Fredericton's Big Fair is Away to a Splendid Start

Record Breaking Crowd Attended on Opening Day—The Great All-Feature Show Is Warmly Praised by Visitors—Every Department Now In Full Running Order—Large Crowds Expected To Swell Attendance Total.

The Fredericton Exhibition, which has the distinction of being the oldest agricultural fair on the American continent, got away yesterday to a splendid start. While weather conditions were somewhat of a handicap there was a large attendance, which included many visitors from Maine and other outside points, many of whom were no doubt attracted by the racing program. That the visitors were delighted with the Exhibition and thoroughly enjoyed themselves goes without saying.

Every department of the big show is now running full blast and a splendid program will be carried out daily, to conclude with a great display of fireworks in front of the grandstand.

Judging is now well underway and will be rushed along to completion.

Of special interest to farmers and stock breeders will be the series of field days to be observed during the week, beginning today with Jersey cattle. They will be featured by judging and speeches by livestock experts.

On the Midway

Ben Williams, whose midway attractions at the Fredericton Exhibition are always an interesting feature, is on hand this year with a better display than ever. His side-shows are being well patronized and his ferris wheel, whip, and other amusements provided for the kiddies on the eastern side of the grounds are as popular as ever. Prof. Martin Ozarf is performing under Mr. Williams' auspices this season for the first time. The professor is a whole show in himself and executes some marvellous stunts. For instance, he swallows a piece of steel and a moment later it emerges from one of his eyes. He performs clever card tricks and stages a fine Punch and Judy show. Nobody should miss seeing Prof. Ozarf do his stuff.

Good Attendance

C. L. Sypher secretary of the Exhibition, anticipated last night that the grand attendance on Labor Day was quite equal to the record day of last year. That despite the mist and rain which fell during part of the holiday, No exact figures will be obtainable until the latter part of the week.

Yesterday's rain was not enough to delay any of the race program or the showing of the free open-air attractions and thousands attended the afternoon program at the race track. In the evening, though the crowd was not so large, due to imminence of rain, the grounds and buildings were well patronized. The Ben Williams midway attractions, as usual, featured the outdoor amusements and the midway side-shows look to be as popular as ever with the sight-seeing public.

Open-air Stunts

A complete showing of the open air attractions was made in the afternoon on the platform facing the grandstand and race track. Again in the evening the show was put on. The York Regiment Band, under the direction of Bandmaster Ernest M. Beatty, is supplying the music for this year's fair.

Capt. "Smiles" O'Timmins and his fire act had to be cancelled last night because of a bursted tank. It is expected to feature today's open-air show. The other acts were put on to a well-filled grandstand during Monday evening.

Some Fine Acts

The acts this year include Si Arding, a well-done clown act; the Four and a Half Arleys, an acrobatic act featuring a midget, and direct from a showing at Roxy's Theatre in New York city; Pearl Haines Revue, a graceful dance revue of lively, vivacious girls; Maree's Circus, an animal act; St. Onge Troupe, which replaced the originally scheduled San Su Duo. All are well arranged and in good taste. Several are the last word in skill, strength and dexterity. The above, together with Capt. "Smiles" O'Timmins, will be shown each afternoon and evening during this week in front of the grandstand.

The Exhibition itself promises well in all lines. The fact that New Brunswick produce is encouraged more this year has furnished keener competition among the farms and interest in this province, to the exclusion of outside exhibitors. Judging started today in all departments. Already judging had commenced in poultry.

In cattle the Exhibition is showing a herd of Holsteins of McIntyre Bros. of Sussex, the first exhibit of the Cosar Farm, and also a Jersey herd of His Worship Mayor Clark. All these and others have attracted much attention from those more educationally inclined. The exhibits in all other lines, and especially in womens work, seem to be up to part and possibly better than usual.

Booths in the main buildings are taken up as usual. A conspicuous absence on the lower floor is that of the exhibit of F. B. Edgecombe, Ltd. But outside of that particular one, the space seems to be taken up similar to other years.

The Exhibition directors were all about the grounds last evening and yesterday, and a brief directors' meeting was held in the main office during the evening.

One of the directors missing at this year's fair is Ald. T. V. Monohan, whose death has just been announced at the State Hospital at Portland, Maine, following an operation. Secretary Sypher received a telegram last evening from Director Monohan which wished the directors success this year, and hoping for his own early recovery.

This was delivered from Vancouver to Southampton in the record time of 7 days, marks wonderful advance in rapid communication between distant parts of Empire and demonstrates in impressive manner the skill and efficiency of Capt. Hawkes and the Canadian Pacific service. Please convey my heartiest congratulations to accept sincere reciprocal greetings." It was signed Wooley, Lord Mayor of Southampton.

