this time he was less careful.

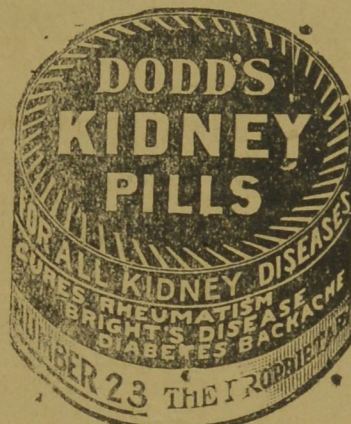
"I think we'd better go back
