A Prospect That the World Conference May be Resumed

Rumored In London That Further Negotiations Are Awaiting a Statement by President Roosevelt on the Stabilization of Currency--The NRA Has Removed An Obstacle.

MONTREAL, Sept. 30—The Star's London correspondent cables the following to his paper:

"Hopes have been revived of an early resumption of the World Economic Conference, rumor having it that further negotiations are waiting only on the statement which President Roosevelt is expected to make shortly on the currency stabilization policy of his government. The improvement in American conditions, brought about by the resolute handling of internal problems by the National Recovery Administration has removed the obstacle which blocked the way to international co-operation last July, and these seems no reason now why the United States—refreshed and recuperating under the New Deal—should not enter into negotiations for the regulation of external problems with optimism.

Should the British Government now definitely align the pound with the dollar in parallel schemes of reflation, gain strength in the country, there would seem to be adequate reason for the resumption of international discussions.

RAILWAY MEN VOTE IN FAVOR OF A STRIKE

The Result of the Vote Has Created Little Surprise — Railway Officials Make No Comment on Situation.

Montreal, Sept. 29—With their hands strengthened by a vote among about 20,000 members in favor of a strike, leaders of the railway running trade were tonight considering the next step in their fight against a second 10 per cent cut in basic wage rates.

Since the tabulation of the vote was completed yesterday the twenty-one general chairmen and five union vice-presidents have been in conference behind closed doors. Announcement of the result of the strike ballot was made today after the railways were first notified as a courtesy, but the figures for and against were not revealed.

The bare announcement that the men had given the union leaders power to call a strike was not accompanied by any statement as to future action, although rumors about their headquarters were that another wage conference would be held shortly with all way heads.

From the railways no comment was forthcoming. The result of the vote probably occasioned little surprise, however, as it had been freely predicted for several days.

If further efforts to settle the question amicably should fail, the union heads would have to decide the date of the strike and make other preparations. The question of whether railway workers outside the running trades would join in a walkout would be considered. A co-operative associative association of railway labor unions has been formed to deal with this among other questions.

The second cut in basic rates went into effect on May 1st. A previous

SEES QUICK CHANGES IN THE UNITED STATES

London, Eng., Sept. 30—Montagu Norman, governor of the Bank of England, asserted today that the changes in America are so great and so continuous that the information he obtained up to the time of his departure from the United States a fortnight ago is already out of date.

"So far as America is concerned," Mr. Norman said at the semi-annual court of the governors of the bank, "it is two weeks at least since I was there and in those two weeks a new situation and almost a new country has grown up there.

"So continuous and so great are the changes that no one who is not on the spot is up to date.

"Nothing, therefore, that I have found while I was in America would be of any use or interest to you. You will have to read the newspapers day by day to see what is happening there."

MR. J. K. KING GAVE A TALK ON AGRICULTURE

Deputy Minister Urges Grown Products In Greater Use of Home-New Brunswick.

Saint John, N. B., Sept. 30—New Brunswick agriculture needs the whole-hearted support of every resident of this province if it is to develop to its fullest extent, said J. K. King, Fredericton, deputy minister of agriculture, yesterday afternoon, addressing the Union of New Brunswick Municipalities at the Admiral Beatty Hotel.

Giving practical examples of New Brunswick products being taken for a "joy ride" to Montreal and other outside markets, "with very little profit to the producer", while apples, for example, from British Columbia, and California, and a ready sale within this province, the deputy minister urged the municipal officers at the convention to "get behind the agricultural products of New Brunswick" and to preach the gospel of "use home-grown products."

Affects All

Agriculture directly affects 50 per cent of the population of New Brunswick and when this 50 per cent is deprived of its purchasing power through reduced prices for farm products, the result materially affects the other 50 per cent in the towns and cities, Mr. King said, pointing out that each year millions of dollars which could be left with the farmers of this province are going out of it in payment for agricultural products imported for consumption within New Brunswick.

Nowhere else in the Dominion are there better farms or more favorable farming conditions than in New Brunswick the speaker said. He displayed attractively-wrapped packages of New Brunswick "McIntosh Reds" which he said equalled the best produced elsewhere.

Apple Shipments

Referring to apples shipped from New Brunswick to Montreal, Mr. King said the average profit on a barrel of apples to the grower in this province in such shipments is 47 cents. "Can the producer pay his fixed obligations, including taxes, and buy what things he would like to buy on such meagre profits?" Mr. King asked. Railway transportation alone required 60 cents a barrel in this transaction, he added.