Ald. T. V. Monohan Passes Away in Maine Hospital

Well Known, Popular Citizen and Hotel Man Died in Portland Following a Surgical Operation—News of His Death Has Occasioned Profound Regret—Was Native of Sunbury County, Will Be Greatly Missed.

Fredericton today lost one of its most popular and public spirited citizens and New Brunswick one of its most capable hotel-men in the death at Portland, Maine, this morning of Alderman Terrance V. Monohan, proprietor of the Queen Hotel and a director of Fredericton Exhibition, Limited. Early last week, Ald. Monohan underwent a major operation in the State Hospital at Portland for stomach trouble, and the word afterwards came that he had stood the ordeal well and had a fair chance for recovery. No later than yesterday, Secretary Sypher received a personal message from Ald. Monohan wishing the Fredericton Exhibition success and stating that he was hopeful of a complete recovery.

His Death Deplored

The news of the death of Ald. Monohan was received on all sides with expressions of profound regret. The general impression is that Fredericton has lost a big-hearted citizen who is going to be greatly missed. The body is expected to arrive here at noon tomorrow for burial, but the date of the funeral is yet to be decided upon.

Native of Burton

The late Ald. Monohan was a native of Burton, Sunbury county, of Irish parentage, but left that place when a young man and the greater part of his life was spent in Woodstock, Houlton and in this city. He removed to Fredericton from Woodstock in 1907 and took over the Barker House, which he conducted with great success for a period of seventeen years. Late in the year of 1923 he took over the management of the Queen Hotel and was its proprietor right up to the time of his death. His field of labor brought him into contact with a large number of people and his friends were legion and extended away beyond the borders of his native province. Sorrow over his unexpected death will be universal.

A Great Turfman

Ald. Monohan was an enthusiastic horseman and did much to promote harness racing in recent years. He was connected with the Maine and New Brunswick racing circuit and was seldom absent at a worthwhile race, meeting in this province or Maine. He was largely responsible for the most notable horse race ever witnessed on the Fredericton track. It took place during an Exhibition a few years ago and brought into competition such world beaters as Sir Roche, Single G., and the Dillon mare. A track record was hung up on that occasion, which still holds good.

Exhibition Director

Ald. Monohan some years ago joined the directorate of the Fredericton Exhibition, Limited, and his valuable counsel and advice was much appreciated by his associates. His death is sincerely deplored by each and every one of them.

Good Hotel Man

Ald. Monohan was a first-class hotel man, who looked after the welfare of his guests and won their everlasting friendship. He never let slip an opportunity to boost the attractions of Fredericton and spared no expense in doing so.

Prominent transportation officials and newspapermen of the New England States were numbered among his close personal friends, and frequently were his guests at the Queen

Hotel and at his summer camp on the Woodstock road. He entertained lavishly and as a host and glad-hand artist had few equals in this province and no superiors.

A Live Publicist

That the City of Fredericton received valuable publicity through his efforts and bountiful hospitality there is no question. His list of friends included Arthur Train, the well known novelist, of New York, and it will be recalled that in one of his articles in the Saturday Evening Post describing a fishing trip to this province by Ephraim Tut, a mythical New York lawyer, he gave prominence to the Queen Hotel. It is doubtful if any other Canadian hostelry ever figured into a story in such a widely circulated publication as the Saturday Evening Post.

Friend of Clergymen

While a devout Roman Catholic, Ald. Monohan, as his friends well know, never allowed matters of religious belief to interfere with his personal friendships. Clergymen of all denominations, including high officers of the Salvation Army, usually found a receipted bill awaiting them as they checked out after a sojourn at the Queen Hotel. He did this to show his respect for their sacred calling and not to boast of it.

Elected Alderman

Ald. Monohan always manifested a deep interest in the welfare of his adopted city, and was always ready to lend a helping hand to any good cause. He was an active member of the City Club and also of the A. & B. Club. In the civic elections of 1932 he was prevailed upon to offer for alderman for Queens Ward and was returned by acclamation. He became chairman of the Fire Committee and did splendid work in making the recent firemen's tournament such a great success. He was a regular attendant at meetings of the City Council and was one of the most valuable members of that body. The flag on the City Hall is flying at half mast today as a mark of respect to his memory.

The late Ald. Monohan is survived by a widow and one grandson, Hayden Monohan, a son of Lewis Monohan, who died a few years ago; three brothers, Michael, of Oromocto, Frank,

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
