

DAVIDSON COMMISSION HAS FINISHED ITS WORK

Counsel on Both Sides Submit Written Arguments—As Yet no Report Has Been Made

Ottawa, June 28.—The Davidson Commission cleared the slate this afternoon of all the investigations into war purchases so far referred to the commission by the government. The last bit of evidence taken was in regard to the allegation that the Auburn woolen mills, of Peterborough, had supplied khaki to the Department of Militia in which there was a cheapening mixture of shoddy. The concluding evidence on this branch of the commission's enquiries went to exonerate the company.

The written argument of counsel in the small arms ammunition sale to the Admiralty via Wesley Allison and the Vickers company has been placed in the hands of Sir Charles Davidson, with the exception of the summing up of H. H. Dewart, K.C., the Liberal counsel, who wired today from Toronto that his argument had been mailed and would be in the hands of the commissioner tonight or tomorrow morning.

All that now remains for Sir Charles Davidson to do is to submit to the government his findings on the evidence taken in the score or so of cases investigated from coast to coast since May of last year. As yet no report on any of the subjects inquired into has been made.

HEAVY FIGHTING ON WESTERN FRONT

London, June 28.—The War Office communication issued tonight says:

"During last night there were raids and patrols entered enemy trenches at several points, bombing the enemy and inflicting casualties.

"Near Angres one of our raiding parties found the enemy trenches badly damaged by shell fire. The enemy apparently had suffered from gas we had successfully discharged from our dug-outs. A particularly successful raid was carried out by the Highland Light Infantry near the Vermelles-La Bassee road, when 46 prisoners and two trench mortars were captured and two enemy mine shafts were destroyed, with the loss of only two men.

"Today the enemy exploded a small mine near Neuve Chappelle and another near Hulluch, but excepting slight damage to one of our saps they achieved no other result. We successfully exploded two mines southward of the Bethune-La Bassee Canal. Bad weather yesterday prevented much flying."

BRITISH STEAMER TOWED INTO PORT

Savannah, Ga., June 28.—The British steamer Wearbridge, which went aground in the river here Monday, was pulled into deep water last night and towed back into port for a survey.

The damage was slight it was said. The Wearbridge cleared for London with a cargo of timber, naval stores and tobacco valued at \$342,881. The vessel is of 2602 tons.

"In Champagne, after intense artillery preparation, the Germans succeeded in penetrating some of our small positions in the direction of the Thure salient. They were driven out soon afterwards by counterattacks.

"On the left bank of the Meuse the bombardment continued with big shells in the sectors of Avocourt and Chaman-court. Preparations for an attack going on in the German trenches east of Hill 304 miscarried under our artillery fire.

"On the right bank we made some progress with the grenade north of Hill 321 and in the neighborhood of the Thiaumont Wood."

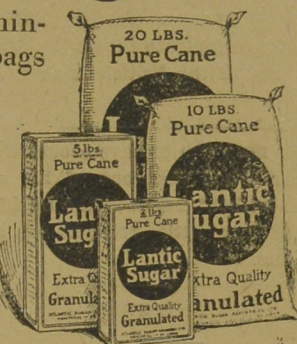

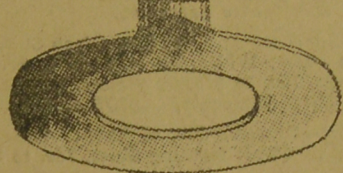
