TAMMANY OVERTHROWN

The municipal election yesterday in New York, the largest city on this continent, was one of the bitterest in the history of the city and created widespread interest. It resulted in the complete overthrow of the Tammany ring, which has been in supreme control in the city's municipal machinery for upwards of fifteen years. Major L. H. Laguardia, who is of Italian extraction, was the winner, and when full returns are completed will have a plurality of little less than three hundred thousand. Mr. Laguardia is a Republican and ran on a fusion ticket. The runner up was Joseph H. McKee, who ran on a recovery ticket and had the active support of Hon. James S. Farley, Postmaster General in the Roosevelt Cabinet. John P. O'Brien, who succeeded the famous Jimmy Walker for the balance of his unexpired term in January last, was the Tammany candidate, and was third in the poll in the mayoralty race.

Mr. Laguardia had the active support of Judge Seabury who took an active part in unearthing the grave scandals that had developed under the Walker regime. Judge Seabury probably did more than any other man to arouse the public conscience of the city against the shocking condition of affairs that had developed under the rule of the Tammany bosses. Mounting taxation and a greatly increased public debt were also factors in bringing about the downfall of the Tammany Tiger.

The new mayor has a huge problem on his hands, but fortunately he will have the support of at least ten of the sixteen members of the Board of Estimates, which will enable him to keep a close grip on taxation and public expenditures. He has shown himself to be a man of indomitable courage, and the generous support given to him by people of all shades of politics will undoubtedly prove an incentive to him in performing his responsible duties.

The downfall of Tammany Hall, the most powerful political organization in the world, will undoubtedly rank as one of the major political events of the present year.

A WET VICTORY

Voting in six American States on the 18th Amendment took place yesterday and while North and South Carolina remained in the dry column, Ohio, Pennsylvania and Utah voted wet by large majorities, Kentucky also voted on the question, and the votes are being counted today. Thirty three states had previously voted to repeal the amendment and the addition of Utah, Pennsylvania and Ohio make the required two-thirds of the states needed to remove it from the constitution, even should Kentucky go dry, which is unlikely. Prohibition became law in the great republic in 1914 under a Democratic government and it will cease to be law in December 1933, under a Democratic administration. It was inaugurated as a war time measure in 1914 and had the approval of a great majority of the people. In January 1920 it was again passed by Congress over the veto of the late President Wilson, who took the ground that such a law could not be successfully carried out in times of peace. Time has demonstrated that the President was right and the congressmen and senators were wrong.

As the result of a carousal in a Montreal rooming house a young man named Aseltin is dead and another named Hill is in hospital with a broken nose and when he recovers will face a charge of manslaughter. Hill and Aseltin picked two girls up on the street and persuaded them to go to a rooming house. They engaged two rooms, imbibed freely and the men after disrobing compelled the girls to do likewise on threatening to choke them. The girls finally locked them-

selves in a bathroom, and the men engaging in a quarrel, Aseltin was thrown down a flight of stairs. The police were called and arrested Hill. Dr. Fontaine who held an autopsy on the body of Aseltin, stated that he had consumed 32 ounces of liquor.

In view of the vote yesterday on the 18th Amendment, there will naturally be much curiosity to know what the governor of North Carolina said to the governor of South Carolina when he learned that both states had landed in the dry column.

MARKET TODAY

HAD AVERAGE PATRONAGE

The Phoenix Square market this morning was of average size. A varied supply of foodstuffs was on sale. Prices showed only a slight change from last Saturday's offerings. Eggs were scarce and showed a slight advance. A small supply of cranberries was selling for 15 cents a quart. The heavy snow and cold weather kept many buyers at home and demand generally was slow.

FIVE KILLED IN

ELECTION ROW

IN KENTUCKY

New York, N. Y., Nov. 7.—Guns in the hands of quick-tempered voters slew five men around balloting stations as Kentucky voted on the repeal and state issues. Another man was stabbed as he intervened in an election argument.

Eight-five arrests were made in New York as a force of more than 18,000 sought to maintain order. Electioneers reported many cast questionable votes—the Honest Ballot Association claimed 10,000 illegal votes were registered—and arguments blackened the air.

Blackjacks were used in one case, with a half dozen beaten into unconsciousness in the melee; knives flashed in another and one man was seriously wounded.

Disorders centred in Manhattan's lower east side, a Tammany stronghold. Fiorello La Guardia, the successful fusion candidate for mayor, threatened early to request the National Guard to maintain law and order in that section, but things quieted in the afternoon.

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MAY CUT FARES

ON THE LUXURY

STEAMSHIPS

Paris, November 8—Fare reductions on the luxury liners of the North Atlantic were reported imminent yesterday as ship-owners of the North Atlantic Conference assembled to fix new rates.

The conflict between the so-called "big ships" and the "little ships", raging for months, was understood to be near a settlement. The larger ship interests were understood to have won their demand for a thorough-going revision of rates, to avoid a disastrous rate war.

The new fare schedules which the shipping men are expected to approve, at the meeting this week, raises the fares on cabin-class ships, while reducing those on huge ships, while reducing those on huge express liners like the Europa, Ile de France and Empress of Britain.
