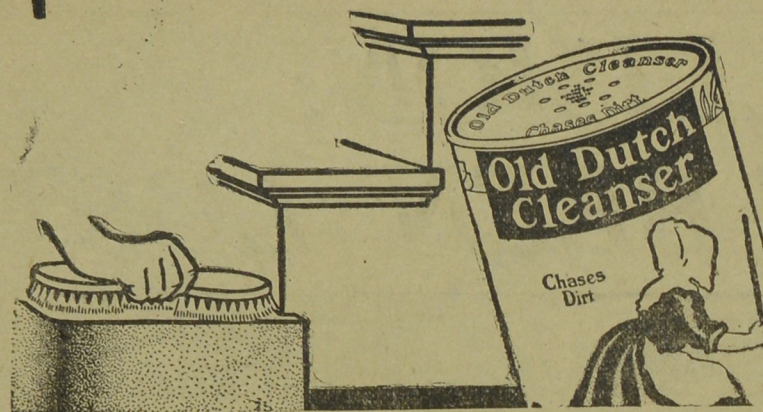

RUSSIAN LEADERS FOR ROUMANIAN FORCES

Skilled Russian Generals Take Command in Roumania, and Austro-Germans are Turned Back.

New York, Nov. 3.—A London despatch to a news agency here today says:

Major General Berthelot has disposed of his high command in a manner believed to be most effective against the highly organized German machine with which Field Marshals Von Falkenhayn and Von Mackenzien seek to destroy Roumania.

Russia's latest contribution to the Roumanian staff is Lieutenant General Vladimir Sakharoff, one of the most brilliant strategists in all the Czar's armies. He has arrived in Bucharest and will forthwith take command of the army of the Russians, Roumanians and Serbs that had to retreat before Von Mackenzien in Dobrudja.

General Bialyev, another distinguished Russian, has been assigned to the passes of the Lower Carpathians. General Ilesco, who organized the Roumanian armies prior to their entry into the war, probably will be responsible for the Wallachian front.

The Entente's devices for handling Field Marshal Von Mackenzien already have shown signs of maturity. The retreat in the Dobrudja, which ended more than a week ago, has been transformed into an offensive.

Official reports from Bucharest and Petrograd say that along the whole front from the Danube to the sea, Russian scouts have worked forward and are keeping the Tentons busy. The main Entente forces evidently are holding a line along a ridge about five miles from the Danube with ample fortifications.

In Transylvania the Roumanians are fighting with confidence, holding all Teuton assaults, while in the Jiu valley they are repulsing the Bavarians. The Austro-German sweep is now believed definitely to have been turned back.

CANADIAN ARTILLERY IS ACTIVE

London, Nov. 3.—The following communique is issued by the Canadian record office in London:

Canadian communique of October 19.—During the past week there have been no active infantry operations, although large patrols at night have reconnoitered the enemy positions.

Our artillery, despite unfavorable heavy rain, has maintained a steady bombardment of the German trenches, and many of these are now subject to close and direct observation, and any movement or activity of the enemy has immediately drawn a concentrated fire.

Upon one occasion in particular, a certain trench was reported to be full of Germans. Our guns were turned on and caused a very noticeable destruction. A heavy and monotonous task has been demanded of our men in the work of improving and consolidation of our lines. They have labored upon the worst of conditions. The weather during the day has been consistently cold and rainy, although at daybreak the sky has usually cleared and given a decisive promise of improvement.

The enemy has made no further attempt to retake the trenches recently captured by us.

Tucson, Ariz., Nov. 3.—Maclovio Mineaga, a Nogales, Arizona, lawyer, associated with a firm of American lawyers, was taken into custody last night at the Border City on a charge of conspiring with others to equip a revolutionary movement in Mexico. He surrendered when he heard there was a warrant for his arrest.

Concern is expressed by officers that the premature publication of the names of the 18 alleged conspirators here may have materially interfered with plans for rounding up persons alleged to be implicated in the plot.

RECRUITS FOR BRITISH NAVY.

