

Washington Keeping An Eye on the Wheat Embargo in Dakota

Not Much Hope That It Will Have Much Effect
Either In North Dakota or Nationally—Fifteen
Per Cent of Wheat Yield Marketed.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 18—The Agricultural Adjustment Administration believes the North Dakota embargo on wheat has emphasized the low prices of grain "in a most dramatic way."

The administration is watching the embargo with the greatest of interest but with little hope that it can have any great effect upon the price of wheat either nationally or in North Dakota. It was pointed out that 15 per cent. of all wheat this season has already been sold and that North Dakota, in the meantime, does not have a large local wheat consuming market.

The price of wheat has fallen 15 per cent in three days. Administration officials attribute that simply to the increase in the value of the dollar, which was brought about by unsettled European conditions.

Embargo Applied

BISMARCK, N. D., Oct. 18—Governor William Langer, of North Dakota, today clamped down an unprecedented embargo that impounded the State's 60,000,000 bushels of wheat within its borders. It was a dramatic effort to force immediate federal action to help the farmer.

The embargo is now effective and continues "until revoked."

EGG-LAYING CONTEST COMING TO A CLOSE

**White Leghorn Pen of
Arthur Pringle, Stan-
ley, Has Good Lead;
May Have a 300-Egg
Record.**

The production of the birds in the New Brunswick Egg Laying Contest conducted at the Dominion Experimental Station, Fredericton, was 40.5 per cent for the week ending October 16th.

The White Leghorns owned by Arthur Pringle, Stanley, led in production for the week with 47 eggs and 56.4 points.

The Barred Rocks owned by Clarence R. Searle, Centre Napan, were in second position for the week with 44 eggs and 48.3 points.

The Barred Rocks owned by Wm. A. Sansom, Durham Bridge, were in third position for the week with 35 eggs and 41.1 points.

The pen of white Leghorns owned by Arthur Pringle, Stanley, is the leading pen to date with 2471 eggs and 2950.1 points.

The Barred Rocks owned by Harry Bedford, R. R. No. 3 St. Stephen, are in second position to date with 2368 eggs and 2453.3 points.

The Barred Rocks owned by Wm. A. Sansom, Durham Bridge are in third position to date with 2254 eggs and 2324.9 points.

White Leghorn had No. 2 owned by Arthur Pringle, Stanley, is the leading hen to date with 298 eggs and 342.1 points. This bird is pretty sure to cross the 300 mark.

Barred Rock hen No. 447 owned by George Wood, P.R. No. 1 Bayswater, is in second position to date with 253 eggs and 303.8 points.

Barred Rock hen No. 3 owned by W. J. White, Moores Mills, is in third position to date with 270 eggs and 297.4 points.

17-CENT DINNER BIG RELIEF TO GERMANY

Berlin, Oct. 1—A well-disciplined German public limited its dinner Sunday last to one "hot pot," without trimmings, soup, dessert and fruit, costing not more than 17 cents.

The restrictions were in accordance with a government injunction putting each German on his honor to limit his eating and turn over the balance of what the usual Sunday dinner would have cost to the winter relief fund.

Housewives had been supplied with copious suggestions on all manner of Irish stews and like dishes.

Restaurants, from the de luxe variety to cheap eating houses, and dining cars on trains, even the special cars carrying diplomats, were subjected to the same rule.

Customers cheerfully acquiesced. Storm troopers with collection boxes reaped a rich harvest.

A similar "simple life day" is planned for the first Sunday of every month during the winter.

AN ONTARIO ELECTION FOR NEXT SUMMER

Toronto, Oct. 17—"I hope you will be ready to get into the fight with us sometime next summer," Premier George S. Henry of Ontario tonight told members of the Macdonald Carleton Club of the University of Toronto—and thus intimated the next provincial election would be held next summer. Previous prognostications had included "in the near future," and "within a year."

THE PREMIER WAS HEARD AT LETHBRIDGE

**Tells Gathering That He
Will Not Give Way To
Clamor Either By Fear
or Favor.**

Lethbridge, Alta., October 17—Canada's prime minister, Rt. Hon. R. B. Bennett, addressed himself to the heart of the nation here today in an outspoken account of his personal anxieties during times of stress and the efforts of his government to solve the problems that had confronted the Dominion in recent years.

Addressing himself to those who charged the federal government with a responsibility which was mainly their own, the prime minister said: "To those people I can only say I have given all I had—when I need not—to serve Canada to the best of my ability. I will not imperil or wreck this country's institutions nor endanger its integrity. I will not give way to clamor, either through fear or favor." The Government would continue to assist in the way of public works and other relief undertakings. Mr. Bennett said, but would not at this time engage in any large scale of expenditures. "The reason is obvious when you look about at what is happening in the world today," Mr. Bennett added.

