## McNAMARAS BOTH ENLISTED FOR SERVICE IN 228TH BATTALION

### Six Professional Hockey Players and Seven Pro- minent Amateurs Have Joined Same Unit.

North Bay, Ont., May 18.—Six well known professional hockey players, members of various teams in the National Hockey Association and the Pacific Coast League, as well as seven prominent amateurs, enlisted yesterday in the 228th Battalion for service overseas.

Amongst them are the McNamara brothers, Harold and George, the famous "dynamite twins," who were formerly with Toronto teams, and who were first going to join George Kennedy's battalion, and then the Auxiliary Patrol Service; Duncan of the Vancouver team, "Roxy" Beaudro of the Kenora Thistles, and Jack Brown and Gordon Keats of the Toronto, will get into khaki at once. Most of the seven amateurs are high class performers, who refused to take the professional plunge, although they had attractive offers from the N.H.A. and Pacific Coast League.

## PHILLIES FIGHTING SUIT OF BALTIMORE FEDERALS

Philadelphia, May 18.—The Philadelphia National League Club filed its answer today in the United States District Court to the suit brought by the Baltimore Federal League Club to recover \$300,000 damages for the alleged violation of the Sherman Anti-Trust law. The answer denies generally and specifically some of the charges in the plaintiff's bill, denies knowledge of others and demands that the Baltimore club submit proof of them.

The other defendants, including the clubs in the National and American Leagues, members of the National Commission, and James A. Gilmore, Charles Weeghman and Harry Sinclair of the Federal League, are expected to file answers soon.

following his orders. The Hon. Mr. Baxter replied that he would "not let them have one damn bit of information."

Hon. Mr. Landry then spoke up and said that when Mr. Dugal came to his office, accompanied by Mr. Veniot, and requested to be shown a list of the securities held by the Prudential Trust Company, he had refused to allow Mr. Veniot to see them at all and would only let Mr. Dugal see them on condition that he would pledge his word of honor not to divulge their contents. I remember that Hon. Mr. Morrissey and Colonel Guthrie spoke up and stated that this was a dangerous proceeding, as Mr. Dugal would naturally tell his people that he could not get information, which they were justly entitled to have.

They All Were Told.

I omitted, Mr. Editor, to state that earlier in this meeting, before much of this conversation took place Hon. Mr. Baxter, the attorney general, produced the telegram that he had received from Premier Clarke, regarding the calling of this special meeting to consider the charges against me, which telegram was referred to in Premier Clarke's telephone message to me. It was at this time that I related to the members of the government present, and in the presence of Colonel Guthrie, all that had passed between Premier Clarke and me over the telephone, as I have outlined very fully above, and Colonel Guthrie also at that time spoke up and corroborated the delivery of the message from Premier Clarke to me, through him, regarding the "play sick" and "go away" proposition, as set out above.

## FULTON MUST BEAT DILLON OR MORAN OR NOT MEET WILLARD

### Heavyweight Champion Draws Line—Tortorich Says Fulton Does Not Show Sufficient Class.

New Orleans, La., May 18.—Fred Fulton, Minnesota Giant, must defeat either Frank Moran of Pittsburg, or Jack Dillon of Indianapolis, considered the best two heavyweights in the world trailing Jess Willard, before he can expect to get a match here over the twenty-round route with the champion.

Dominick Tortorich, local promoter, who owns the largest arena and who has produced all the championship fights staged here, made this announcement yesterday. Tortorich has seen both Willard and Fulton, and figures that Fulton would be no match for the champion unless he has improved.

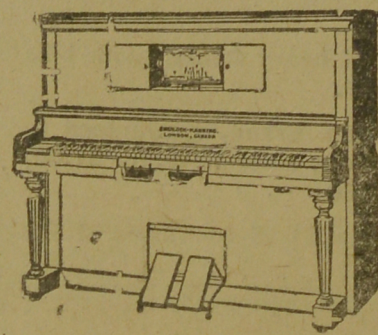
