MILITARY HONORS RENDERED BY THE RUSSIANS TO THE BRITISH FLAG

On the first of January our detachment holding Hamadan rendered military honors to the British flag, which was hoisted over the British consulate.

"In the region of Czartorysk, in Volhynia, and on the upper strip, we repulsed enemy attempts to approach our trenches. The enemy sustained heavy losses. Northeast of Czernowitz, in Bukowina, the fighting continues with unabated energy, our forces continuously advancing, despite numerous enemy counter attacks. The enemy's losses have been very great. We took another group of sixteen officers and 766 unwounded men prisoners, without counting the great number of wounded remaining on the battlefield."

ITALIAN TROOPS HAVE REPULSED AN AUSTRIAN ATTACK WITH HEAVY LOSSES

ROME, Jan. 3.—The following statement was given out by the Italian War Office tonight: "In the region of Lagazuoli, north of Falzarego, the enemy exploded several mines, releasing an avalanche of rocks, which however caused no damage. On the Carso on Sunday the enemy attacked our positions on Monte San Michele, but was repulsed with heavy losses."

LONDON, Jan. 3 (delayed).—The following British official statement was given out tonight: "On the southern part of our front a small portion of our troops made a successful bombardment attack last night. Today our artillery effectively bombarded several portions of the enemy's lines. Hostile artillery is active northeast of Loos and east of Ypres."

CONSTANTINOPLE, Jan. 3 (via London, Jan. 4).—The Turkish War Office tonight gave out the following statement: "On the Dardanelles front there have been heavy battles, with bomb throwing on both wings, and a temporary artillery fire along the whole line. A hostile cruiser and a monitor retreated after a temporary bombardment of our positions."

COUN. ERNEST STAIRS IS THE NEW WARDEN OF YORK

The January meeting of the Municipal Council of York county opened this morning with a large attendance of councillors. The election of Coun. Ernest W. Stairs of Southampton, to the office of warden was the principal item of business. There was no other nomination. Ex-Warden Harry Smith, on retiring from office, made an address in which he expressed good will toward the councillors and thanked them for the support given him during his term of office. He then escorted the new warden to the chair and installed him. Warden Stairs made an excellent speech, thanking the councillors for the honor conferred upon him. He then appointed the committees and adjournment was made in order to give the committees a chance to meet.

He thought that possibly a better choice might have been made but he did not wish to go contrary to the judgment of the council. (Laughter.) He felt sure there were many older councillors who would have been better fitted for the office. He had come to the council four years ago on an occasion on which thirteen new councillors had taken their seats. The incident had prompted Coun. Neill to say there never had been so much new grass at the council before. (Laughter.)

Continuing, Warden Stairs made an appeal for prompt attention to matters of business, as time was the great thing. He also made an appeal for generous contributions to the Patriotic Fund on account of the appeal for aid for the families of those soldiers already fighting in France.

COUN. CLARENCE A. GRANT SUFFERED TERRIBLE INJURY

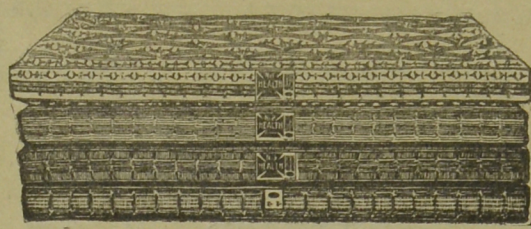
Coun. Clarence A. Grant, of Canterbury Station, is now lying in a critical condition in the Fisher Memorial Hospital, Woodstock, suffering from a broken upper and lower jaw and a broken nose. Plaster of Paris moulds are being used to keep the lower part of his face in shape while the bones knit, and he is fed through a tube.

Coun. Grant received his terrible injuries on Wednesday last, while he was harnessing a colt at his home. The animal kicked him in the face. Its hoofs were unshod; otherwise the Councillor would have been killed.

He was not rendered unconscious by the blow, but was able to go to the house, his son first breaking the news of the accident to the Councillor's wife.

A curious feature of the accident is the fact that Coun. Grant's father was killed at the same place, the Grant homestead, by being kicked by a horse thirty-three years ago last autumn.

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TRUE BILLS FOUND IN CRIMINAL CASES

CIRCUIT COURT

The Circuit Court met here this morning with His Honor Judge McKeown presiding. Two criminal cases were before the court. In The King vs Stephen B. Taylor, Hon. J. B. M. Baxter, the attorney general, appeared for the crown and Mr. P. J. Hughes for the defense. The defendant is charged with criminal libel against Hon. J. D. Hazen, minister of marine and fisheries. The defendant, who is an eccentric man of advanced years living at Sheffield, did not appear before the court this morning, having refused to come here to stand trial. The attorney general ordered Sheriff Howe to send a provincial constable to Sheffield by auto to arrest Taylor and bring him here. Constable James Roberts went to make the arrest.

In the King vs Barnes, the defendant is charged with having committed an assault with intent to do grievous bodily harm, having struck a man in the face with an axe during

the course of a quarrel at Pokick. R. B. Hanson appears for the crown, and P. J. Hughes for the defence.

In both cases true bills were brought in by the Grand Jury, of which W. S. Hooper was foreman.
