SUCCESSFUL OPERATION

EGG-LAYING CONTEST

A pen of Barred Rocks owned by John Moore of Scotch Lake, York Co., led in the New Brunswick egg-laying contest last week with 53 eggs and 61.4 points. Arthur Pringle's pen of White Leghorns still lead the contest with 2282 eggs which have scored 2624.3 points.

Ontario is said to raise most of the onions used in New Brunswick during the fall and winter. It is estimated that about five thousand bags come to Fredericton, so the amount for the whole province must run into a large figure.

CONFERENCE TODAY

Renewal of contracts between coal operators of the Grand Lake district and the New Brunswick Electric Power Commission is being discussed today in a conference taking place at Minto. Existing contracts for supplying coal for the commission's steam plant at Newcastle Landing expire at the close of the fiscal year, October 31. Hon. E. A. Reilly, chairman of the commission was expected here today to attend the conference.

South Devon Fuel and Tugboat Co. Report Slack Season.

PULP BEING HELD

Madawaska Lumber Co. Not Sending Pulp Down River

The present will be a slack season in pulp rafting operations in this vicinity of the St. John river, according to A. H. Sewell, manager of the South Devon Fuel & Tugboat Company.

Last year at this time the Devon concern was busily engaged in "booming" operations for the Madawaska Lumber Company, with whom they were under contract to raft and boom thousands of feet of pulp which had burst the boom at Grand Falls. The activity last year lasted up until the sealing up of the river and furnished a large number of men with employment.

Charles Laquay, of Van Buren, Maine one of the head officials of the Madawaska Lumber Company was in the city earlier this week and notified Mr. Sewell that the company would not be bringing any pulp down river this fall. Ten thousand cords will be held over for another year.

Cessation of the usual pulp rafting operations will mean lack of employment for a number of men in this section of the province. The fifty thousand or so cords that were drifted down river last year furnished work

N. B. APPLES ARE BEING SHIPPED TO EGYPTIANS

First Time in History N. B. Apple Goes to That Mart. SHIPPED TODAY

Secial Varieties selected by the Department of Agriculture

Seventy-five boxes of specially selected New Brunswick apples are going forward today from Saint John to Alexandria, Egypt, the first shipment of its kind to leave this province for the Egyptian market.

The shipment, especially packed and selected by the Horticultural Division of the Provincial Department of Agriculture, has been taken from the orchards of the Saint John Valley Fruit Company and W. W. Hubbard orchards at Burton. Hon. Lewis Smith, in making the announcement yesterday, regarding this shipment of New Brunswick apples to Egypt, said the fruit was going forward with the object of testing the suitability of the principal varieties of apples grown in this province to the Egyptian market, with the further idea in mind of opening an outlet for a portion of the provincial apple crop.

Different Varieties

The varieties being tested on the first shipments are Dudley, Alexander, Wolf River and Wealthy and a comparison is being made between the pre-cooling of the fruit before shipment and shipment without pre-cooling. The arrangements for this shipment of New Brunswick apples has been made by the Department of Agriculture and for some weeks past the details of the shipment have been in charge of J. K. King, recently appointed Deputy Minister of Agriculture.

The comparative value and popularity or suitability of different sizes is being tested, the range of sizes packed being from seventy two to one hundred


