Largest Collection.

Miss Beverly's donation was 14,250 coupons, which would net \$71.25 to the home.

Jumped Into River.
Miss Myrtle Black a stenographer, of Upper Sackville, attempted to end her life on Friday by jumping from the Memramcook bridge into the river. Roy Grass, a Western Union lineman, caught her with the aid of a grapple and pulled her from the water. After an hour's work she was restored to consciousness.

Going to England.
Mrs. A. H. Tweedie of this city, and Mrs. Charles Darcus, of Fern Hill, are to leave this evening for Montreal, where they will take passage for England to join their husbands, who are serving with the Canadian Expeditionary Force. Corp. Darcus was lately invalided from the front and is now in a convalescent home.

Leaving for Halifax.
Lieut. A. Laing, Canadian Army Service Corps, will leave tonight for Halifax, having been transferred to that station. Lieut. Love, who succeeded him in Fredericton, arrived some days ago. Mr. Laing made a large number of friends during the period of several months that he has been stationed in this city.

Shot by Mistake for Deer.
William Day, son of Mr. John Day, of Fredericton Junction, was shot through the thigh Friday morning by John Christie, of the same place. They were hunting deer a few miles north of the Junction. Christie fired at what he thought was an animal. Neither man knew the other was near. Day was attended by Dr. G. M. Bailey and taken to the General Public Hospital at St. John.

The Apple Show.
The New Brunswick apple show, which has been going on at St. John this week, closed last evening. Mrs. E. W. Darcus, of Fern Hill, Fredericton, was the largest individual prize winner, her total being \$83. F. C. and H. G. Smith, of Long Reach, came next with \$82.75, while Mr. W. B. Gilman, of Kingsclear, was third, with \$82.50. Mr. J. W. Clark, of Manguerville, secured \$18, and A. G. Dunphy, of Douglas, \$12.75.

Calhoun Co. Failure.
The creditors of the T. B. Calhoun Lumber Co. met yesterday at St. John and made arrangements for the disposal of the property. T. H. Somerville and H. J. White, manager of the Canadian Bank of Commerce at Moncton, were appointed inspectors. The liabilities of the company are understood to be about \$55,000, and the assets nominally \$45,000. The heaviest creditor is the J. E. Moore Co., about \$25,000 partly secured. The Calhoun Co. was one of the biggest lumbering companies of southeastern New Brunswick.

The Week-end Market.
The market this morning was larger than that of last week and the display of farm produce was varied and attractive. Potatoes were quite firm at \$3.50 per barrel and turnips were plentiful at 75 and 80 cents a barrel. Apples were also plentiful and brought all the way from \$2 to \$5 a barrel, the latter figure being paid for McIntosh Reds. Other prices were as follows: Lamb, \$1.25 to \$1.50 per quarter; chickens, \$1.25 a pair; eggs, 40c. a doz.; butter, 35c. a lb.; carrots, \$1.50 a barrel, live chickens, \$1 per pair, live ducks, \$1.25 a pair, pork, 13c. to 15c. lb., beef, 9c. and 10c. lb., cabbages, 5c. each.

Went Through Bridge.
From Boiestown comes the story that a man and a pair of horses went through a bridge at the mouth of the Taxis River recently, with the result that his wagon was broken and a horse seriously injured. The man was Mr. Lee Allain. He presented a bill to the Public Works Department for damage to his property, but the bill was returned, the Department disclaiming responsibility. It is said the bridge has been patched, but is still unsafe. The people of the vicinity are indignant on account of the neglect of public works in that section.

CHARGE OF SELLING LIQUOR TO INDIAN WOMAN DISMISSED

Accused Let go With Severe Lecture - Indian Woman Ordered to go Home - Discrepancies in Evidence.

The charge against a white woman residing in St. Marys, of giving liquor to an Indian woman, was dismissed by Police Magistrate Limerick. His Honor in dismissing the case gave a severe lecture to the accused, stating that she was liable to at least one month's imprisonment, and could be sent to jail for six months if convicted. He warned her not to be mixed up again with any Indian liquor cases. Her deposit was returned to her.

Matilda Bear, the woman from the Tobique Indian Reserve to whom the white woman was alleged to have given the liquor was given until this afternoon to leave by railway for Tobique. If found here after that time, she will be sent to jail for one month. In response to the magistrate, she said that she had come from Tobique on a return ticket but had sold the return half to a man, name unknown. Her husband, she said, was somewhere on the Tobique, but he was a "pretty old man."

Evidence was taken in this case yesterday and this morning. Raymond Hatty, a young Syrian, was on the stand this morning on behalf of the accused. His evidence in some particulars was directly contradictory to that of the accused. This was characteristic of the evidence given all through, the witnesses not telling the same stories. Young Hatty admitted to His Honor that he had been a witness in a previous case in which money had been

PRICES FOR TURNIPS FALLING SLIGHTLY BUT MOVEMENT KEEPS UP

District Near Fredericton Now Pretty Well Cleared - Used in Jam Manufacture - Potato Prices Remain Firm.

The movement of turnips from this section of New Brunswick to the United States continues, although there are indications that the market is becoming filled. Prices quoted today at the railway sidings are 75 cents per barrel in Fredericton and 65 cents outside. Large quantities were shipped this week. Shippers state that the district in the immediate vicinity of Fredericton is pretty well cleared of turnips.

Used in Jam Making.
It is understood that one reason for the heavy demand for turnips in the United States is their use in the manufacture of low grade jams and similar goods. The turnips are pulped, and after being colored and flavored, the pulp is put up under various labels.

Potato Market Firm.
There seems no tendency for the potato market to sag, and this is making farmers ask higher retail prices for their potatoes than they can get in Fredericton. Four dollars per barrel was asked in the country market this morning by some farmers, but there is no record of the price being actually paid. The regular price was \$3.50, with \$3.75 paid in a few cases. Some of the farmers who came in last night

paid witnesses to give certain evidence. He denied, however, that he had been paid anything in this case.

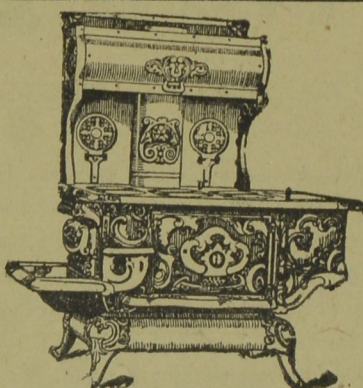

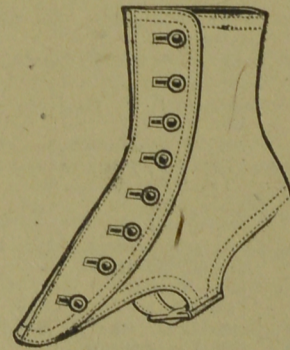
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
