THE EASTER SUIT.

The woman who carries home dress-making to the extreme of making her suits is now turning her attention to the Easter suit. In selecting her material she will find in the stores beautiful displays of fashionable fabrics. Gabardines, serges, poplins broadcloths, whipcords, golines and Bedford cords are prominent. Then there are the novelty materials is checks and stripes that will be very modish. The season's favored colors are navy, Hague blue, tan, gray, reseda, black and white. The white tailored suit is very smart for early spring wear.

In development, youthfulness is the keynote. Skirts will continue short and will be ample in width. Many of the new models measured five yards at the bottom. The horizontal trimmings, such as folds, tucks, bands, and rushings, which are popular, emphasize the fullness. Many of the new skirts are shirred to the belt; others are gathered to a yoke and then again the skirt may fit snugly over the hips and ripple below. Both the gores and circular skirt are popular. Panels are seen on the newest models. Some of the Paris show pleated panels at the sides, the front and back being plain. Side trimmings are strongly favored by dressmakers. This may be in the form of plain pannels in matching or contrasting fabrics, horizontal pleats or cordings and in braided panels, and they extend the full length of the skirt.

In coats there is a great diversity. The suit coat may resemble the old-fashioned pea-jacket and extend just below the waistline, extending well over the hips. Some are in jaunty box effect and others are in two sections with the full lower section attached to a belt.

All are equally modish. Collars are low and open at the throat and there is a tendency to one or more capes falling from under the collar.

TAFFETA FOR TRIMMING.

Plaid taffeta is a most satisfying material to use for trimming. It offers unlimited opportunity for achieving original effects, for infusing one's personality in the embellishment of one's frock.

If there is a tendency to stoutness it is best to utilize plaid material in narrow binding, or veil it with a transparent fabric, thus softening its boldness of pattern.

If one is slender let the plaid be employed in the fashioning of wide

bands or flouncers, use it for a deep crush girdle, use it in the fashioning of under-bodice sleeves.

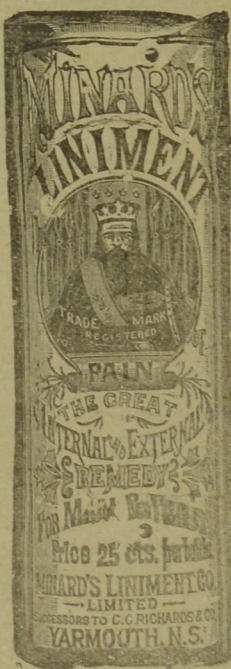
OTHERS HAVING SAME SAD EXPERIENCE

Lord Shaughnessy Talks of the Death of His Son in France.

Montreal, Que., April 3--When Lord Shaughnessy, president of the Canadian Pacific was interviewed in connection with the death of his son the Hon. A. T. Shaughnessy who was killed at the front on Saturday he said: "To his mother, myself and the family, the sacrifice is indeed cruel and almost overwhelming, but after all we are only passing through the same sad experience as thousands of others in every portion of the empire. He had a sweet wife and two little children and everything in the world to live for, but he recognized his duty and the attendant risk, if his example arouses a feeling of patriotism and responsiveness in those hundreds of military age amongst us of military age, many of whom are without his family cares, who thus far through indifference or because of bad leadership or petty local issues have failed to assume their responsibilities as citizens and subjects, we shall feel that there is additional compensation for the sacrifice."
