### To Extend Back Drain.

The recent heavy rains have flooded the so called "old race course" and caused much inconvenience to residents of the locality. It is probable that about \$500 will be spent for this purpose and the City Council last night voted that amount.

### Not a Happy Family.

Lake will conduct the service and interment will be made at the Pickard burying ground.

### Died Last Night.

David Colwell, a well known resident of this city, died suddenly at his home, 568 George street, last night, from heart failure. He had been in failing health for some time and lately confined to his bed. He was sixty-two years of age and is survived by a widow, one daughter, Mrs. Charles E. Staples, of St. Stephen, and one son, Robert C. Colwell, a member of the faculty of Geneva College, Beaver Falls, Pa. Two brothers, Robert, of Fredericton, and James, of Boston, also survive. The funeral will take place on Thursday at 3 p.m. Interment will be made at the Rural Cemetery.

## CHANCERY SUIT OF LOCAL INTEREST IN COURT TODAY

John Palmer Co. Brings Suit to Re-train Palmer-McLellan Co. From Using Word Palmer in Name.

Before Chief Justice McLeod, in the Chancery Court this morning, the suit of the John Palmer Co., Ltd., against the Palmer-McLellan Shoe-pack Company, Ltd., began. Counsel for the plaintiff company are Messrs. M. G. Teed, K. C., A. J. Gregory, K. C., and J. J. F. Winslow. For the defendant company the counsel are Messrs. H. A. Powell, K. C., and P. J. Hughes.

The suit has a particular local interest as both companies are located in this city. The suit arises out of an application of the John Palmer Co. for an injunction to prevent the Palmer-McLellan Shoe-pack Co. from using the word "Palmer" in its corporate title or trademark, and from advertising that it is the exclusive owner of the manufacturing processes used by the late John Palmer.

The John Palmer Co. was the original manufacturer of oil-tanned footwear in Fredericton. In 1912 the Palmer-McLellan Shoe-pack Co. was formed, the late John Palmer, who had previously severed his connection with the other company, being taken into it upon organization by Ald. R. W. McLellan.

At the time of the incorporation of the new company an attempt was made by the other company to prevent the use of the word "Palmer" in the cor-

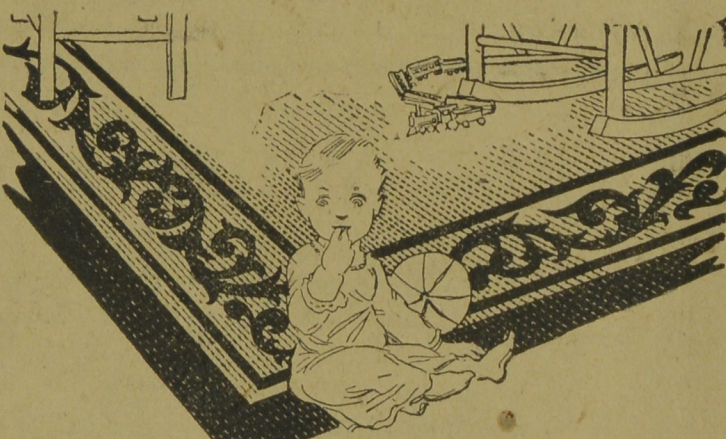