"With caution tempered by experience and on redsire to serve, we will give such assistance as may be in our power, consistent with the maintenance of our financial structure, our credit and our integrity," the prime minister pleaded.

"I have never been so proud to be a Canadian," Mr. Bennett continued, "as I have been in the last three years. Do you suppose I, who met and struggled with adversity in this new country during my early years, have no appreciation of your hardships, your anxieties and fears?" he asked.

"When you complain—and you have a right to complain—remember the trustees you selected to direct your affairs are doing their best for a country and a people they love just as much as you do," the prime minister exclaimed.

CATTLE RESCUED FROM MARSHES

Amherst, N. S., Oct. 17—Seventy-five head of cattle owned by A. G. MacLellan, Will Kent, Dickson Taylor, W. O. Bowser, Russell and Wylie Black and Levi Trenholm, were rescued today from a marooned position in the Amherst marshes. The cattle had been driven on to the low lying island by rising water and were poor off as regards food. The owners used boats to reach the animals. They had little difficulty in driving the animals along a water covered causeway to higher ground, although at some points the animals were almost swimming.

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Former Bank Clerk Faces a Murder Trial in Mexico

**Charles F. Whalley Is Accused of the Murder of
David B. Emeno, Native of Lunenburg, N. S.;
Foreign Colony of Mexico Expects the Case To
Be Sensational.**

MEXICO CITY, Oct. 18—The entire foreign colony of Mexico City, especially the British and Canadian, American branches of it is looking forward to one of the most sensational murder hearings in its history this month when Charles Frederick Whalley, 35-year-old former second lieutenant in the Royal Flying Corps of England, will be tried for the fatal shooting of David Emeno, 44, native of Lunenburg, Nova Scotia, and manager of the Bank of Montreal here.

Perhaps the most interested person in the outcome of the hearing, at which this said Whalley will plead insanity caused by a concussion of the brain in a "crack-up" while training, is Miss Louise Arnold, 22, American stenographer, engaged to Whalley. She has been visiting him in his cell at the Federal penitentiary daily, making his stay as comfortable as possible and doing all she can to bring about his acquittal.

DOCTORS TAKE A PEEK AT MAN 100 YEARS HENCE

Chicago's Oct. 18—Mr. 2033 won't have so many ailments to worry about if the prediction of Dr. George W. Crile of Cleveland comes true.

Dr. Crile, head of a surgical and medical clinic in the Ohio city, took a peek at the man of the next century yesterday and reported that he would have some causes for rejoicing. Not only would the man of 2033 enjoy longer life, he said, but he would be rid of such devastating diseases as tuberculosis and diabetes. By that time, he predicted, medical science will have conquered these two ailments.

By the time 2033 arrives the layman will have been educated to what physicians know now concerning the importance of local infections in the teeth and elsewhere as causes of diseases of the heart, blood vessels and kidney, and such ailments will be greatly reduced, Dr. Crile said. So will other infectious diseases.

But on the other side of the picture the doctor foresaw a possible increase in the heart, kidney and other organic ailments that are caused by nervous and mental strain, described by him as the "kinetic drive of environment conditions". And cancer he predicted, will still claim many victims, even though the nature of the disease may be eventually disclosed.

Dr. Crile was one of several speakers who addressed laymen in their language at meetings arranged by the American College of Surgeons which opens its annual clinical congress today.

A TEACHER WITH NO PUPILS

Falls City, Neb., Oct. 18—Miss Maide Fulton, is a school-teacher—that is, she was hired for that purpose by a rural district near Stella and she's drawing a salary for that purpose. The only thing wrong is that she doesn't have any pupils. Daily she opens the school, stays there the required number of hours and then goes home. Board members hope to settle her contract and close the school.

GERMANY TO LIVE UP TO HER OBLIGATIONS

**At Least This Is the
Statement Given Out
by the Spokesmen of
Hitler.**

Berlin, Germany, October 17—Chancellor Hitler's spokesmen declared tonight that Germany intends to live to treaty obligations even though she has announced her withdrawal from the League of Nations and the disarmament conference.

But to all questions regarding the Reich's plans after such withdrawal they gave the stock reply of Foreign Minister Kuntze von Neurath, that "the others now have the floor."

Replies to inquiries whether the government had purposely refrained from writing a formal letter of resignation from the League or whether this omission was accidental were cryptic.

One spokesman asserted that "one does not talk about that," and another explained, "I am sorry, but about that I can give you no information."

The inference was drawn that while Germany was quick to notify Rt. Hon. Arthur Henderson of the resignation from the arms parley she is in no hurry to leave the League.

When asked about their attitude regarding the Versailles and Locarno pacts and the League Covenant, spokesmen hastened to declare that Germany hastened to declare that Germany intends to fulfill these obligations.

TRAINING TABLE FOR CONVICTS