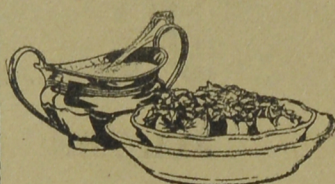

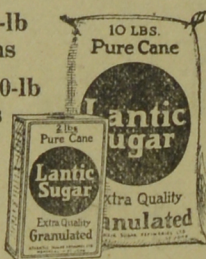

SHACKELTON AT NEW ORLEANS

New Orleans, La., Nov. 3.—Sir Ernest Shackleton, the Antarctic explorer, arrived here early today on the steamer Parismina from Colon, and departed several hours later for San Francisco on his way to rescue the ten members of the Shackleton party on the west side of the Antarctic continent.

The explorer said he expected to sail from San Francisco for Wellington, N. Z., November 8, going thence to Dunedin, where he and a rescue expedition will sail for the Antarctic on the Aurora. Sir Ernest said that after the rescue of the members of his expedition is accomplished, he plans to return to England and enter the war.

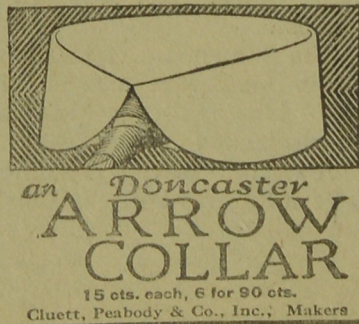

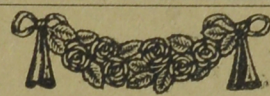

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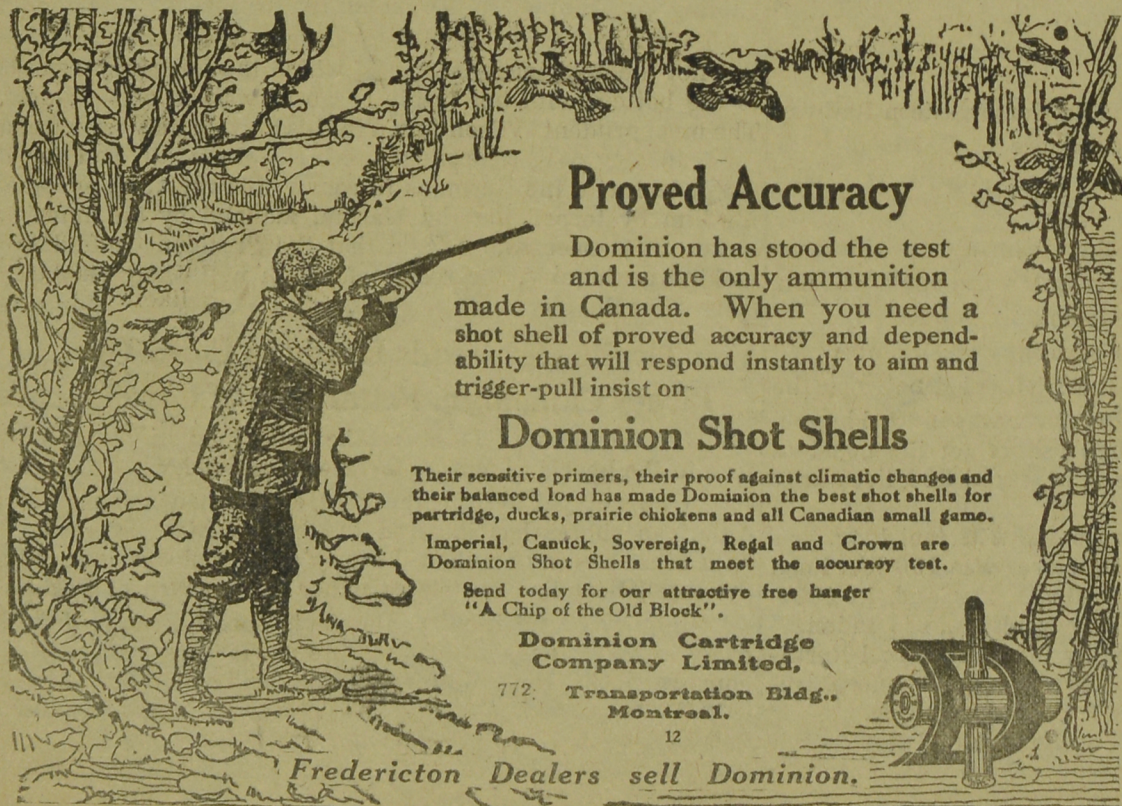
