Mrs. W. S. Carter has returned from a visit in St. John.

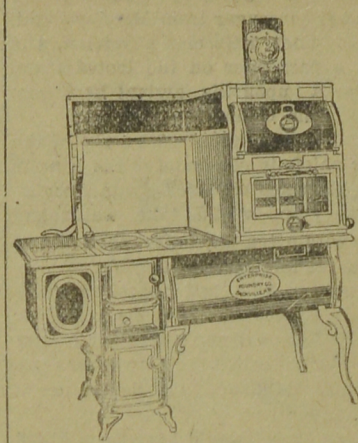