In past years, said Mr. King, colleges, government departments, and others have been urging the farmer to produce more and better products, "but they have left him there, left him to market his own goods, where he might."

Salesmanship

"What is needed is more salesmanship, attractive methods of marketing the farm products, and intelligent methods in disposing of them."

Declaring "you can't have a prosperous country unless agriculture prospers", Mr. King pointed out that while other parts of the world might be suffering from overproduction, such was not the case in New Brunswick. Egg production alone in the province falls short of domestic needs by 3,000,000 dozens a year, while statistics show 125,000 hogs are imported annually into the Maritime Provinces.

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Guarantee to the C. P. R. Said to Have Been Renewed

Winnipeg Paper Has a Report From Ottawa To That Effect—Amount of the Guarantee Is \$69,000,000 and Was Given To Canadian Banks.

OTTAWA, Sept. 30—The Winnipeg Free Press is publishing a despatch from its Ottawa correspondent today to the effect that the Federal Government within the past several weeks has extended a guarantee of \$69,000,000 to the Canadian Pacific Railway.

The guarantee is said to have been given to Canadian banks to finance the railway to this amount. The Bank of Montreal is said to have been the chief financial agent involved.

The action is declaredly taken under the section of the 1933 Relief Act which gives blanket authority to the Government.

CONFERENCE IS PROPOSED IN RELIEF PLAN

Municipalities Convention Asks Government To Confer with Municipal Secretaries.

Saint John, N.B., Sept. 30—Delegates to the Union of New Brunswick Municipalities convention yesterday afternoon decided to ask the provincial government to call a conference of county secretaries before enforcing new regulations governing the administration of direct relief.

Detailed consideration of the new relief regulations was given by the convention and a motion to ask the government for a conference of county secretaries was sponsored by Secretary W. A. Ross, of Saint John County, who expressed the view that the secretaries would be in the best position to go into the new code of regulations with the government and to suggest certain changes, in view of their experience in administering relief.

The motion was practically unanimously supported. Commissioner R. W. Wigmore was presiding as chairman of the resolutions committee.

Special attention was given to Sections 4, 7, 8, 9 and 10 of the new regulations. These deal chiefly with the organization which the government desires set up in each municipality for the administration of relief, and the system to be followed.

Rural communities are principally affected by the new regulations referred to and it is there that the municipal authorities fear a material increase in expenses will result from the system which the government wants adopted. It was pointed out that in the cities and larger centres adequate organizations for the distribution of relief, practically along the lines suggested in the new regulations, are already established.

Some delegates pointed out, however, that the new rules are aimed at eliminating discrepancies in relief distribution. One warden told of an instance where the number of people said to be receiving relief was 200 more than shown in the last census as the population of the parish in question.

Resolution Opposed

Other resolutions were given further consideration by the convention, which is sitting regularly as a resolutions committee. Delegates from the County of Charlotte were unsuccessful in seeking support for a resolution which would enable them to license non-resident peddlars of the products

OPEN SEASON FOR GAME FISH CLOSES TODAY

The St. John, Miramichi Rivers Included — The Nashwaak Open Until Oct. 15th—Season Not a Good One.

The angling season for salmon and trout on the Saint John River and Miramichi River closes today, but angling for salmon on the Nashwaak River will be legal until October 15th. Due almost entirely to weather conditions, the angling season, on the open waters of New Brunswick has not been a good one, but the number of visiting anglers, particularly on the Miramichi, has kept up fairly well. There was a good run of fish on the stream in the spring, which brought many visiting anglers to the province and all made good catches.

During the summer months the guides who operate on the upper Miramichi enjoyed very good business during the months of July, but since that it has been nothing to brag about. Jack Russell, camp proprietor of Ludlow, had many bookings for September, but the water dropped and he requested most of his parties to remain at home. During the past week conditions improved on the Miramichi and a number of salmon and trout were taken by fly fishermen.

At Hartt's Pool

Low and warm water destroyed the angling at the Hartt's Island pool during the months of July and August. There was an improvement during September, but few non-resident anglers made their appearance. The two largest salmon taken at Hartt's Island pool were caught during September by Perry D. Perkins, of Saint John and Charles Pitcher, of Kingsclear. They each weighed twenty six pounds. Capt. Charles A. Campbell of New Brunswick, New Jersey, with Raymond Currie of this city as guide, caught the largest fish taken by a non-

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of the farm and sea in that county.
