DONOHUE FOUND
GUILTY, REMANDED
FOR SENTENCE

Petit Jury Brought in Verdict at One O'clock--Trial in Stennick Case Began This Afternoon.

William Donohue, of St. Marys, private in the 140th Battalion, was found guilty this morning in the Court of King's Bench of rape of Charlotte McCoy of St. Marys on April 13 last.

The petit jury brought in its verdict just before one o'clock this afternoon, the foreman, M. B. McNally, pronouncing it and stating that the verdict was unanimous.

The prisoner was then remanded for sentence by Judge Croket.

The Grand Jury brought in true bills yesterday afternoon in the case of the King vs. Charles Stennick and the King vs. William Donohue. The latter having no counsel, Mr. Chas. D. Richards was appointed by the court. He had a brief conference with his client and the selection of the petit jury was begun. The jury selected was as follows: Frank Brooks, Southampton; George Bradley, Nashwaak Village; C. C. Camp, Joseph Richards, M. B. McNally, Dell Gunter, Albert Kilburn, Fredericton; John Myshrahl, of Myshrahl Settlement; William Graham, Mouth of Keswick; Brunswick Fox, Central Kingsclear; Burns Akerley, Southampton; Odbur Cowperthwaite, Durham Bridge.

Evidence in Private.

Counsel for the defence is limited to twenty challenges. He exercised his right to challenge seven times in session.

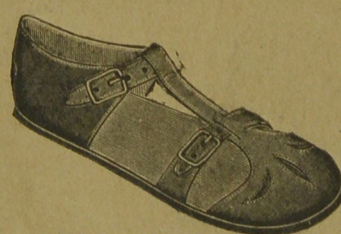
