was "Tris Speaker Day" in Boston, the former Red Sox player appearing at the Hub with the Cleveland Indians. Speaker got a great reception.

Dealing with "Spoke's" record this season, The Boston Globe says:

"Tris Speaker comes to Boston standing at the head of the American League batsmen for the year. His club has played twenty-two games to date, winning fourteen and losing seven. The team has won eight out of its last nine games, having made only a six-six start in its first dozen contests and its most recent performance has been to take four games from the Chicago White Sox and three of four games from the Tigers, and these on its opponents' grounds.

Speaker's batting this season to date has been at a .358 clip, the Texan having made no less than twenty-eight hits, including four doubles and a triple, in his twenty-six official journeys to the home plate, other times at bat having been eliminated by his four sacrifice hits and the numerous bases on balls he has received from opposing pitchers.

In seven of his twenty-three games Speaker has gone hitless, so that, in the games in which he has hit at all, he has made a record of .435. This,

of course, does not count as an average, but shows of what value he has been to the Cleveland club when he has been hitting.

That Speaker should have made such a get-away for the Indians is not news that makes the Boston fans very happy, of course. His speed is far and away greater than that with which he broke into the 1914 and 1915 campaign for the Red Sox. It surely has been a great come back.

Last year, Speaker, between the opening of the season and May 8, inclusive, batted for just 108 points less than he has batted for this year to date. In sixteen games he hit for an even .250 for the coming champions, making fourteen hits with a total of twenty bases in fifty-six times at bat and scoring eight runs.

However, immediately after May 8 Speaker began to get going, everlastingly following May 8 he made seven hits in twenty times at bat, getting two triples and a double and batting in the five games at a .333 clip. This burst of hitting brought Speaker's average up to .375 for twenty-two games, but even that record stands eighty-three points below what Tris has been able to do in his twenty-two games for the Cleveland this year.

COMMISSION WANTS HEAVYWEIGHTS MORE EVENLY MATCHED

Boxers Must Undergo a Rigid Examination in Future--Out-of-Door Bouts Licensed.

Albany, N.Y., May 8--Under a new rule adopted by the State Athletic Commission today, heavyweight boxers hereafter must undergo a rigid physical examination before entering sparring matches in this state. The commission is determined to have heavyweight fighters more evenly matched.

The application for a license to conduct open-air boxing during the summer at the Federal League Park in Brooklyn was approved. The commission heretofore has refused licenses for out-of-door bouts in the summer. The suspension of the Brooklyn A.C. license was lifted pending a court decision. The suspension of Walter M. Mohr, the Brooklyn fighter, is also lifted and a renewal of the license of the New York Polo Club was granted.

YOUNG AHEARN BEAT AL MCCOY IN TEN ROUNDS

New York, May 9--Young Ahearn of this city, outfought Al McCoy of Brooklyn, claimant of the middleweight championship, in a ten-round bout here tonight. Ahearn weighed 160 pounds and McCoy 164½.

FRANK GOTCH RECOVERS AND WILL MEET STECHER

Omaha, May 8--Frank Gotch, having recovered from his recent illness, has given Jack Curley authority to match him with Joe Stecher. The owner of the circus with which Gotch has been showing sent word to Gotch that he would have to meet Stecher, as he engaged Gotch with the understanding that he would wrestle Stecher. The match will most likely be held either here or in Kansas City.

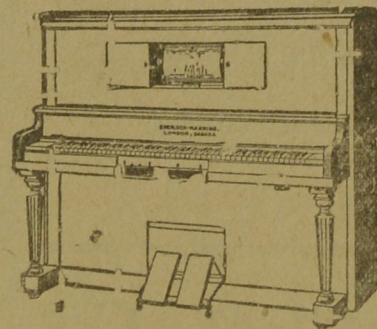

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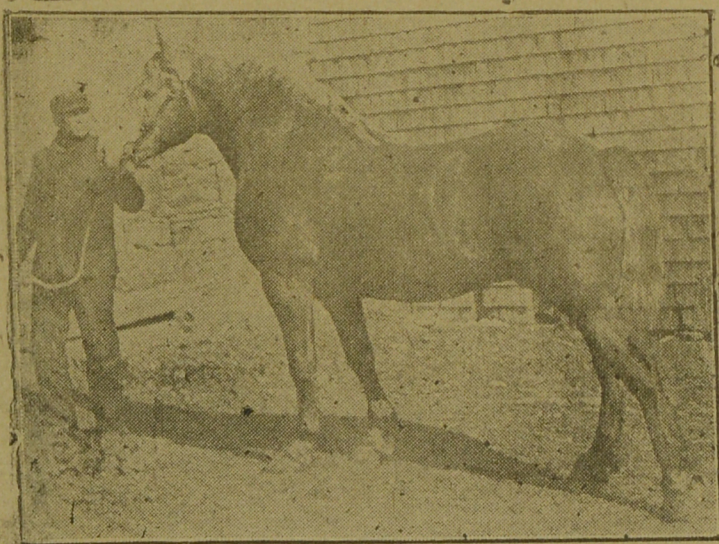
