BIG OFFERS MADE
FOR WILLARD-MORAN
TEN-ROUND BOUT

Thirty-Five Thousand the Latest--Promoters now In Frenzied Finance Stage.

New York, Jan. 21--James Johnson, manager of the Madison Square Garden, announced tonight an offer of \$35,000 to Jess Willard and \$20,000 to Frank Moran for a ten-round boxing match here the latter part of March.

New York, Jan. 21--The efforts of the various fight promoters to sign Jess Willard and Frank Moran for a ten-round bout in this state, have reached the frenzied finance stage, wherein the successful bidder is likely to surpass all previous records, although he may not find the venture profitable. At the present time three proposals have been made for the services of the heavyweights.

BIG OFFERS MADE.

One gives Willard a \$32,000 guarantee, or forty-five per cent. of the gate receipts and fifty-one per cent. of the moving picture profits. A second offers \$23,500 flat guarantee and a \$5000 bonus for signing, while the third provides that the champion shall receive \$60,000 for two ten-round bouts.

Moran, in the role of challenger, is not so liberally treated, although the offers to him would make the old-time pugilists green with envy. One promoter promised the sorrel-topped boxer \$15,000 for his end of the bout with Willard, another raised this to \$17,000 and the third offers \$30,000 or his services in two ten-round bouts.

All these propositions are based on a ten-round no-decision bout to be held in or near New York City within the next three months. Nothing like these sums has ever been put up for such a contest in the past history of the ring. The record purse of, of course, the \$101,000 given by Tex Ricard for the Jeffries-Johnson fight at Reno, Nev., July 4, 1910.

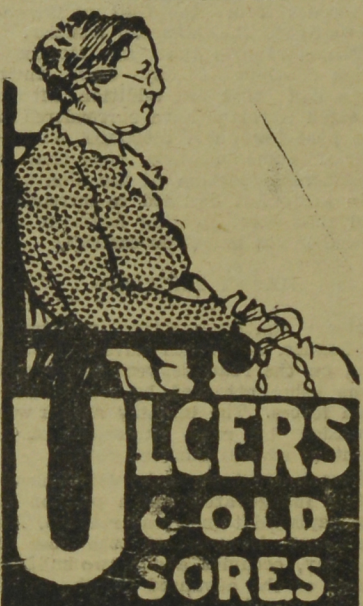
HIGHLANDERS PURCHASE
THREE FEDERAL PLAYERS

New York, Jan. 21--The New York American League Baseball Club secured three more Federal League players by purchase today. The star of the trio is Nick Culllop, formerly the leading pitcher of the Kansas City Club, who ranked fourth in the Federal League twirling average at the end of the 1915 season.

The other two players are Joe Gedeon, who signed with the Newark Federals after the closing of the last playing season, and the big league veteran Herman (Germany) Schaefer. Gedeon, a hard hitting second baseman, played with the Salt Lake City team last summer, having a batting average of .317 and a fielding average of .932. Schaefer, who is a valuable utility infielder and coach in addition to his ability to amuse the crowds with comedy from the coaching box, will be used in a general capacity.

The club also released three players, Pitchers Brown and Hays going to the Louisville Club and outfielder Daley to the Vernon Club of the Coast League.

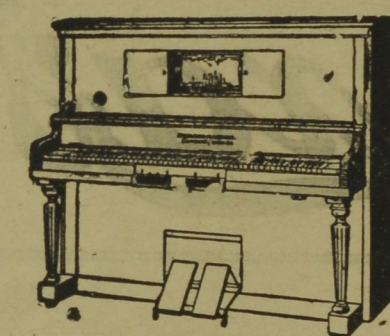
