WOODSTOCK BOY KILLED IN ACTION

Clarence McCluskey, Former Member
Member of the 23rd Battery,
On the Roll of Honor.

Woodstock, June 28.—A telegram was received last night by George McCluskey, informing him of the death of his son, Clarence McCluskey, a member of the Royal Canadian Highlanders. The young man enlisted with the 23rd Battery at Fredericton and was recently transferred to the Highlanders and has seen much service. He has been twice wounded.

He was twenty years of age and at the time of his enlistment was an employee of the John McLaughlin Clothing Company. His father and mother, one sister and one brother are living here and will have the sympathy of the community in their bereavement, although they have the satisfaction of knowing that he died the death of a brave young soldier.

Mr. E. A. McKay remarked that Dr. Smith was leaving a united church, and nothing better than that could be said of any departing pastor. Personally he could say he had liked Dr. Smith even better as a man than as a preacher. The congregation took this opportunity to say farewell.

Other Denominations.

His Honor Judge Wilson was asked to speak on behalf of the other denominations of Fredericton. He said he was sure that other denominations desired to say a warm word of farewell. He always had been ready to assist other denominations. His interest in moral reform always had been great. On two occasions he had visited the Police Commission and did not hesitate to point out in what the Commission had been derelict in its duty. The loss of a moral force always was regretted. The ideas which Dr. Smith had implanted in the minds of the members of his congregation would be carried all over Canada. He was glad to have the opportunity of wishing him Godspeed.

Ministerial Association.

Members of the Ministerial Association were called upon. Rev. A. F. Newcomb, Rev. Thos. Marshall, Rev. J. J. Colter and Rev. Chas. Flemington spoke. All expressed regret that Dr. Smith was leaving Fredericton. The doctor had proven a brotherly helper and a most valued member of the Association. St. Paul's congregation was congratulated upon having been under his pastorate for the period of over seven years. His work in connection with church union, temperance and moral reform was particularly mentioned.

Miss Madge Kelley then sang special verses on the pastor's departure, to the air of "Will ye no come back again?"

Presentation.

Mayor Mitchell then called Dr. Smith to the platform, where Mr. W. M. Burns read the address from the congregation and presented the purse.

Mr. W. L. McFarlane then read the address from the Men's Class and presented the watch. The latter address had been prepared to be read at the close of the Men's Class for the summer, but it had been decided to delay the presentation till last night.

PTE. DUNCAN McKILLOP REPORTED KILLED IN ACTION

Widow Survives in This City—Deceased a Native of Scotland.

Mrs. Duncan McKillop, of 425 King Street, this morning received an official telegram from Ottawa informing her that her husband, Private Duncan McKillop, had been killed in action with the Canadian forces in France.

Private McKillop was a native of Scotland but had resided in Fredericton for several years before enlisting in the 26th Battalion in the autumn of 1914.

His mother and one brother survive in Scotland. His wife was formerly Miss Mount. There are no children.

Private McKillop was in his twenty-fourth year.

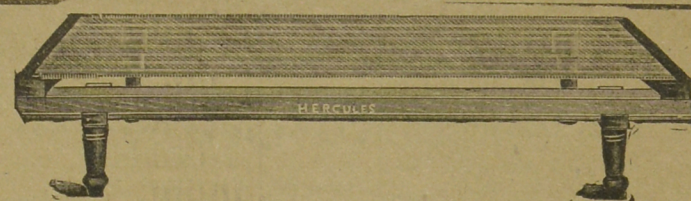

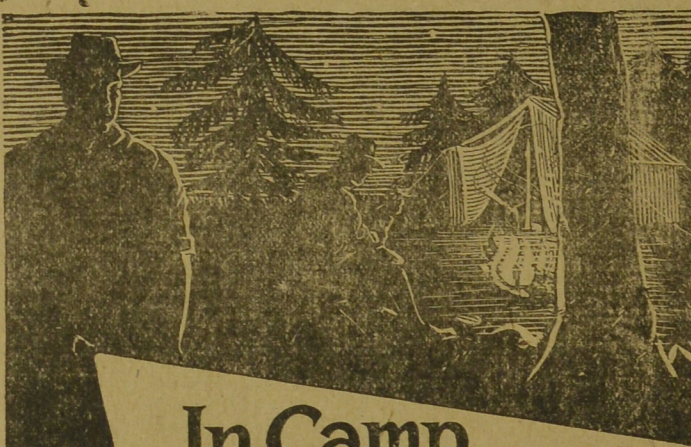

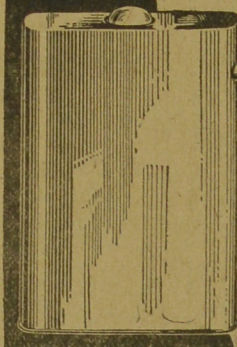
