ANOTHER SUBMARINE TO CROSS ATLANTIC

New London, Conn., Nov. 3.—The German armored submarine U-57, a sister ship of the U-53, which recently sank five vessels off the New England coast, is expected to act as a convoy for the undersea freighter Deutschland on her return trip to Germany, according to a statement tonight by Captain Paul Koenig.

The Deutschland's skipper added: "I would not be surprised if the armored submarine appeared off this coast while I am in port. You can't tell what the government will do."

In answer to questions, Capt. Koenig said he probably would make his homeward dash within the next ten days. He denied a report that he would go through the Cape Cod canal, saying nothing was to be gained by this route.

CHRISTMAS SHIP FOR ARMENIA.

Will Sail From New York About Dec. 1 with Food and Clothing.

New York, Nov. 3.—A Christmas ship, a United States naval collier, will sail from this port about Dec. 1, carrying 3,000 tons of food and 1,000 tons of clothing for war sufferers in Armenia, and Syria, it was announced here today by the American National Red Cross.

The collier's destination will be Beirut, Syria.

BRITISH SUCCEEDS IN MACEDONIA.

Paris, Nov. 3.—British troops, following up their successes against the Bulgarians on the left bank of the River Struma, in Greek Macedonia, have taken by assault the village of Alitsa, says the official statement issued today by the French war department.

AUSTRIANS LOST 15,000 MEN.

London, Nov. 3.—A Rome despatch to the wireless press says the first day of the new Italian offensive cost the Austrians the loss of 15,000 men.

GOVERNMENT TO SEEK ANOTHER EXTENSION

Toronto, Nov. 3.—Hon. A. E. Kemp, who stated that he came direct from cabinet deliberations at Ottawa, reached Toronto this evening, proceeded at once to a meeting of Ward One Conservative Association, and communicated to the meeting on behalf of the Dominion government its intention to seek from parliament another appeal to the British House for a further extension of its term of office.

He said: "If constitutional considerations were alone regarded, it would have been proper to have held an election in the autumn of 1914 or 1915.

"The higher consideration of the public interest and decent regard for public opinion were taken into account by the government and one extension of the parliamentary term was proposed for reasons which apply with equal, if not greater force, to such further extension as will make an election unnecessary during the continuance of the war.

"For these reasons the Government proposes to ask for such further extension as may be necessary, and upon the Liberal party will rest the responsibility of determining whether a war election shall be avoided, or whether party strife shall be precipitated and carried on during the pending struggle."

INDEFINITE COAL SHORTAGE.

And Panama Canal Authorities Will
Increase Rates for Coal.

Washington, Nov. 3.—Convinced that the present coal stringency is likely to continue indefinitely, the Panama Canal authorities have given formal notice to steamship lines of an advance of 50 cents per ton on coal sold to merchant ships passing through the canal. The new rates of \$8 per ton at Cristobel Colon, and \$9.50 at Balboa, however, will not go into effect until December 1 next, the date on which it is assumed all of the coal purchased by the government at the old price will have been disposed of.

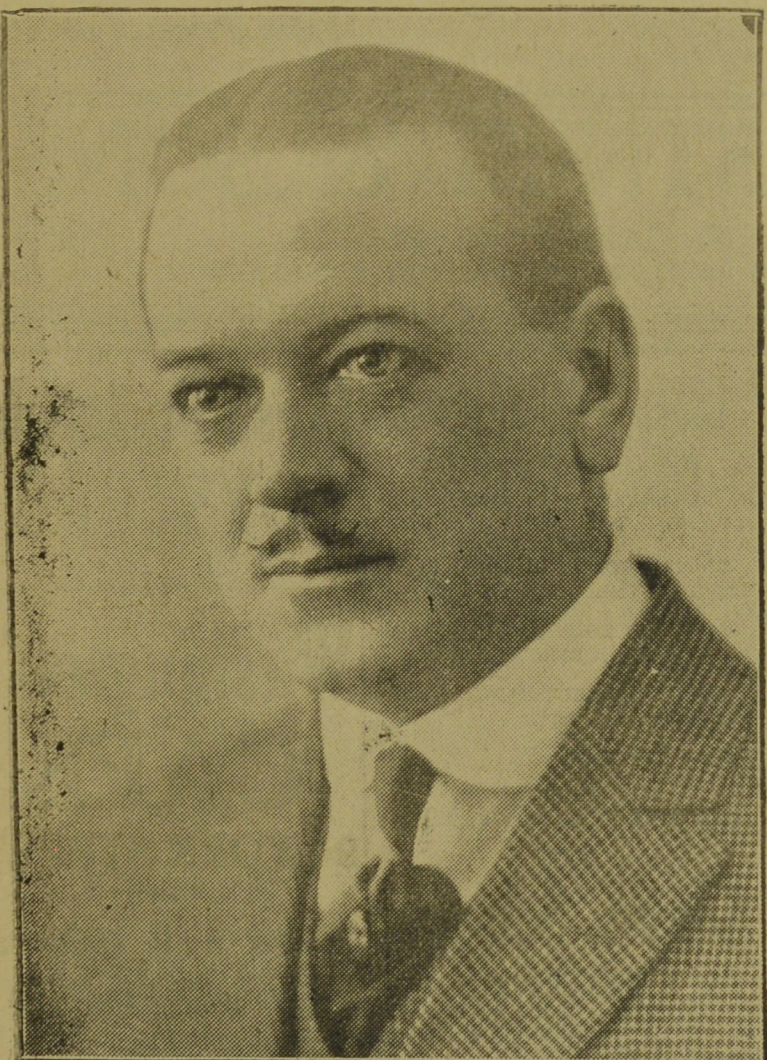

Will Appear at the City Opera House, Nov. 10th and 11th.

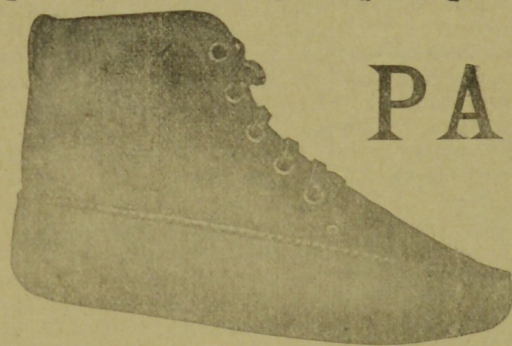

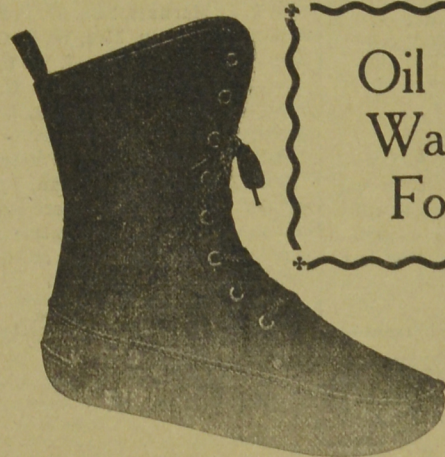
