London, May 20.—The hands on all clocks on British railroads, post offices and newspaper offices and police stations and other places where business is conducted throughout the night, will be pushed forward at two o'clock tomorrow to three o'clock, in accordance with the daylight saving scheme.

The general public will put their clocks and watches ahead an hour before going to bed tonight, or awake to find themselves late for breakfast.

The new schedule will run until September 30, when clocks will be stopped for an hour.

PARTINGTON DRIVE IS MAKING GOOD PROGRESS

Water in Nashwaak Rising---Drive
on the Clearwater is
Out.

A big rise of water in the Nashwaak is reported by men who came off the drive of the Partington Pulp & Paper Company this morning. When they left it the drive was at Ryan's Brook and was making excellent progress. The rain of the past few days had greatly improved conditions. Ryan's Brook is about four miles above Stanley Village.

It is also reported that the drive of the Miramichi Lumber Company on the Clearwater has reached the main Sou' West Miramichi. Drives on other tributaries of that river are also making good progress.

Reports from the Upper St. John are to the effect that the water has risen slightly and that there has been a steady run of logs.

Three Weeks Jail For Missionary

Liverpool, Eng., May 20.—Max Wood Moorehead, claiming to be an American "independent missionary," who arrived on May 13 to attend a Bible conference, was sentenced yesterday to three weeks' imprisonment and recommended for deportation, for neglecting to notify the authorities of a change of address.

The Metagama Is Due To-night

Montreal, May 20.—The Canadian Pacific steamer Metagama, from Liverpool, will arrive in Quebec tonight at 7 o'clock. She is due to reach her berth in Montreal some time during Sunday evening.

London, May 20.—The United States Embassy was officially informed today that sentence of Jeremiah C. Lynch, the naturalized American who has been convicted of complicity in the Sinn Féin revolt, would be announced by the military authorities during the day.

BEETS--EARLY AND LATE VARIETIES

Beets are companion or succession crops. They are easy to raise. The land must be well mulched to preserve moisture and kept free from weeds.

There are two varieties, the short-season turnip type, and the main season long-rooted. The former is the favorite garden crop. They mature in two or three months and may often be used in six weeks after sowing.

For fall use the turnip beet may be sown in July or August, or in some places as late as September. The seeds require plenty of moisture. The first crop may be sown as soon as the ground is in a workable shape. Repeat sowings at intervals extending over a month.

The long or blood beets are usually sown in early May, and they occupy the ground during the entire season.

Early beets may be sown between rows of late maturing plants just as the early radish is sown.

BITTER ROOT KID ORIGINAL IN TRAINING METHODS

Bitter Root Kid, the puglist, is bound to be eccentric. His right name is Paul Cantway, which does not suggest the real need of a change to dime novel nomenclature, and now they tell us that he reverses the usual order of things and trains at night. His theory is that a fighter who fights at night should train at night that he may become accustomed to the glare of the lights. In preparing for an afternoon fight he would train in the afternoon. He gives his afternoons to sleep.

AWARDED CONTRACT.

The Nova Scotia Construction Co. was yesterday given the contract for the construction of the Georgetown-Westfield section of the St. John & Quebec Railway. The section is about forty miles in length. Under the terms of contract trains are to be able to pass over the line by February 1, 1917, and the line is to be completed by August 1, 1917. The contract price is lower than that originally offered by the company.

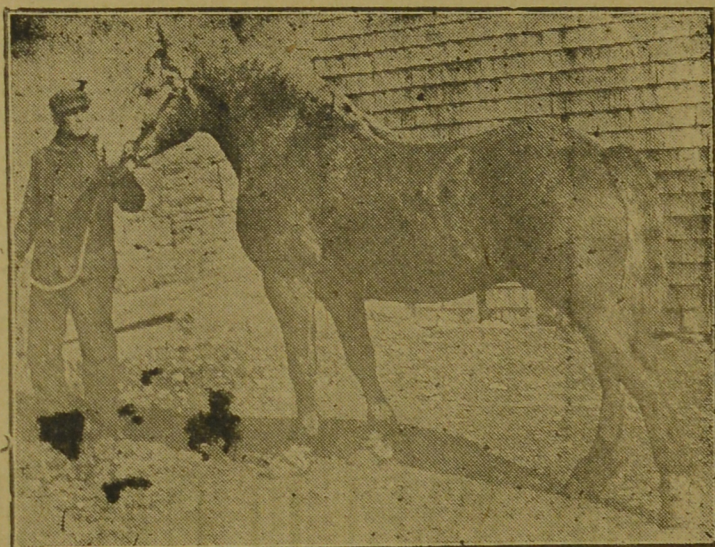

LIBERAL M. P. IS PRIVATE SOLDIER

Ottawa, May 19.—Private William F. Carroll, of the 185th Cape Breton Battalion, on leave of absence from his commanding officer, dropped quietly into the Commons yesterday afternoon and took his seat as Liberal M. P. for South Cape Breton.

There are many honorary colonels in the house, a few majors and one captain, but Mr. Carroll is the only one who is serving in the ranks and preparing to take his turn in the trenches with "the boys" who have enlisted with him.

Private Carroll is one of the youngest members of the House, and one of the ablest. He has made a real sacrifice in going into the ranks, and from the financial standpoint is one of those who could least afford it. He is married and has three young children to support from his earnings as a barrister. He has been training with his battalion for the last two months.
