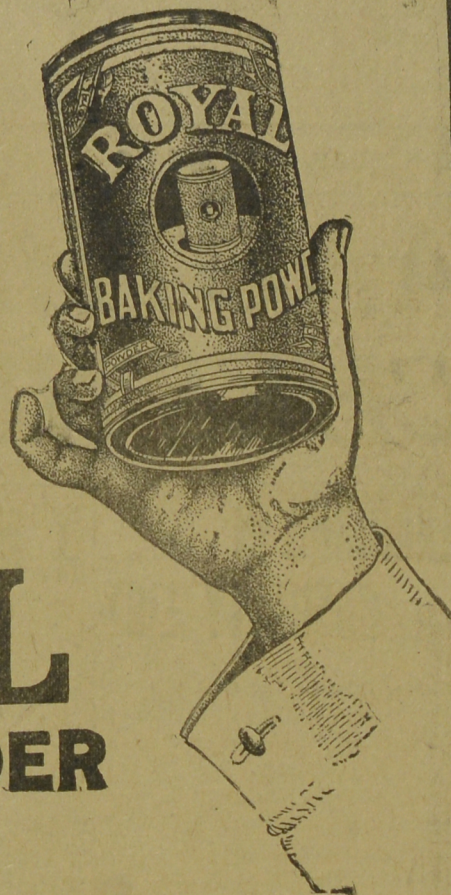

Another Victory For the Russians

Petrograd, July 4.—In an attack on the forces of Prince Leopold, the War Office announced today, the Russians have broken through two lines of German defences in the region of Baranovichi. They captured 72 officers, 2,700 men, 11 guns and a number of machine guns.

Ottawa, July 4.—It is understood that a new Canadian Government war loan of from fifty to one hundred million dollars will be announced for about September.

THE RIGHT WAY TO MIX STARCH.

This is the way to make plain lotted starch:

Allow two tablespoonfuls of starch to a gallon of water. Wet the starch with cold water until it is of the consistency of cream. Then pour over it the water which is bubbling. Stir constantly until smooth and boil for five minutes. Add an inch of candle to a gallon—or a tablespoonful of lard to give a very smooth starch.

This is the foundation of all starching, excepting that done with uncooked starch.

If a very stiff starch is desired a tablespoonful of gum arabic water to a quart of starch gives good results.

To prepare gum arabic water pour two cupful of boiling water over a quarter of a pound of gum arabic. When the gum is dissolved strain the solution into a bottle, cork and keep on hand for use in the laundry.

DISCUSSION OVER THE BONDS OF SECY-TREASURER BLISS

Reduction Made in the Amount of Securities Without the Knowledge of the Council--The Messrs Graham Bring the Matter to the Notice of the Board--Warden Stairs Makes Allusion to the Prosperity of the Country and the Great War.

The Municipal Council held a short session Tuesday afternoon and then adjourned in order to give the committees an opportunity of meeting.

Warden Stairs, who presided, made a short introductory address, which was followed by one by Secretary-Treasurer Bliss, who presented his accounts and stated among other things that there was an overdraft of upwards of \$6,000 on the Parish and County fund. During the session Councillor Robert Graham directed strong criticism toward the reduction of the surety bond of the Secretary-Treasurer from \$20,000 to \$10,000, and the fact that the premium for \$40 had been paid by the County instead of by the Secretary-Treasurer.

Councillor Pat Graham made some remarks in a similar vein.

Warden Stairs.

Warden E. Stairs was in the chair when the Council resumed business Tuesday afternoon. He stated that he regretted that he had not been able to be present at the opening session, but accidents would happen. He made reference to the prosperity of the farming community, and the like prosperity which was enjoyed by lumbermen, by merchants and by other classes. The war still was the great question. Canadians were proud of the part they had taken in the war so far, but still had their duty to do. York county men had appeared frequently in the casualty lists. He hoped that the war would soon be fought to a victorious end.

Warden Stairs made particular reference to the Patriotic Fund. During the winter a meeting had been held in Fredericton at the request of His Honor the Lieutenant Governor. At that meeting it had been decided to

could not justify. If matters of this kind went on they might just as well give the Secretary-Treasurer the whole county fund.

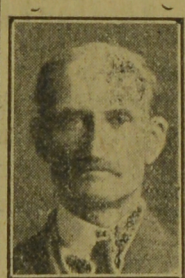
Councillor Sloat.

Councillor Sloat, in reply, stated that when chairman of the committee on the Secretary-Treasurer's bonds, he, together with the other members of the committee, had gone to the bank and found a bond to the amount of \$15,000 made by private persons, and a bond from a surety company for \$5,000. They had thought it better to have a bond for \$10,000 from a surety company, and had so recommended to the Council.

The payment of the premium had been ordered by the Buildings Committee, and he could make no explanation about it.

Councillor Hunter made a similar explanation.

Coun. Pat Graham claimed that the bond for \$10,000 was not heavy enough. By good right the bond should be \$30,000. Tax collectors had to furnish heavier bonds than the Sec. Treas. in proportion to the amount they handled.

Coun. Robert Graham claimed that the premium of forty dollars should not be paid by the county, but by the Secretary-Treasurer himself.

Councillor Everett.

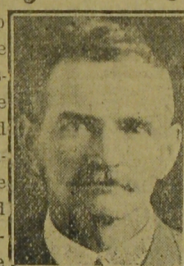
Councillor Everett pointed out that the Government of the province paid the premiums on the surety bonds of its officials and that the Buildings Committee in acting in a similar fashion had followed a good precedent.

On the motion of Councillor Alex. Brewer the Council adjourned till ten o'clock Wednesday morning.

Coun. Robt. Graham brought up the matter of the Secretary-Treasurer's bonds. He said that he had no personal feeling against the Sec. Treas., and wanted him to understand that. He

had noticed on page 72 of the Municipal Accounts for 1914 that the premium on \$10,000 surety for the Secretary-Treasurer. Formerly the surety had been \$20,000. By whose order had that amount been reduced? It was a strange proceeding. He had no recollection of the Council taking any such action.
