for me to look after you."

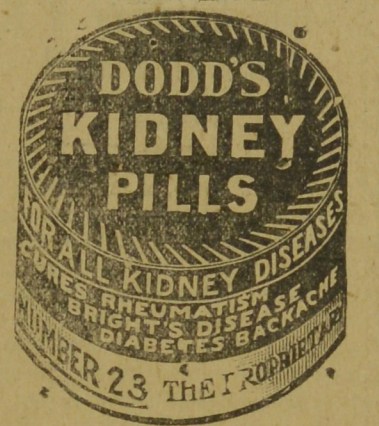
"Mrs. Dunn will look after me. I'm

RECIPES WORTH TRYING.

Put in a double boiler one-half
cupful washed rice and boil one-
half hour. Drain and cool. When
cold add six tablespoons sugar and
a pinch of salt. Boil this two hours
in double boiler. When cold flavor
with vanilla. When very cold fold
in one-half pint cream.

Beat up four eggs, add one cup-
ful of cooked rice, three-fourths of
a cupful of sugar, a pinch of salt,
a quarter of a teaspoonful of grated
nutmeg and two cupfuls milk.
Pour into a buttered pudding dish
and bake in a moderate oven till
firm. Beat up whites of three eggs
to a stiff froth, then beat in three
tablespoonfuls of sifted sugar, add
half a teaspoonful of lemon extract
and spread over the top of pud-
ding; brown lightly in the oven.

Rice muffins are relished on a
crisp, cold morning. They are
made of one cupful of boiled rice,
two eggs, two cupfuls of flour, a
tablespoonful melted butter, three
cupfuls of milk and salt to taste.
Mix the eggs, butter and milk, sift
flour and salt and add it and rice
to the wet ingredients. Bake the
muffins quickly.

BEAUTY HINTS.

Many women whose complexion
is blotchy, red and unclean look-
ing, can trace the source of their
trouble to the superabundance of
powder. Even the best and purest
of powders on the market will clog
the skin pores, if applied too heav-
ily and often.

Powder was not meant to cover
